**SUBJECT:** Information Relevant To Item 6.5 - Naming Proposal - Girard Plaza

(Formerly Napoleon Plaza) - Post Exhibition - At Council - 21 November

2016

That the Lord Mayor and Councillors note the information contained in this memo.

#### **Purpose**

Further information is provided for the information and guidance of Councillors relating to the naming proposal for Girard Plaza.

#### **Background**

At the meeting of the Corporate, Finance, Properties and Tenders Committee on 14 November 2016, a property owner and resident living near the plaza stated that he was unaware of the naming proposal and tabled a late submission in support of the original proposed name "Napoleon Plaza".

#### **Public Consultation**

In determining the name for a public open space, the City follows the process recommended by the Geographical Names Board. Therefore, the process for naming public spaces generally proceeds as follows:


- (a) in-principle approval by Council of the proposed name;
- (b) public notification of the naming proposal with a minimum 28 day response time;
- (c) Council approval following community consultation;
- (d) assessment by the Geographical Names Board of New South Wales through its formal application process; and
- (e) approval by the Geographical Names Board and subsequent publication in the NSW Government Gazette.

For this proposal, following the resolution of Council of 27 June 2016, the proposed name "Napoleon Plaza" was exhibited for public comment for the minimum period of 28 days.

The naming proposal was exhibited for public comment in the national press and local press (The Sydney Morning Herald on 6 September 2016 and Sydney Central Courier on 7 September 2016), and public notices were prominently displayed at various locations within the plaza (refer image below).

The proposal was also exhibited at the One Stop Shop and online on the Sydney Your Say website and the City's Facebook page.

In light of the feedback received, the City will review its notification process to ensure that all local stakeholders, including businesses and residents, are aware of the City's place naming proposals.



#### Assessment of the late Submission in Support of the name "Napoleon Plaza"

The submission, supporting the name "Napoleon Plaza" has been reviewed and considered as a late submission. A summary overview and the City's response is provided in Attachment A.

#### **Summary of all Submissions Received**

In total, 16 written submissions were received, including the late submission, of which four were in support of the name Napoleon Plaza.

Of the submissions not in support, five submissions expressed preference for an unspecified indigenous name and one submission proposed the indigenous name "Patyegarang". Other names suggested in submissions included: Nelson Plaza; Wellington Plaza; NKS Plaza; Paul Keating Plaza; and three submissions in support of Girard Plaza.

The support for "Napoleon Plaza" is balanced by the significant community opposition to naming the plaza after a foreign political figure with no direct connections to the site. The recommended name "Girard Plaza" has a direct connection with the site and maintains the historical association with the adjacent Napoleon Street.

Girard Plaza is also supported by the Barangaroo Delivery Authority, and Transport for NSW support either Napoleon Plaza or Girard Plaza.

It is recommended that Council approve the naming of the public open space "Girard Plaza" for the reasons set out in the report to Council.

#### **Alternative Naming Proposal**

During the course of discussion on this item, Councillor Scott advised that, at the forthcoming meeting of Council, she would propose an alternative name, "Jessie Street Plaza", for consideration.

It is noted that the proposed name "Jessie Street Plaza" would be inconsistent with the Geographic Names Board guidelines for the naming of public places, because it duplicates an existing nearby public open space – "Jessie Street Gardens".

Jessie Street (1889-1970), was a noted feminist and international peace campaigner. In addition to being commemorated through the "Jessie Street Gardens" (located in Central Sydney on Loftus Street), a women's library, located within the Ultimo Community Centre, is named the "Jessie Street National Women's Library".
