Kent Street Underpass Improvements

The Site

The site is located below street level. It includes three main pocket spaces connected by a network of underground pathways. There are several entry spaces leading up to street level.

The project will address the following challenges:

The look and feel of the place


- Footpaths are in poor condition
- The lighting is harsh at night, with heavy shading during the day in some areas
- The courtyards are dominated by concrete (A), and
- The overall space could be made more visually attractive (B)

Finding your way around



- There are no signs or directions in the underpass,
- Entries to the underpass are hard to see, (C) and
- There are limited sightlines

Attracting people and feeling safe


- The spaces inside the underpass are empty and under-utilised;
- There is potential for conflict between pedestrians and cyclists (D)
- Some spaces have only one way in and out (E);
- The underpass is very steep in some parts, and
- There is no safe pedestrian access to the underpass across the Link Road near York Street. (F)

The Kent Street underpass is a key pedestrian and cycle link connecting the city with Harbour North and Barangaroo. It is a network of underground pathways and spaces under the Western Distributor between Grosvenor and Kent Streets.

The City of Sydney is planning to improve the Kent Street underpass to make it easier to use and more appealing for pedestrians and cyclists. The Kent Street Underpass was identified as a priority project in the Harbour Village North Public Domain Study.

The project timeline (right) provides an overview of how the project will progress. The construction works will be undertaken in two stages. The community will be notified immediately prior to commencement of works on each stage.

The Concept Design

The concept addresses the challenges of the site in the following ways:

Improved pedestrian paths

New raised pedestrian paths clearly separated from the cycleways by a kerb. Shared paths in the Kent Street pocket and south entry, where pedestrians are given priority.

Better Lighting

New lighting to brighten the tunnels and make it easier to find your way around



A greener environment

New seating areas and plants throughout the underpass, including vines and climbers on the walls



New playground and fitness area

A new play space and some exercise equipment in the middle pocket of the underpass



Wall treatments and Wayfinding signage

New graphic wall treatments brighten the tunnels and make it easier to find the way through.



New stairs at York St entry

New stairs and garden terraces will activate the space and provide informal seating opportunities



Shared Zone at link road

New shared zone for cars and pedestrians across the Link Road near York Street to provide a safe area for pedestrians to cross to the underpass




York Street Pocket





These ideas have been used to inform the concept design of the play space in the middle pocket.
