
COMMUNITY CONSULTATION SUMMARY OF SUBMISSIONS

COMMUNITY CONSULTATION REPORT

Bourke Street Woolloomooloo Community Garden 20 May to 03 June 2016

Background



The group has worked with the City's Community Gardens Coordinator to develop the updated documents for feedback by the community.

The Bourke Street Community Garden proposes to extend the existing garden of 240 square metres to 417 square metres and also includes space for:

- Raised garden beds for growing vegetables, miniature fruit trees and herbs;
- Composting and soil bays; and
- A sandstone bird bath.
- Subject to a development application, the City may also install a tool shed and a chicken coop.

Community Engagement Objectives

The primary objective of this consultation was to show the proposed design of the extension of the garden and seek feedback. Feedback is required to ensure the gardens are properly utilised and enjoyed while also being accessible and meet the needs of the community.

The level of consultation for this program is considered to be between "Inform" and "Consult" on the City of Sydney's community engagement framework.

Community Engagement Activities

The consultation period ran from 20 May through to 3 June 2016. Community feedback was sought by the following actives;

- Notification letters delivered to 3,000 local residents in the area surrounding the community garden announcing the consultation. The letter included a garden design layout, links to Sydney your say to provide feedback.
- A story on Sydneyyoursay.com.au announcing the consultation, displaying the group's proposed plans (Management plan, garden design layout, Chicken Project Management Plan and Gardeners agreement). An online submission form and City staff emails were provided for people to have their say.
- Copies of the notification letter and garden design layout was displayed on the front fence of the community garden outlining ways people could have their say.

All submissions were in support of the extension to the garden.

A total of 46 people made submissions in support of the extension of the garden;

- 18 emails were sent to Community Garden Coordinator Raewyn Broadfoot.
- 23 residents also provided their support in writing to the City

I have been the Coordinator of the Bourke St Community Garden since its beginning and I sincerely believe it has made an enormous difference to our community and the interactions that have taken place because of it. We have local cafes involved and collect and compost their organic waste, and have close ties with Ozanam Learning Centre and facilitate garden projects and activities onsite for their clients.

I am writing in response to and in support of the proposed expansion of the Bourke Street Community Garden (BSCG).	Noted
I am a landscape architect, environmental planner and horticulturalist by profession. I am also a gardener and an altruist by nature, as well as being a local resident. I am hugely supportive of the physical, psychological and social benefits of community gardening and its ability to break down barriers that may otherwise exist in any group of people.	
Until recently I have been volunteering my services to provide casual Monday afternoon 'gardening classes/workshops' to clients of Ozanam Learning Centre and residents of Matthew Talbott Hostel, however this	

has been put on hold of late due to a deficiency of space and tasks. The feedback that I have received previously with regard to the gardening classes and workshops has been extremely positive, with people tending to 'open up' and 'socialise' more in the atmosphere of working in a community gardening than they normally would, to the extent that one attendee experienced a life-changing event as a result of 'opening up' about a 30 year illness that had previously dominated his life in a very negative manner, whilst another attendee was offered a position in the landscape industry. Many other 'gardening team' members, who at the time have not had too many positive things in their lives, have also benefited hugely from the classes/workshops and related exercise, and have sincerely thanked me for investing my time into 'them' (as they have seen it) – which has also benefited their feelings of self-worth. I am most excited about the prospect of more space for the Bourke Street Community Garden. Apart from the obvious benefits to people experiencing difficult times in their lives, the benefits to the overall local community should not be underestimated. I am also most effusive about the time, effort and overall support provided by Georgina Bathurst, the BSCG co-ordinator, whose tireless work to date has been priceless! With regard to the prospect of more space being made available, I think this is an excellent idea! In addition, if this additional space is obtained then I would be most happy to discuss with the appropriate person the possibility of utilising some of this space as a community nursery, so that plants can be grown from seed and cuttings and swapped with friends and neighbours, or possibly even sold to raise money for local charities (if permitted) – and I would be most happy to guide those interested in the various methods of plant propagation, which is a very interesting and rewarding pastime. I do hope that the expansion of the Bourke Street Community Garden is able to proceed, for reasons as outlined above. I am a current member of the garden and a nearby resident. As an immigrant to Australia, it has been a great way to meet people in the local area and to take part in a worthwhile community project. If I didn't have access to Bourke Street Community Garden, my experience of living in Sydney and in Woolloomooloo would be very different and much less enjoyable.

I have been a member of the garden for 2 years and enjoy my time in it. I am, however, frustrated by lack of space and lack of plots. There are not enough of either. Other people have felt the same and given up. There are not enough communal plots to plant enough seedlings to get a large enough crop for everyone to share. There are not enough small plots for all the people that want to grow something of their own. Put simply, we need more space and more plots; big and small. The chicken coup is also a great idea as is that of composting bays The garden is a good idea, it gets people together, home owners or otherwise but we need more of everything to keep the interest of more, potential new members.
