

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concept plan

Wimbo Park sits at the eastern end of Devonshire Street in Surry Hills, at the doorstep of the inner city and the parklands of Centennial and Moore Parks. It is also the new dignment of Syandrey's South-East Light Rail, which connects Circular Quay to Randwick, making a new park and potential light rail stop on the Olivia Gardens site. Transport for NSW will deliver the Light Rail Infrastructure and a pedestrian and bicycle shareway that crosses the park from Bourke to South Dowling Streets, the City of Sydney delivering this new community park.

The park design places an urban edge to Bourke and Devonshire Streets with the parkland open space figured towards Centennial Park. A cycleway and pedestrian path running in parallel with the light rail line and separating the main body of the park from this movement corridor. Making an open space for local residents and the children of Bourke Streef Public School, as well as a performative landscape with a living urban ecology.



Bourke Street Seating Square

The design for Wimbo Park can be understood in four parts.

An urban terrace & threshold at Bourke Street

The terrace gives a sense of conclusion to Devonshire Street, integrates the light rail crossing and an extension to Parkham Lane, while making two gathering spaces. To the north of the light rail a long table and two barbeques make a place for lunching and community events, while the larger space to the south is defined by a folding ground plane which separates people from exiting vehicles. Here stools are dotted along the perimeter of this undulate edge allowing both small groups and individuals to gather comfortably. Large circular seats inging this part of the site a beautiful drifting quality, which recalls the original landscape of the Botany Sands and connects this site apeologically to Centennial Parklands.

Bounding the southern edge of the park the electricity substation will have its dark brick face transformed with the colourful mosaic 'Wimbo Paddock Mural', that depicts the real and imagined life of the park.

> The shareway & central park

The shareway is set level with the Light Rail and gently grades from the terrace to South Dowling Street. It is five metres wide with a wavering edge that holds lights, seats, planting and a shifting line of Scribbly Gums that give filtered shade along this route. Part way along the path a more generous breakout space is situated where people can rest and wait for friends.


The park itself is set down 450mm from the shareway, making a subtle change in level which helps keep small children away from the bustle of the shareway and at the same time, forms a lower seating edge for families and carers. Where the park meets Parkham Lane the ground folds up to form a grassy bank for sunning and playing, with the external face of the bern planted to control movement, while screening garage doors and passing traffic.

At the western end of the park long steps make a formal entry to the lawn and a place for gathering. Close by a trio of inground trampolines invite local kids to play. The shifting width of the grass gives a sensuous feel to this long lawn and allows for many people to use the space. At the opposite end the lawn folds down and forms a soak or rain garden that captures and treats stormwater from the park and laneway. A boardwalk allows access from the lane to the shareway, while the perimeter seat traverses this wilder corner of the park, making a balancing beam for children to move through this spongy landscape-like the tight rope walker, Blondin, who is said to have scaled aerial wires at Wimbo Paddack in the early twentieth century. A 'grove' of gnarty bleached free trunks giving a sense of intensity and mood to this corner of the park- onlookers to this past spectacle.

> The threshold to South Dowling Street
As the eastern end of the shareway rises to meet South Dowling
Street, a copse of fast growing Scribbly Gums and Sydney Red
Gums will replace the old Morton Bay Fig removed as part
of the Light Rail construction. Bringing back an abstracted
representation of the Eastern Suburbs Bankia Scrub originally at
home on these dunal soils, while shading a series of zig zag seats


at the threshold to Moore Park.

The landscaped edge to Nobbs Lane
As part of Light Rail project, parking displaced from the Langton
Centre will be sited temporarily along Nobbs Lane. The
Cenfiguration of parking bays aligned to protect the large plane
trees on this kerb. A slip path from Olivia Lane allows access
into Wimbo Park, while the perimeter of the rail line is planted
with local species and discretely fenced. At the junction of the
laneway path and visible from the communal table, is sited the
sandstone fountain that currently resides in the park. Finding a
new home at this local entry and gathering space.
