The Local Government and Planning Legislation Amendment (Political Donations) Act 2008 ("the Act") requires the disclosure of relevant political donations or gifts when planning applications are made to minimise any perception of undue influence. The amendments to the Act require disclosure to the Electoral Funding Authority of:

- a reportable political donation as defined in the Election Funding and Disclosures
 Act 1981 (a donation of \$1000 or more made to or for the benefit of the party, elected
 member, group or candidate or made by a major political donor to or for the benefit of
 a party, elected member, group or candidate, or made to the major political donor), or
- a gift (as defined in the Election Funding and Disclosures Act 1981) to any local councillor or council employee (and includes a disposition of property or a gift of money or the provision of other valuable or service for no consideration or for inadequate consideration) when a relevant planning application is made to a council.

A donation of less than \$1000 can be a reportable political donation if the aggregated total of such donations was made by an entity or person to the same party, elected member, group or candidate or person.

Disclosures of Interest

Councillor Philip Thalis disclosed a significant, non-pecuniary interest in Item 6.10 on the agenda, in that a person involved with the management of one of the recommended recipients is a personal friend of his, and it had been brought to his attention that the same person made a non-reportable donation to the Clover Moore Independent Team campaign at the 2016 City of Sydney elections. Councillor Thalis stated that he was not aware of this grant until the committee papers were released and that he would not be voting on this item.

Councillor Jess Miller made the following disclosures:

- a less than significant, non-pecuniary interest in Item 6.10 on the agenda, in that it had been brought to her attention that a person involved with the management of one of the recommended recipients is also the president of the Independent Bars Association, an organisation which was involved in a campaign run by Councillor Miller earlier this year. Councillor Miller stated that she did not speak with him regarding his application, and was not aware of this recommendation until the committee report became available.
- a less than significant, non-pecuniary interest in Item 6.10 on the agenda, in that it had been brought to her attention that a person involved with the management of one of the recommended recipients made a non-reportable donation to the Clover Moore Independent Team campaign at the 2016 local government election. Councillor Miller stated that she was not aware of this recommendation until the committee report became available.

Councillor Jess Scully disclosed a less than significant, non-pecuniary interest in Item 6.10 on the agenda, in that it had been brought to her attention that a person involved with the management of one of the recommended recipients made a non-reportable donation to the Clover Moore Independent Team campaign at the 2016 City of Sydney elections. Councillor Scully stated that she was not aware of the grant until the committee papers were released, and that she has not spoken to the person either.

Councillor Robert Kok made the following disclosures:

- a less than significant, non-pecuniary interest in Item 6.10 on the agenda, in that it had been brought to his attention that a person involved with the management of one of the recommended recipients made a non-reportable donation to the Clover Moore Independent Team campaign at the 2016 City of Sydney elections. Councillor Kok stated that he was not aware of this grant until the committee report became available and that he has not spoken to the person.
- a less than significant, non-pecuniary interest in Item 6.12 on the agenda, in that he is an alumni of the Asialink Program. Councillor Kok stated that he was not aware of this grant until the committee report became available and confirmed that he has not been contacted by any member of the organisation about this grant at any time.

The Lord Mayor, Councillor Clover Moore, disclosed a less than significant, non-pecuniary interest in Item 6.10 on the agenda, in that applicants for grants recommended in this item include persons who made a less than reportable donation to the Clover Moore Independent Team prior to the 2016 election. This includes a person associated with 107 Projects, who made a less than reportable donation to the Clover Moore Independent Team prior to the 2016 election.

Central Sydney Laneways

By Councillor Forster

It is resolved that Council:

- (A) note:
 - (i) after conducting a study of Central Sydney laneways between July 1992 and March 1993, Council, in October 1993, adopted the City of Sydney Policy for the Management of Laneways in Central Sydney;
 - (ii) the objectives of the study included the identification of the urban design opportunities inherent in Sydney's lanes as well as the preparation of the aforementioned policy and recommendations for the management of these lanes:
 - (iii) the policy document outlines recommendations for the management of 107 individual lanes and identifies things such as heritage issues, pedestrian and vehicular access and interactions, and the potential for the enhancement of pedestrian amenity, as well as recommendations for the disposal of certain laneways;
 - (iv) on 10 March 2008, Council endorsed the Live Laneways Laneway Revitalisation Strategy, part of which included the development of concept plans for up to four laneways for approval by Council prior to calling tenders for construction in the 2008/09 financial year;
 - (v) following this endorsement, in June 2009, Council selected eight CBD laneways for public domain improvements, subsequently adding a ninth laneway. The nine lanes prioritised for capital works improvement listed by precinct were:
 - (a) Northern CBD Bulletin Place:
 - (b) Central CBD Angel Place, Hosking and Penfold Place, Lees Court, Ash Street;
 - (c) Western CBD York Lane; and
 - (d) Southern CBD Albion Place, Central Street, Wilmot Street;
 - (vi) between 2010 and 2016, improvement works were completed in Ash Street, Angel Place, Albion Place, Bulletin Place, Wilmot Street, Central Street, Hosking Place and Penfold Place with most of these precincts attracting new businesses and enjoying enhanced economic vibrancy;

(vii) improvements to Lees Court were put on hold as a result of the lodgement of a development application for upgrade works to the adjacent MLC building and it was agreed that the laneway would be upgraded by the developer as part of their public domain contribution;

- (viii) a concept design was completed for York Lane but construction works were put on hold due to adjacent work associated with the construction of Wynyard Walk. These works have now been completed and recent discussions with Transport for New South Wales indicate support for the conversion of York Lane to a shared zone and associated public domain improvements; and
- (ix) since the announcement of the Sydney CBD and South East Light Rail project some other laneway upgrades have been put on hold, however, part of the financial contribution by the City towards the light rail project has been earmarked for the improvement of surrounding laneways; and
- (B) request the Chief Executive Officer to:
 - (i) initiate a review of the City of Sydney Policy for the Management of Laneways in Central Sydney, first introduced in 1993, with the aim of identifying additional laneways suitable for upgrades both during and following completion of the construction of the Sydney CBD and South East Light Rail; and
 - (ii) update Councillors via CEO Update on the City's Live Laneways Laneway Revitalisation Strategy, including an update on the status of any works scheduled for York Lane.

International Campaign to Abolish Nuclear Weapons Cities Appeal

It is resolved that:

(A) Council note:

- the International Campaign to Abolish Nuclear Weapons (ICAN), originally established in Australia in 2007, were awarded the 2017 Nobel Peace Prize for their ground-breaking efforts to achieve a global treaty for the prohibition of nuclear weapons;
- (ii) on 7 July 2017, 122 nations voted to adopt the Treaty on the Prohibition of Nuclear Weapons ("the Treaty");
- (iii) at this time the Treaty has been signed by 69 nations and ratified by 19 nations. Once ratified by 50 nations, it will enter into force;
- (iv) while the Australian Government supports the goal of a world free of nuclear weapons, it has not yet signed or ratified the Treaty;
- (v) cities in the United States independently began to add their support to this cause, and inspired by them, ICAN will soon launch the Cities Appeal, a campaign for towns and cities to voice their concern for the consequences of nuclear weapons and endorse the Treaty; and
- (vi) the City of Sydney is a member of Mayors for Peace, an international organisation which calls for nuclear disarmament;
- (B) Council congratulate ICAN on their historic achievement and contribution toward global nuclear disarmament;
- (C) the City of Sydney endorse the ICAN Cities Appeal which states that:
 - "Our city is deeply concerned about the grave threat that nuclear weapons pose to communities throughout the world. We firmly believe that our residents have the right to live in a world free from this threat. Any use of nuclear weapons, whether deliberate or accidental, would have catastrophic, far-reaching and long-lasting consequences for people and the environment. Therefore, we warmly welcome the adoption of the Treaty on the Prohibition of Nuclear Weapons by the United Nations in 2018, and we call on our national government to sign and ratify it without delay"; and
- (D) the Lord Mayor be requested to write to the Foreign Affairs Minister calling for the government to sign and ratify the Treaty on behalf of the Australian people.

- (C) request that the Lord Mayor write to the Prime Minister, the Hon. Scott Morrison MP, the Minister for Foreign Affairs, Senator the Hon. Marise Payne, the Federal Leader of the Opposition, the Hon. Bill Shorten MP, and the Shadow Minister for Foreign Affairs, Senator the Hon. Penny Wong, expressing this view.

Recycling in our City

It is resolved that:

- (A) Council note:
 - (i) in September 2018, the Federal government announced a new National Waste Policy, which included draft targets to reduce total waste by 10 per cent per capita and divert 80 per cent of waste from landfill;
 - (ii) local government bears the large majority of the burden for recycling and waste management across NSW;
 - (iii) Sustainable Sydney 2030 outlines the City of Sydney's recycling targets, with a target of 70 per cent recycling and recovery of residential and commercial waste from the local government area by end June 2021; and
 - (iv) the City's recently completed City for All: Social Sustainability Policy and Action Plan identifies an inclusive City resilient to the effects of climate change and environmental disaster as a key objective; and
- (B) the Chief Executive Officer be requested to:
 - (i) as a part of the Sustainable Sydney 2050 planning process and Council strategic aims, identify mechanisms by which to increase the amount of waste that is recycled in our City, considering both waste disposal by individuals, households and commercial operations, and the City's systems and processes for waste collection and disposal; and
 - (ii) provide an update to Councillors via CEO Update.

2P Parking on Greens Road

It is resolved that:

- (A) Council note:
 - (i) the following recommendation was brought to the Local Pedestrian, Cycling and Traffic Calming Committee (LPCTCC) meeting held on 19 July 2018:

"it is recommended that the Committee endorse the reallocation of parking on the eastern side of Greens Road, Paddington between the points 27 metres and 139 metres (19 car spaces) north of Moore Park Road, as: "2P 8am-2am, Permit Holders Excepted Area 15"";

- (a) the LPCTCC deferred this item to be decided at a future meeting to receive further advice;
- residents have requested that this matter be considered at each LPCTCC meeting since the matter was deferred; and
- (c) this matter was not considered at the subsequent LPCTCC meetings held on 16 August 2018, 20 September 2018 or 18 October 2018;
- (ii) the matter of 2P parking on Greens Road in Paddington has been an issue that the local community has raised consistently to Council since early 2016;
 - (a) the parking in this area was changed from 2P to 4P in March 2016, and since that time residents have continually raised concerns that this has impeded the ability of local residents and their visitors to find parking;
 - (b) it was again requested that the reinstatement of 2P parking on Greens Road be considered by the City as part of the Neighbourhood Parking Policy review conducted in late 2017; and
 - (c) residents' concerns raised at this time have been left largely unanswered by Council for a period of almost 12 months, while this matter has been ongoing for over two and a half years;
- (iii) the 'Guide to the delegation to councils for the regulation of traffic Including the operation of Traffic Committees' produced by the NSW Government and which outlines the powers of local traffic committees states in clause 5.1 that "The LTC [local traffic committee] has no decision-making powers. The LTC is primarily a technical review committee, which is required to advise the Council," and "A Council is not bound by the advice of its LTC";

(B) Council approve the recommendation for the reallocation of parking on the eastern side of Greens Road, Paddington between the points 27 metres and 139 metres (19 car spaces) north of Moore Park Road, as: "2P 8am-2am, Permit Holders Excepted Area 15."; and

(C) the Chief Executive Officer be requested to action the approval of this recommendation by overseeing the institution of the changes to parking prescribed therein as soon as practicable.

Taylor Square South Vehicular Access

It is resolved that:

(A) Council note:

- (i) in June 2018, the City announced the return of the rainbow crossing to Taylor Square at the signalised intersection of Bourke and Campbell Streets, Surry Hills;
- (ii) in October 2018, the Local Pedestrian, Cycling and Traffic Calming Committee (LPCTCC) unanimously endorsed and approved the rainbow crossing proposal;
- (iii) in addition to the installation of the rainbow crossing, the LPCTCC agreed to the permanent closure of Bourke Street, between Campbell and Oxford Streets (Taylor Square South), to vehicular traffic (except emergency vehicles);
- (iv) Kinselas, located in Taylor Square South, has advised that it did not receive notification of this proposal;
- the closure of Taylor Square South to vehicular traffic would severely impact local businesses at this location, particularly the Courthouse Hotel which receives regular deliveries via Taylor Square South;
- (vi) if vehicular access is removed for these essential delivery services, drivers would need to move large amounts of stock from loading zones located in Bourke and Campbell Streets, which in itself is a Work, Health and Safety issue; and
- (vii) there have been no known past safety issues with the interactions of pedestrians, cyclists and delivery vehicles in Taylor Square South; and
- (B) Council exercise it's delegated function, in accordance with the Roads Act 1993, as follows:

"It is recommended that Council note the following in Surry Hills:

- (A) Widen and raise the existing signalised crossing at the intersection of Bourke and Campbell Streets;
- (B) Combine the pedestrian and cycle signal crossings;
- (C) Trial the painting of the raised area of the crossing with the Rainbow Flag; and
- (D) Trail signal phasing to prioritise pedestrians and cyclists over vehicles at the crossing;

(E) Permanently close Bourke Street, between Campbell and Oxford Streets (Taylor Square South), to vehicular traffic.

It is also recommended that Council endorse the following in Surry Hills:

- (F) The reallocation of parking on the western side of Bourke Street, between the points 12.8 metres and 21.8 metres (one car space) south of Campbell Street, as "No Stopping";
- (G) The reallocation of parking on the eastern side of Bourke Street, between the points 10 metres and 34.3 metres (four car spaces) north of Linden Lane, as "Loading Zone Ticket 8am-6pm" and "4P Ticket 6pm-10pm Permit Holders Excepted Area 18 (1/4P Free)";
- (H) The reallocation of parking on the southern side of Campbell Street, between the points 0 metres and 16 metres (three car spaces) west of Bourke Street, as "Loading Zone Ticket 8am-6pm" and "4P Ticket 6pm-10pm Permit Holders Excepted Area 18 (1/4P Free)"; and
- (I) The installation of a shared path on the south-western corner of Bourke and Campbell Streets."
- (C) the Chief Executive Officer be requested to notify, in writing, the NSW Police and the RMS representatives on the LPCTCC of Council's intention to remove parts (E), (F), (G) and (H) of the LPCTCC decision of 18 October 2018.
- (D) Council note that it must refrain from taking any action for 14 days so that the NSW Police or the RMS is given an opportunity to appeal to the Chairperson, Regional Traffic Committee should they wish.

More Affordable Housing in our City

 - (i) the Resilient Sydney Strategy and the City for All: Social Sustainability Policy and Action Plan both identify more affordable housing as a key priority in building a more just, equal and fair City;
 - (ii) housing affordability was identified by residents as a high priority action area by residents surveyed as part of the City for All: Social Sustainability Policy and Action Plan;
 - (iii) by some estimates, less than 1 per cent of the of dwellings in the City are classified as affordable rental housing; and
 - (iv) in May 2018, Council passed a motion in support of the development of affordable housing targets of 25 per cent on government-owned land, and requested that LGNSW consider lobbying the NSW state government expressing this view; and
- (B) Council, as a part of the development of the Sustainable Sydney 2050 plan, examine and, where possible, incorporate housing affordability targets for development occurring on Council-owned land.

Celebrating the Centenary of Women in Local Government

It is resolved that:

(A) Council note:

- November 2018 marks the 100th anniversary of the passing of the Women's Legal Status Act in NSW, which enabled women to stand for election to local government and the legislative assembly, and to practise as lawyers;
- (ii) ten years later Lillian Fowler became the first woman elected to a NSW local council when she was elected to the Newtown Municipal Council in 1928;
- (iii) Fowler went on to become the first female Mayor in Australia, when she was elected Mayor of this Council in 1937;
- (iv) women make an enormous contribution to local government in NSW, with about 330 women local councillors serving in this state;
- (v) despite, this women are under-represented as local councillors, and in 2012 made up only 27 per cent of councillors across NSW; and
- (vi) the achievements of women in local government in the past and today should be uplifted and celebrated; and
- (B) the Chief Executive Officer be requested:
 - (i) to promote community events by or in conjunction with other organisations celebrating the centenary of women in local government, and, where possible, provide appropriate support; and
 - (ii) to provide an update to Councillors via CEO Update.
