#### Item 2

## **Statement of Ethical Obligations**

In accordance with section 233A of the Local Government Act 1993, the Lord Mayor and Councillors are bound by the Oath or Affirmation of Office made at the start of the Council term to undertake their civic duties in the best interests of the people of the City of Sydney and the City of Sydney Council and to faithfully and impartially carry out the functions, powers, authorities and discretions vested in them under the Local Government Act 1993 or any other Act, to the best of their ability and judgement.

#### **Disclosures of Interest**

Pursuant to the provisions of the Local Government Act 1993, the City of Sydney Code of Meeting Practice and the City of Sydney Code of Conduct, Councillors are required to disclose and manage both pecuniary and non-pecuniary interests in any matter on the agenda for this meeting.

In both cases, the nature of the interest must be disclosed.

This includes receipt of reportable political donations over the previous four years.

# **Support for the Justice Reform Initiative and Criminal Justice Reform**

# Minute by the Lord Mayor

To Council:

Vibrant, liveable cities are inclusive cities. They are also safe cities.

At the City of Sydney, we welcome the contributions made by all people and we work hard to build social cohesion and combat disadvantage.

Yet despite our best efforts, widespread disadvantage persists. Sydney is Australia's least affordable city and homelessness is at unprecedented levels. While unemployment is low, insecure work is high, creating a new class of working poor. And although we have come a long way in our understanding of mental illness and substance abuse, specialist services for treating these conditions are stretched beyond capacity, especially since Covid.

The relationship between these sources of disadvantage and incarceration is clear. Homelessness, unemployment, mental illness and substance abuse are both a cause and a consequence of incarceration.

In NSW, complex health issues are much higher among people in prison than the general population, 50 per cent of people released from prison are homeless and two-thirds of those who return to gaol were unemployed at the time they committed their offence.

Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people have the unfortunate distinction of being the most incarcerated people in the world. In NSW, Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander adults make up 26 per cent of the prison population despite making up just three per cent of the general population. And Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander children account for 42 per cent of children in custody despite making up just six per cent of the general population between the ages of 10 and 17.

I am pleased to say the relationship between police and Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander young people in the City of Sydney has improved greatly since I first represented Redfern in the 1980s. However, as long as kids between the ages of 10 and 13 can be deemed criminally liable for their actions, too many children will come into contact with the criminal justice system instead of getting the help they need at home and at school.

I know of a 12-year-old Aboriginal boy in the City of Sydney who was recently charged with larceny for taking a \$1 Slurpee from a convenience store. His home was searched by police and his school records were obtained with a view to showing he knew right from wrong. His mother – a sole parent – took time off work to attend her son's police and court dates.

I am not suggesting we turn a blind eye to shop lifting. But I am suggesting this is an expensive and wholly ineffective way of dealing with a young child who took a drink from a store.

We also know that women's prisons are full of victim-survivors of domestic violence. Across Australia, around 70 per cent of women in gaol have been in an abusive relationship, with this figure rising even higher for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander women in gaol.

And even though we lock all of these people up – at a cost of \$1 billion a year in NSW and \$5 billion a year across Australia – gaols are not leading to a reduction in crime. Fifty per cent of people released from prison in NSW will return to prison within two years.

Australia's punitive response to disadvantage – which has been pursued by both sides of politics for the last 30 years – is not working. It's not working for offenders of crime, it's not working for victims of crime and it's not working for the community at large.

This is why I am so pleased to welcome the formation of the Justice Reform Initiative, a bipartisan organisation seeking evidenced-based criminal justice policies across Australia that identify alternatives to incarceration and enhance community safety.

I also encourage other Councils to support this campaign. Though States and Territories are primarily responsible for crime, housing and health, as the level of government closest to the community we see the fallout from the lack of investment in social services every day.

To the Chair of the Justice Reform Initiative, Robert Tickner AO, and the many other prominent Australians who are campaigning for a more compassionate and effective response to disadvantage and crime - we support your campaign.

#### Recommendation

It is resolved that:

### (A) Council:

- (i) reaffirm its commitment to building social cohesion and combatting disadvantage;
- (ii) note the well-established nexus between incarceration and homelessness, unemployment, mental illness, substance abuse and other socioeconomic causes of crime:
- (iii) note the over-representation of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people, and the high number of women who are victim-survivors of domestic violence, in NSW gaols;
- (iv) note that \$1 billion dollars is spent on running NSW gaols each year;
- (v) note that 50 per cent of those who are released from NSW gaols return within two years;
- (vi) welcome the formation of the Justice Reform Initiative, a bipartisan organisation seeking evidenced-based criminal justice policies across Australia that identify alternatives to incarceration and enhance community safety;
- (vii) call on all NSW parliamentarians to support evidenced-based criminal justice policies, including those that address the underlying causes of crime such as homelessness, unemployment, mental illness and substance abuse; and

- (viii) call on all NSW parliamentarians to raise the age of criminal responsibility; and
- (B) the Lord Mayor be requested to write to the NSW Premier and Attorney General, and the Leader of the Opposition and Shadow Attorney General, expressing Council's support for the Justice Reform Initiative's campaign for:
  - (i) evidenced-based criminal justice reform;
  - (ii) reduced incarceration; and
  - (iii) a greater emphasis on addressing the sources of disadvantage that lead to, and flow from, incarceration.

# **St George Community Housing Foyer**

# Minute by the Lord Mayor

#### To Council:

Access to affordable and social housing is essential for a diverse, cohesive, and economically successful global city. Yet as we know, Sydney is Australia's least affordable City.

Although tackling housing affordability is primarily the responsibility of the State and Federal Governments, the Council is committed to supporting affordable and social housing any way we can. This includes through our Affordable and Diverse Housing Fund, which we established with \$10 million in 2015, and supplemented with another \$10 million in 2020.

One of our earliest grants under this Fund was a \$3 million grant for St George Community Housing's Foyer Central project at 26 City Road, Chippendale. And earlier this month, I was really inspired and encouraged when I was taken on a tour of the Foyer by two of its impressive young residents.

Like all of the residents in this 53-room purpose-built complex, these young women had been in out-of-home care and were at risk of homelessness when they turned 18 and had to leave, and fortunately they connected with staff and support workers at the Foyer. And now they are clearly thriving.

To prepare their residents for independent living, the Foyer provides wrap around services so they can set and achieve educational and employment goals that will set them up for life. In return, residents are expected to see their development coaches for at least an hour a week, attend a range of life-skill lessons and – most controversially, as far as the residents are concerned – keep their room tidy!

They say "it takes a village" and the Foyer certainly attests to that. It is run by St George Community Housing, Uniting and Social Ventures Australia. The Sisters of Charity provide scholarships that support some of the residents at university and an Aboriginal officer from Redfern Local Area Command runs weekly yarning circles. In addition, many local community organisations, such as OzHarvest, volunteer their time to support the residents achieve their goals.

Staff told me that one of the best things about the Foyer is its location. It is close to buses, trams and trains; three universities; a TAFE; and any number of businesses and employment opportunities. Although the residents clearly benefit from all the City has to offer, we in turn undoubtedly benefit from all the residents have to offer.

I would also like to take this opportunity to commend the NSW Government for raising the age of out-of-home care support from 18 to 21 years of age. Many of us cannot imagine how hard it is for children growing up in out-of-home care facing the transition to adulthood without the love and support of our families. This increased investment from the Government means that young people can be supported for longer in places like the Foyer and be better prepared for independent living.

## Recommendation

It is resolved that Council:

 reaffirm its commitment to continue taking action to increase affordable housing in the City of Sydney;

- (B) continue to recognise the important role the Affordable and Diverse Housing Fund plays in the development of affordable and diverse housing in our area;
- (C) congratulate St George Community Housing and its partners for delivering on its goal of providing a safe haven for some of our most vulnerable young people; and
- (D) commend the NSW Government for raising the age of support for young people in outof-home care from 18 to 21 years of age.

## **Support to Reform Tenancy Laws to Allow Pets in Rentals**

By Councillor Ellsmore

It is resolved that:

#### (A) Council note:

- (i) Australia has among the highest rates of pet ownership in the world. Pet ownership has increased in NSW to 60 per cent of households;
- (ii) research from the RSPCA found that pet ownership has many benefits, including improvements to mental health and wellbeing;
- (iii) the majority of people living in the City of Sydney are now renters. Households renting in the City increased from 46.7 per cent in 2016, to 53.7 per cent in 2021;
- (iv) the Council has previously advocated to the NSW Government to introduce legislation to offer better protection to renters, including by prohibiting no-grounds evictions, punitive and discriminatory practices, rent bidding by landlords, and 'no pets' clauses;
- in NSW, tenancy laws still allow for blanket 'no pets' clauses. This allows landlords to refuse requests from renters to have a pet without providing a reason (unless it is an assistance animal);
- (vi) in other states and territories, rules have recently changed to make it easier for tenants to keep pets in rental homes by, for example, requiring the landlord to provide a reason to refuse a pet;
- (vii) the NSW Government is currently consulting about changing tenancy rules, to make it easier for renters to have pets; and
- (viii) there is strong community campaigning by Make Renting Fair and the Tenants' Union NSW to change NSW tenancy laws to end blanket 'no pets' clauses in NSW;
- (B) Council expresses its strong support for law reforms which would make it easier for renters to have pets in NSW; and
- (C) the Chief Executive Officer be requested to:
  - (i) provide a submission to the NSW Government in support of reform to support pet ownership in rentals, by the deadline of Friday, 2 December 2022; and
  - (ii) send a copy of this motion and the City of Sydney Council submission to the Minister for Fair Trading Victor Dominello, the relevant opposition Shadow Minister, and the NSW Tenants Union.

## **Community Consultation on Woolloomooloo Playground**

- (viii) the Lord Mayor recently held a Community Housing Forum on 8 November 2022, at which residents raised this matter; and
- (ix) City of Sydney staff have organised a community meeting to receive further input into the design and upgrades to be included in the development; and

- (B) the Chief Executive Officer be requested to:
  - (i) continue the process of engaging with the community to pursue their input on the changes and upgrades to be included in the development before commencing the project; and

## Protecting the Right to Peaceful Non-Violent Protest in NSW

It is resolved that:

#### (A) Council note:

- (i) the NSW Government has enacted a series of laws which restrict and criminalise peaceful protests;
- (ii) most recently, in April 2022 following protests by climate activists in the city, the NSW Parliament passed legislation to prevent protesting on major roads, bridges, tunnels, public transport and infrastructure facilities. The new legislation amends section 144G the *Roads Act 1993* and criminalises activities that 'cause serious disruption';
- (iii) offences carry a maximum penalty of \$22,000 or two years in gaol, or both;
- (iv) since the passing of the amendment in April 2022, many activists have been charged under these and other anti-protest laws;
- (v) the changes were strongly opposed by human rights, environmental and civil liberties groups; and
- (vi) in October 2022, The Environmental Defenders Office filed a legal challenge to the laws in the NSW Supreme Court;

#### (B) Council also note:

- (i) the NSW Police has formed a militarised police unit Strike Force Guard which has targeted environmental campaigners;
- (ii) the NSW Council for Civil Liberties and human rights groups have urgently written to the NSW Government (including the Attorney General, Police Minister and Commissioner for Police) expressing concern about pre-emptive and intimidatory police tactics leading up to the International Mining and Resources Conference (IMARC) held in Sydney over 2 to 4 November 2022; and
- (iii) reported police activities include police making unannounced visits to suspected activists' homes, car stops and searches, and arrests of climate activists and networks prior to the event;

- (C) Council:
  - (i) acknowledge that the right to protest is fundamental in a democratic society;
  - (ii) condemn harsh police practices with respect to protesters; and
  - (iii) commit to support and facilitate the right of the community, including climate activists, to peacefully protests in the City; and
- (D) the Lord Mayor be requested to urgently write to the NSW Attorney General, NSW Shadow Attorney General, the NSW Minister for Police and the Commissioner for Police:
  - (i) to express support for the right of peaceful gathering, meeting, and assembly in NSW;
  - (ii) to express the City's support for the repeal of protest laws introduced in April this year; and
  - (iii) to call on the NSW Police to cease pre-emptive and heavy-handed policing of protests, particularly climate protests.

## **Party Wall Consent**

It is resolved that:

#### (A) Council note:

- (i) a party wall is a dividing partition between two adjoining buildings that is shared by the occupants of each residence or business. Each building supported by the party wall is entitled to be supported by the whole wall and the wall is protected by cross easements benefitting both owners. The easements do not give the person who has the benefit of the easement a right to possession of the land (i.e. make them an owner of the land);
- (ii) as such, owner's consent for the lodgement of a development application is only required where the development proposed straddles the property boundary;
- (iii) the court has determined that owner's consent can be obtained at any time prior to the determination of an application and is not a requirement prior to lodgement;
- (iv) where development is proposed that involves works adjacent to a party wall, conditions will typically be imposed on any consent requiring that all works are carried out within the boundary of the site; and
- (v) the City would benefit from a clear and accessible statement, for example on the City's website, clarifying the requirements of carrying out works associated with a party wall and how it relates to the development application process; and
- (B) the Chief Executive Officer be requested to:
  - create a clear and accessible statement on the City's website clarifying the requirements of carrying out works associated with a party wall and how it relates to the development application process; and
  - (ii) provide an update to Councillors on outcomes via the CEO Update.

## **South Eveleigh Train Workshop Council Submission**

It is resolved that:

#### (A) Council note:

- (i) the South Eveleigh Train Workshop (heritage registered as the Large Erecting Shop) is located in the South Eveleigh precinct, on the site of the former Australian Technology Park;
- (ii) Transport for NSW has prepared a rezoning proposal for the Workshop, aiming to deliver a mixed-use development with commercial and retail uses;
- (iii) the proposal mainly affects only the interior with some minor external works also proposed and is on exhibition for public comment until 24 November 2022;
- (iv) the City's submission to Transport for NSW highlights a number of important improvements to be made to the planned development as outlined below:
  - (a) the City and the Central Sydney Planning Committee (CSPC) should be returned as the consent authority for all development in the South Eveleigh precinct;
  - (b) a bridge connection between north and south Eveleigh should be considered;
  - (c) the proposal does not adequately respect the heritage significance of the site and its individual components;
  - (d) the floor space should be reduced and the voids increased to improve interpretation of the heritage internal fabric of the building;
  - (e) ensure the original spatial conception of the building can be read, meaning aligning voids with the original doors and no new opening are provided in the main southern façade;
  - (f) commit to delivering a significant quantum of affordable commercial floor space on the site for small business, start-ups and creative industries; and
  - identify local infrastructure needs beyond the site boundaries and reflect these in a local infrastructure schedule developed in close consultation with the City;

(v) the REDWatch community group has been a strong force advocating for the bridge connection and for the scale and purpose of the heritage workshop to be respected and preserved; and

(vi) this proposal effectively aligns with such community sentiment, actualising their efforts of advocacy.
