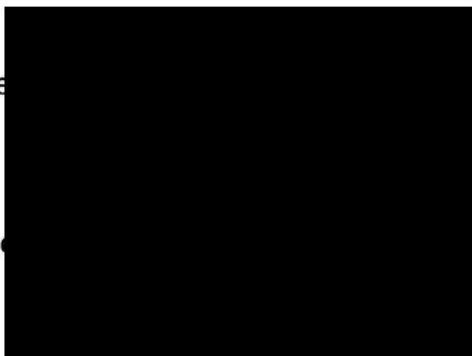

In accordance with clause 4.28 of the City's Code of Conduct and Part 16 of the Code of Meeting Practice, Councillors are required to disclose the nature of the interest when declaring pecuniary and non-pecuniary conflicts of interests.

The nature of the interest would include specifically naming the sector, entity or individual that is the subject of the declaration rather than simply stating that a sector, entity or individual is contained within a report.

Code of Conduct 5.11 - *If you determine that you have a non-pecuniary conflict of interest in a matter that is not significant and does not require further action, when disclosing the interest you must also explain in writing why you consider that the non-pecuniary conflict of interest is not significant and does not require further action in the circumstances*

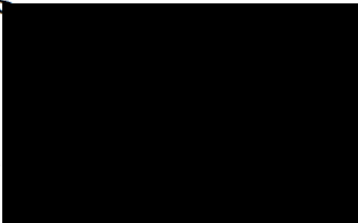
