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Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander statement

Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander communities in the City of Sydney were extensively consulted more than a decade ago to inform Sustainable Sydney 2030 and this consultation continues today.

The First Peoples Dialogue Forum was an integral part of the community engagement process to ensure that Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander voices were influential in developing Sustainable Sydney 2030 - 2050 Continuing the Vision. The Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Advisory Panel was also briefed and invited to participate in workshops and forums.

The City of Sydney is committed to listening to, working with and elevating the voices of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples in the city. We acknowledge the harmful impact of colonisation and government policies is still impacting on the city's Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples. It has led to intergenerational trauma and disadvantage in housing, education, health and wellbeing.

By addressing housing affordability, cost of living and gentrification, we will work to prevent further displacement of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples. The City of Sydney understands that these past injustices affect us all as a nation and must be addressed in consultation with Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples.

We recognise that the British occupation of the shores of Warrane, Sydney Harbour which began in 1788 had far-reaching and devastating impacts on the Eora nation. Longstanding ways of life were disrupted by invasion and the Aboriginal peoples' Country, lands and waterways appropriated.

Today Sydney is of prime importance as an ongoing centre for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander communities, cultures, traditions and histories.

Despite the destructive impact of this invasion, Aboriginal cultures have endured and are now globally recognised as one of the world's oldest living cultures. Aboriginal people have shown and continue to show, enormous resilience coupled with generosity of spirit towards other peoples with whom they now share their land.

The City of Sydney strives to reflect the needs and aspirations of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander communities and supports their quest for self-determination. By understanding the harsh truth of our shared past, we are laying the groundwork for a future that embraces all Australians, a future based on genuine engagement, mutual respect and shared responsibility for our land.

The ongoing custodianship of the Gadigal of the Eora Nation is an essential part of this future, as is Sydney's continuing place as central to Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander cultures and communities.

We are working to embed principles that acknowledge the continuing cultural connection to, and care for Country by Aboriginal peoples. The principles aim to provide a new way to think about our responsibilities to the land, to heal and nurture it for future generations.

There are many sites across our local area with historical and cultural significance for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander communities. We have documented many of these in Barani / Barrabugu (Yesterday/ tomorrow), a free guide to Sydney's Aboriginal histories.

The City of Sydney works with and has achieved much with Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples and the Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Advisory Panel since 2008. These gains are consistent with the principles of cooperation signed between us and the Metropolitan Local Aboriginal Land Council in 2006. Here are some milestones:

2011 As part of the Eora journey project we committed to fund and install seven artworks by Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander artists in public areas. It is part of our commitment to celebrate the living culture of First Nations Australians.

2015 We adopted an inaugural Innovate reconciliation action plan in partnership with Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples as part of our deep commitment to reconciliation.

2016 We adopted the 10-year Eora journey economic development plan.

2020 A stretch reconciliation action plan built on our success and extended our actions. It includes targets to increase employment of Aboriginal peoples, spending with businesses, cultural learning activities for all staff and major public works such as the harbour walk and bara, an artwork and monument to the Eora people.

Our actions and commitments will help to ensure the political, economic, social and cultural rights of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples are embedded in subsequent economic, social, environmental and cultural change.

Message from the Lord Mayor

We have all experienced another year impacted by the Covid-19 pandemic.

The City of Sydney and its communities are taking steps toward recovery but we continue to face many challenges. While travel and health restrictions have been lifted, supply chain disruptions, labour shortages, rising cost of living and exceptionally wet weather have all impacted our recovery efforts and our short-term economic future.

With Australia's borders reopening and international students returning, we have continued our support for this community holding networking events, career workshops and an international student employment panel.

To spur on the revitalisation of our city and its economy, we have focused on encouraging visitors and workers to come into our city through events, grant support and installations in our public spaces.

We ran a 'Your city is waiting for you' marketing campaign to revitalise the city centre, inviting residents, workers and students back into the city centre to eat, drink, dwell, see and shop. This major campaign, funded by the \$20 million CBD revitalisation partnership with NSW Government, included videos, photo galleries and guides for things to do in the city, such as 'the best places for after-work drinks'.

We finished construction to permanently convert the southern end of George Street to a pedestrian boulevard, as part of creating 9,000m² of extra pedestrianised space for walking, sitting and dining. Work is largely complete on extending the boulevard from Bathurst Street to Railway Square. A new pedestrian area on Devonshire Street between Chalmers and Elizabeth Streets is already attracting applications for outdoor dining in this space.

We've extended fee waivers for outdoor dining to June 2023 to support the hospitality sector and the city's economic recovery. Since we

began waiving fees for outdoor dining in new spaces in November 2020, \$5.4 million in footway dining fees have been waived and 478 applications have been approved, including for 1,787sqm of reallocated road space.

From January to March we ran the Sydney Summer Streets program, following a program of roving entertainment to reactivate the centre of our city and villages which began in October.

Over the summer months 6 village high streets were closed to vehicles, employing 170 musicians and performers and providing space for communities to re-engage with close to 150 local businesses. A series of place-based festivals were also supported by the City of Sydney. This year we provided \$5.7 million in grants for major events – the most in 4 years.

In addition we provided \$485,120 in night-time diversification and live performance grants to 26 businesses to help boost the diversity of our nightlife. It's pleasing that many of the recommendations we made were included in the Liquor Amendment (24-hour Economy) Bill 2020. These reforms will enable later trading shops and businesses, more small-scale cultural activities and better sound management for nightlife and live music venues, which will be important to the post-pandemic recovery.

The City of Sydney also offered new precinct activation grants, which encourage collaborative partnerships between businesses, creatives and communities that renew and transform our city centre, local precincts and neighbourhoods.

In May, a new City of Sydney funded public artwork, 'bara', located on the Tarpeian Lawn above Tubowghule (Bennelong Point) in the Botanic Gardens was launched with a community celebration. The sculpture by artist Judy Watson references fishing hooks used by Gadigal people and has formalised a site for cultural practice, reflection and celebration next to the harbour, as part of the Yananurala art and culture trail.

Two temporary artworks were installed in laneways off George Street to help activate the city as part of the City Art temporary laneway program. A third artwork the 'Barlow Street Forest' displaying remnant Eastern Suburbs Banksia Scrub has become a permanent pocket of green in the city.

In June we adopted a new vision for the city, Sustainable Sydney 2030–2050 Continuing the Vision and a new community strategic plan, Delivering Sustainable Sydney 2030–2050. These plans renew our focus on our goal for a sustainable and equitable future, including the provision of more affordable housing.

Local government elections which had been delayed from September 2020, were held in December 2021. I look forward to working with our new council to meet the challenges that lie ahead for our city and our many communities.

Thank you for your patience and understanding as some City services were affected by Covid-19 this year. I assure you we have done all we can to ensure services were consistent while we increased efforts to support the community through this challenging time.

I thank our dedicated City staff, under the wonderful leadership of CEO Monica Barone, who have risen to the many serious challenges over the last 12 months, ensuring our city will not only survive Covid-19, but recover and thrive once more.

Message from the CEO

This year we continued to adapt and respond to the unfolding pandemic and changing health orders. We offered our services and programs face-to-face, online or in hybrid fashion to provide the best services we could. We continue to adjust our services in response to the ongoing impact of Covid-19 on staff, operations, safety and business continuity. I appreciate the patience of our community during this time and the enthusiasm of our staff in adapting to the changing conditions. We continued to support vulnerable communities impacted by Covid-19. We did that through providing community emergency quick response grants, distributing cloth masks and rapid antigen tests, as well as food relief donations to OzHarvest, Foodbank and SecondBite. A total of 32,348 food hampers, 49,401 meals, 8,470 bags of fresh fruit and vegetables, and 29,477 kilograms of requested products were distributed through a network of 60 local services and businesses. As well the City of Sydney delivered 48,086 meals through its meals on wheels program, the most in 4 years.

In a sign that some normality has returned, community access to our services is picking up.

This year library membership and attendances increased. Attendances at our City of Sydney venues and spaces doubled from 66,949 to 125,212 even though many of these were closed for the first 3 months of the year. We continue to make progress towards making our operations more sustainable, including:

- deploying our first fully electric commercial vehicle and working on a strategy for the increased uptake of more energy efficient vehicles
- installing solar PV panels at Perry Park bringing the total on City of Sydney rooftops to about 2,300 kW and generating over 3,000 MWh of clean energy a year

- taking part in programs to include crushed recycled glass and other recycled products into road building
- working closely with Ausgrid to complete the change-over of Ausgrid-owned residential street lighting to energy-efficient LEDs. Over 3,000 light fittings have been upgraded to LED, reducing the City's electrical consumption by approximately 750 MWh a year, representing 2.5% of the City's grid electricity use
- establishing 2 new volunteer bushcare groups at Sydney Park and the Nurses Memorial Garden, Camperdown with a third group proposed for the Annandale / Glebe area
- hosting a community planting event at Sydney Park where over 200 community members planted 2,000 native tubestock
- helping to increase canopy cover in the city by planting 786 street trees and 254 park trees, and inroad planting in Bunn Street, Ultimo. Over 67,000 new plants were planted in City of Sydney parks and street gardens with key planting sites being Hyde Park, Cook and Phillip Park, Jubilee Park, Gunyama Park and Sydney Park, and in Green Square, Paddington and Woolloomooloo, and
- adopting the Greening Sydney Strategy in July 2021.

The Green Square Town Centre has been awarded a 6 Green Star rating for Communities by the Green Building Council of Australia. The rating recognises the sustainability attributes of planning, design and construction of large-scale development projects at a community scale. It is the highest possible rating, denoting 'world leadership'.

This year our total greenhouse gas emissions from our operations fell totalled 12,139 tCO₂e, representing a drop of 77% against our baseline. Our goal is reduce emissions by 80% from a 2006 baseline of 52,972 tCO₂e by 2025. Potable water use from our operations was 292ML this year from 335ML in 2020/21.

Statutory Returns 2021/22

This year the City of Sydney renewed 14,687 m² of footway and provided 1,500 m² of new granite paving. Our fast tracked public works program is underway, with wider footpaths, new trees and street furniture on George Street between Rawson Place and Pitt Street; and in Hay Street, Ultimo Road and Thomas Street. The business innovation space (currently under construction at 182 George Street) and known as 'Greenhouse', continues to progress. Through a 10-year rental subsidy arrangement the space will provide 3,800 sqm of affordable space to startups and scaleups focused on tech solutions to benefit the environment. We continued our digital development program and implemented many new IT solutions, including several award-winning solutions, and improved the digital experience for our community. Following the December 2021 election we welcomed a new council and conducted an induction program to ensure all councillors were provided with the information they need to

perform their civic duties and meet our legislative obligations. Continuing to deliver our services has not been without its challenges throughout this year. Further waves in the Covid-19 pandemic caused some service disruptions in waste collections, backlogs in our public swimming pool inspection program and boarding house/backpacker inspection program. We introduced a risk management element to our new governance, risk and compliance system to help our staff better assess, treat, record, report, monitor and review risks, not just within their area, but also across the wider organisation. The Register of Delegations from CEO to Director and Staff was reviewed and updated in June 2022.

- Greater Cities Commission.




Figure 2. City of Sydney local government area

Defining Sydney

The City of Sydney (or the **City**) is the organisation, responsible for the administration of the local government area.

The Council is the elected Councillors of the City of Sydney. The most recent election was held on 4 December 2021 and the current term will run until September 2024.

The city is the geographical area administered by the City of Sydney and its physical elements. It is made up of 33 suburbs wholly or partly within our local government area boundary.

The city centre is the Sydney central business district and includes major civic functions, government offices, and cultural and entertainment assets. It runs between Circular Quay and Central station, the Domain / Hyde Park and Darling Harbour.

Eastern City District as defined by the Greater Cities Commission, is “the engine room of Greater Sydney’s economy”. The City of Sydney area is within the Eastern City District. The district also includes these local government areas: Bayside, Burwood, Canada Bay, Inner West, Randwick, Strathfield, Waverly, and Woollahra.

Greater Sydney, or **metropolitan Sydney**, extends from Wyong and Gosford in the north to the Royal National Park in the south and follows the coastline in between. Towards the west, the region includes the Blue Mountains, Wollondilly and Hawkesbury. Greater Sydney covers 12,368 square kilometres.

About the City of Sydney

The City of Sydney – roles and responsibilities

The City of Sydney is a local government organisation governed by the requirements of the *Local Government Act (1993)* and Regulation, the *City of Sydney Act (1988)* and other relevant legislative provisions.

Council policy, strategic directions and major corporate decisions are determined by the elected Council, chaired by the Lord Mayor. Day to day operations are largely delegated to the Chief Executive Officer or managed in conjunction with the Lord Mayor, as provided for in council resolutions and delegations, and in accordance with relevant legislation.

The Local Government Act includes principles for local government which identify the matters councils need to consider when carrying out their responsibilities. While following these guiding principles, in reality councils have a range of roles – as a leader, service provider, regulator, advocator, facilitator and educator.

Councils have a responsibility to formulate and pursue their community’s vision and ideas, provide civic leadership, deliver key services and express local ideas and concerns about important issues to other levels of government.

There are services that all councils must provide, and some that councils can choose to make available. Many services are also provided by different NSW and federal agencies, such as public transport, hospitals, and education. There are new policy approaches that influence or direct the City’s responses, and legislation that affects the provision of current services.

The City’s roles extend beyond the delivery of services to advocating for an equitable allocation of resources from the NSW and federal governments.

The chart below shows the City’s organisational structure and senior executive. The directors lead the provision of key services and delivery of programs and projects to achieve the community’s vision.




Figure 3. City of Sydney organisation structure

The integrated planning and reporting framework

Integrated planning and reporting (IP&R) is one of the principles of the Local Government Act.

The integrated planning and reporting framework for NSW councils was introduced by the NSW Government in 2009 and applies to all councils in the state.

IP&R gives the City a framework for identifying the priorities of its many communities and creating a holistic approach to planning to achieve those goals in a sustainable way, given the resources available.

Using this framework, the City has prepared a number of plans which detail how we intend to deliver on the communities' priorities identified through consultation and engagement and articulated in the community strategic plan.

The diagram below illustrates our IP&R framework suite of documents and how they are interrelated. It is adapted from the NSW Office of Local Government Guidelines, available from olg.nsw.gov.au

The IP&R framework provides the mechanism for the implementation of our community strategic plan – the highest-level plan within this framework. This year the plan was reviewed after extensive community consultation and in June 2022 the Council adopted the Community Strategic Plan Delivering Sustainable Sydney 2030-2050 (also referred to as the community strategic plan).




Figure 4. Integrated planning and reporting framework diagram, adapted from Office of Local Government

How the documents relate

The suite of integrated planning documents represents the City of Sydney's response to the statutory framework for planning and reporting.

The community strategic plan is the highest level plan that the City will prepare. It was developed with, and on behalf of, the communities we serve. It identifies the community's main priorities and aspirations and guides all our other strategies and plans which help us to achieve these.

It takes a long-term view, identifying issues and opportunities to be addressed in the city over the next 3 decades. We update this plan every 4 years, in line with government requirements, and to adapt to changing circumstances and community aspirations. The community strategic plan is structured around 10 strategic directions.

The delivery program acts as the link between the long term community strategic plan and the annual operational plan.

The City's delivery program identifies the actions we will take over 4 years that support the community strategic plan outcomes. The delivery program structure reflects the community strategic plan with activities aligned with the 10 strategic directions.

Our operational plan is an annual plan with more details of individual activities. It sets out the specific projects, programs and activities to be delivered in the year ahead and is aligned with our delivery program. It also includes the City's revenue policy for rates and annual charges, the fees and charges schedule, and other relevant budgetary information.

The IP&R framework includes a reporting process to communicate how we are progressing to the Council and the community. We do this through half-yearly, annual and four-yearly performance reports and quarterly and yearly financial reports to council.

The City's annual report consists of 3 components – financial statements, statutory returns (this document) and our operational plan performance report which are all at cityofsydney.nsw.gov.au

Resourcing the plan

To support the community's objectives expressed in the community strategic plan a long-term resourcing strategy is required as part of the IP&R framework.

The resourcing strategy ensures the City of Sydney has adequate resources to achieve the planned outcomes for which it is responsible, while maintaining the long-term sustainability of the organisation.

The resourcing strategy spans a period of 10 years and has 5 components:

1. Long term financial plan

The long term financial plan is a 10 year plan that identifies current and future financial capacity to act on the aspirations of the community strategic plan, including providing high quality services, facilities and infrastructure to the community.

2. People (workforce) strategy

The people strategy identifies the City of Sydney's current and future workforce needs. The plan ensures the City of Sydney workforce has the capacity and capability to create the outcomes in the community strategic plan.

3. Community asset management plan

The asset management plan is a plan to ensure appropriate standards for maintenance and renewal of key assets, detailing status and resource requirements. These assets are valued at approximately \$13 billion (including land) under City of Sydney care and control.

4. Information and technology strategy

This plan sets the information and technology direction and priorities that are aligned with the community strategic plan, community needs and government information and data policies. The plan guides information and technology related decision making, priorities and investment.

5. Community engagement strategy

The community engagement strategy sets out a framework for how we consult diverse communities and collaborate, involve and empower communities to take part in shaping the future of our city.

The resourcing strategy should be read in conjunction with the delivery program and the operational plan to identify the resourcing needs for our activities.

Councillors' expenses

Local Government (General) Regulation 2021

Clause 217 (1) (a1)

Payment of expenses and provision of facilities during the year

The City of Sydney has a Councillors' Expenses and Facilities Policy that governs the expenses paid and facilities provided to the Lord Mayor, Deputy Lord Mayor and other councillors in their civic duties.

Annual fees were paid to all councillors as required by the Local Government Act 1993 and in line with the determination of the Local Government Remuneration Tribunal on 23 April 2021. The total amount paid to all councillors for 2021/22 was \$627,727.

In 2021/22, the cost of expenses and facilities provided to councillors was \$3,880,336. This includes domestic travel expenses such as accommodation and registration fees for seminars and conferences, as well as office administration such as postage, meals and refreshments. It also includes staff salaries and salary on-costs totalling \$3,821,491.

Details of particular categories of expenditure are as follows:

(i) The cost of the provision of dedicated office equipment allocated to councillors on a personal basis was \$1,195.54.

(ii) Telephone calls made by councillors, including mobile telephones provided by the City and from the landline telephones and facsimile services installed in councillors' homes totalled \$15,509.17.

(iii) The cost of the attendance of councillors at conferences and seminars was \$9,825.17.

(iv) Expenditure on the training of councillors and the provision of skill development for councillors was \$17,030.15.

(v) The cost of interstate visits undertaken by councillors while representing the City, including the cost of transport, the cost of accommodation and other out-of-pocket travelling expenses was \$0.

(vi) The cost of overseas visits undertaken by councillors while representing the City, including the cost of transport, the cost of accommodation and other out-of-pocket travelling expenses was \$0.

(vii) The expenses of any spouse, partner or other person who accompanied a councillor in the performance of their civic functions totalled \$0. These are expenses payable under guidelines for the payment of expenses and the provision of facilities for mayors and councillors for local councils in NSW prepared by the Director-General from time to time.

(viii) The expenses involved in the provision of care for a child, or an immediate family member of a councillor, to allow the councillor to undertake their civic functions totalled \$1,359.47.

Legal proceedings

Local Government (General) Regulation 2021

Clause 217 (1) (a3)

Legal proceedings

In 2021/22, expenses incurred by the City of Sydney for legal proceedings taken by or against the council were as below. This includes amounts, costs and expenses paid or received as out of court settlements, apart from those with terms that are not to be disclosed.

Below is a summary of the state of progress of each legal proceeding and the result if it has been finalised.

Enforcement

Enforcement proceedings include civil or criminal enforcement proceedings begun by the City in the Land and Environment Court or Local Court. These proceedings usually arise from a failure to obtain or comply with development approval or a failure to comply with an order issued by the City. Examples include unauthorised works, unauthorised uses of land, or failure to comply with an order such as an order to upgrade fire safety. The City also initiates food safety prosecutions for unhealthy food premises.

Appeals against orders issued by the City

When the City issues an order or other regulatory notice the recipient can challenge this in the Land and Environment Court. In 2021/22, 6 orders issued by the City were the subject of appeals to the Land and Environment

Court and one appeal was ongoing at the end of 2021/22.

A further six appeals were lodged in relation to building certificates and one was ongoing at the end of 2021/22. Ten order appeals were resolved in 2021/22.

Of these, 9 were discontinued and one order was revoked.

One appeal against a refusal to grant a tree pruning permit was commenced and discontinued in 2021/22.

Civil enforcement proceedings

In 2021/22, the City started 2 civil enforcement proceedings in the Land and Environment Court seeking to either enforce a City order or obtain an order from the Court requiring compliance with a condition of consent. Both matters were settled by consent orders.

Criminal enforcement proceedings

In 2021/22, the City was involved in 1 prosecution in the Local Court.

Enforcement of penalty notices

If the recipient of a penalty notice issued by a City officer disputes the matter in the Court, Revenue NSW starts proceedings in the Local Court in the City's name and the City is informed. For fines other than parking penalty notices, the City's Legal Services unit reviews the penalty notice and if it appears to have been issued correctly, continues the proceedings.

If the penalty notice does not appear correct, the City withdraws the proceedings. Local Court parking cases are dealt with by police prosecutors except in exceptional circumstances and are not included in this report.

In 2021/22, the City was involved in 4 cases where the recipient of a penalty notice (not parking) disputed the offence. The City withdrew 2 cases and 2 cases were ongoing at the end of 2021/22.

Planning

Planning determinations of the City may be the subject of an appeal to the Land and Environment Court. Planning appeals can arise when the City refuses, or deems to refuse, consent for a desired use or works at a premises. They can also arise from an appeal against conditions imposed on applicants as part of a development approval.

In 2021/22, 22 planning appeals were lodged in the Land and Environment Court against the City. There were 30 appeals finalised during the year, as follows:

- 17 appeals were resolved by a s34 agreement on amended plans or amended conditions at or after a conciliation conference
- 2 appeals were dismissed in favour of the City
- 5 appeals upheld by the Court in favour of the applicant on amended plans and conditions
- 6 appeals were discontinued by the applicant.

There were 10 planning appeals yet to be finalised at the end of 2021/22.

If a party is dissatisfied with the outcome of a planning appeal it has a limited right of appeal to a Judge of the Land and Environment Court under s56A of the *Land and Environment Court Act 1979*. In 2021/22, the City was the respondent in 3 s56A appeals: 1 appeal was dismissed and the other 2 discontinued by the applicant.

Other proceedings

NSW Civil Administrative Tribunal

One discrimination complaint was lodged with the NSW Civil and Administrative Tribunal in 2021/22 and was dismissed.

Representations at coronial enquiries or inquests

The City's lawyers represent the City when a coronial inquiry or inquest is held into a death in the local government area and its regulatory or planning functions may be of interest to the coroner or if it is otherwise involved. Examples include if a person dies due to a fault in the building or in a fire.

In 2021/22, the City was not involved in any coronial inquests.

Compulsory acquisition proceedings

There was 1 compulsory acquisition proceeding in 2020/21 which was settled by consent orders.

Contempt of court

There were no contempt of court matters in 2021/22.

Judicial review

One judicial review matter on a decision by the Local Planning Panel to grant development consent was dismissed in 2021/22 and listed for hearing in the Court of Appeal in 2022/23. One judicial review matter relating to the validity of a gateway determination was commenced in 2020/21 and discontinued by the applicant in 2021/22.

Rates recovery

In 2021/22, there were no cases where action was taken to recover outstanding rates by the commencement of proceedings.

Public liability claims

In 2021/22 there were 14 proceedings brought against the City alleging negligence and seeking compensation for either property damage or personal injury. Of the 14 matters, 7 matters were finalised as follows:

- 1 matter was settled in favour of the Plaintiff
- 2 matters were finalised by all parties signing a confidential agreement and the matter with the proceedings being discontinued or dismissed

- 3 matters were settled with judgment in favour of the City
- a matter in which the City was joined as a Cross Defendant by one of the two Defendants, was settled by agreement between the Plaintiff and the Defendants with the Cross Claim against the City being dismissed.

Eight matters were ongoing at the end of 2021/22.




Figure 10. Walking in Hyde Park, Sydney (Photo by Mark Metcalfe / City of Sydney)

City West Housing Pty Ltd

City West Housing is a community housing provider that develops and manages affordable housing. It was established in 1994 to provide affordable housing in the Ultimo – Pyrmont redevelopment area.

The operational areas of City West Housing have expanded over the years to provide affordable housing all over the local government area. Funding sources for City West's operations include developer contributions collected by the City for the purpose of providing affordable housing.

The City is one of 8 preference shareholders, with the NSW Minister for Social Housing and the NSW Treasurer the two ordinary shareholders.

City Recital Hall Ltd

City Recital Hall opened in 1999 as a purpose-built chamber music venue with a capacity of 1,246. It is the only such venue in Sydney, serving companies such as Musica Viva Australia, Australian Chamber Orchestra, Sydney Symphony Orchestra, Pinchgut Opera and Australian Brandenburg Orchestra.

In 2015, the City endorsed the establishment of not-for-profit organisation, City Recital Hall Ltd, to be constituted as a public company. The City established a governance structure, a company constitution, appointed company directors and established the City Recital Hall Ltd Board.

The City has provided financial support to the City Recital Hall Ltd for six years. Their latest five-year funding agreement and sublease expires in June 2025.

A City representative participates on the risk and audit committee of City Recital Hall Ltd.

Resilient Sydney

The Resilient Sydney program is a collaboration of all 33 metropolitan councils of Sydney with the NSW Government, business and the community and aligned to the Resilient Cities Network. Resilient Sydney has been hosted by the City of Sydney since 2015. The program is funded by the local governments of Greater Sydney.

The global Resilient Cities Network emerged in September 2019, following on from the 100 Resilient Cities Program. The network is a global city-led non-profit organisation that brings together knowledge, practice, partnerships, and funding to empower cities to help them build a safe, equitable and sustainable future for all.

The organisation works together with city based chief resilience officers, mobilising communities, city governments, urban practitioners, and partners to deliver impact-driven resilience strategies and projects. Resilient Cities Network is comprised of 98 member cities in 40 countries. Regional offices are based in Singapore, London, Mexico City and New York. The network is funded by the Rockefeller Foundation and other partners.

In July 2018 the Resilient Sydney strategy was released. The strategy was developed with an unprecedented level of collaboration across Sydney. The process involved all 33 metropolitan councils in consultation with over 1,000 residents and 100 businesses, government and community organisations over three years of effort. The strategy with five directions and 35 actions is in active implementation through a Resilience Ambassadors network of local government and partnerships with government, business and the community sectors.

A steering committee was established in 2016 to guide the program. The committee has local government representatives from the planning districts of Sydney including the City of Sydney, the Greater Sydney Commission, Resilience NSW, the NSW Department of Planning and Environment, the Office of Energy and Climate Change in NSW Treasury and business and community representatives. The strategy identifies the key risks facing metropolitan Sydney and provides a roadmap for collaborative action to ensure our city is inclusive, connected and resilient.

As a member of the Resilient Cities Network, Resilient Sydney gains:

- Access to world’s best practice knowledge and practitioners on strategic city resilience planning.
- Capacity building for city staff through attending and engaging in global and regional city focussed events to share best practice in urban resilience.
- Access and support to use methodologies and resilience tools aligned to or provided by the network.
- Access to potential global and local partners in business and philanthropy with an interest in investing or funding city resilience activities.

Other collaborative / cooperative arrangements

Throughout the year the City also worked with others in collaboration and cooperation to achieve shared outcomes. Details of those arrangements are below:

The food regulation partnership

The City has a partnership with the NSW Food Authority.

The partnership’s objectives are:

- clarify the responsibilities of enforcement agencies for food regulation
- improve food safety coordination between enforcement agencies, including food inspections
- provide faster responses to food emergencies and food recalls

- enable all enforcement agencies to recover the costs of food regulation enforcement
- provide a food regulation forum for consultation with enforcement agencies and the retail food sector.

This partnership guides food regulation across NSW by providing a consistent reporting approach and staff training for monitoring and enforcing food safety.

University of Sydney and the University of Technology memorandum of understanding

The City has established memoranda of understanding (MOU) with the University of Sydney and the University of Technology, Sydney.

These MOUs align with the objectives of the City’s vision and the strategic directions of each institution. This establishes a collaborative and visible partnership around areas of shared mutual interest. It includes a shared commitment to a sustainable, globally connected Sydney with vibrant, diverse precincts of liveable, learning and strong communities where each person can realise their potential, whatever their social or cultural background.

The agreements focus on project and research partnerships; professional development opportunities; student learning opportunities; sustainability partnerships; data exploration; and city and urban planning.

High-level steering committees consisting of the City of Sydney and university representatives develop annual programs of projects based on identified priority areas of mutual interest.

Coordination is initially managed through the City and task groups established on a project-by-project basis.

Welcoming Cities Network

Welcoming Cities is a national and global network of cities that are committed to communities where everyone can belong and participate in social, economic and civic life. Members have unprecedented access to a community of like-minded local councils through knowledge-sharing, the development of partnerships, and sharing and celebrating successes.

This is an initiative of the Scanlon Foundation and Welcome to Australia, in partnership with Welcoming America.

Sydney Tourism Information Partnership

The Sydney Tourism Information Partnership was a partnership agreement between Destination NSW, Property NSW and City of Sydney to collaborate on tourism related projects to promote visitation to Sydney. This partnership produced the Official Guide to Sydney and the Sydney Map. The partnership was suspended and then dissolved in December 2021 due to the pandemic and the reduced need for such printed collateral. Partners will recommence discussions about the next iteration of this partnership in late 2022.

Sydney Visitor Collective

The Sydney Visitor Collective is a collaboration of tourism stakeholders hosted by Australian Tourism Export Council. Members include Hammons Holding, Taronga Zoo, Sydney Opera House, Merlin Entertainments, Captain Cook Cruises, Big Bus Tours, Trippas White Group, Solotel, Australian Tourism Export Council, NRMA, ACCOR Hotels, TFE Hotels and the City of Sydney. The group collaborates on projects and information sharing to support a quality experience for visitors to Sydney. The focus over the year was on driving domestic visitation, recovery and planning for when the international borders reopened.

Sustainable destination partnership

The Sustainable Destination Partnership is a collaboration with a number of Sydney's leading accommodation and entertainment providers. The partnership aims to improve the sustainability performance of existing accommodation and entertainment sector buildings across Sydney's local government area.

The partnership delivers resources and tools to tackle the challenges facing the sector and helps Sydney become recognised as one of the world's top sustainable cities in the annual Global Destination Sustainability Index.

The partner members are: Accor Hotels, Amora Hotel, Art Gallery NSW, Australian Museum, Australian National Maritime Museum, Fox Studios Australia, The Grace Sydney, Hilton Sydney, Hyatt Regency Sydney, Holiday Inn Darling Harbour, Holiday Inn Old Sydney, Holiday Inn Potts Point, Intercontinental Sydney, ICC Sydney, The Langham Sydney, Marriott Sydney Harbour, Merlin Entertainments, Museum of Applied Arts and Sciences, Museum of Contemporary Art Australia, Park Royal Sydney, Pier One Sydney Harbour, Schwartz Family Company, Shangri-La Sydney, Sheraton Grand Sydney, The Star, State Library NSW, Sydney Fish Markets, Sydney Living Museums, Sydney Opera House, TFE Hotels and YHA Australia. Associate members are: Business Events Sydney, Earthcheck, Green Building Council of Australia, Good Compass, Griffith University, My Green Butler, NABERS, OzHarvest, Property Council of Australia, Supply Chain Sustainability School, Tourism Accommodation Australia and Tourism Transport Forum.

Camperdown – Ultimo (Tech Central) Innovation Precinct Alliance

The Camperdown – Ultimo area is recognised by the Greater Cities Commission as a specialised collaboration precinct. A place strategy for the area has been developed by Greater Cities Commission and adopted by the NSW Government. During the year it was relaunched as the Tech Central innovation precinct.

The Camperdown – Ultimo Collaboration Area Alliance (now known as the Tech Central Alliance) is a self-organised group of key partners in the precinct, including representatives from education, health, government, the creative sector and business. The Alliance collaborates with the Greater Cities Commission, Transport for NSW as one of the major land and asset owners in the area, and the broader ecosystem to explore opportunities to maximise the potential of the innovation precinct as a driver of Sydney's productivity and competitiveness.

The group meets regularly to lead the implementation and monitoring of the place strategy through the development of the Tech Central innovation precinct.

Joint use of facilities memorandum of understanding with NSW Department of Education

Under the 2017 Memorandum of Understanding for Joint Use Projects between the City of Sydney and the NSW Department of Education, 3 agreements are in place for joint use of sporting facilities and community spaces. These agreements are in the form of project development deeds and cover: Alexandria Park Community School and Alexandria Park, Inner Sydney High School and Prince Alfred Park and Green Square School and Community Spaces.

The redevelopment of the Alexandria Park Community School, due for completion in late 2022, will provide for shared use of a new competition-size sports field, 2 outdoor multi-purpose sports courts, a multi-purpose indoor sports hall and amenities. Shared sports facilities at the Inner Sydney High School include an indoor gymnasium, fitness training areas and associated amenities. The project was completed in late 2020.

The Green Square School and Community Spaces is under construction in the Green Square Community and Cultural Precinct, Zetland. The project is being jointly funded by the City and the Department of Education and comprises a 600-place primary school integrated with facilities designed for both school and community use, including a community hall, a multi-purpose court, courtyard and multi-purpose community spaces. Completion is expected by mid-2024.

SSROC Procure Recycled – Paving the Way initiative

Under the Procure Recycled memorandum of understanding, which focuses on working together to develop a framework for regional procurement of recycled material in infrastructure, the City, along with 15 other councils, participated in the Southern Sydney Regional Organisation of Councils' Paving the Way coordinated tender for sustainable road construction materials. The tender, which was the largest council-led procurement of its type in NSW, aggregated demand and created a closed-loop market for around one third of kerbside domestic glass per year as a substitute for natural sand and was finalised in 2021. The City continues to utilise the arrangement.

Regional waste strategy group

The City has been progressing the ongoing work with the SSROC and 11 of its participating councils to implement its regional waste strategy and actions. A focus for this past year has been assessing the implications for councils in the region of implementing a food, or combined food and garden, collection service in response to the NSW Government mandate for source separation of food in the recently released Waste and Sustainable Materials Strategy 2041. The project considered impacts to waste collection services, assessment of treatment technology options and necessary regional infrastructure requirements.

Advocacy continues to be a key function of the working group and last year it commissioned law firm Clayton Utz to review barriers and opportunities in the current NSW legislative and regulatory framework and provide recommendations on critical reforms to facilitate improved circular economy outcomes. The work was used to inform councils' responses to the recent NSW EPA independent review of the Resource Recovery Framework.

The group also recently completed a report on pathways for used clothing collection that is designed to help councils better understand the textiles recovery market and to help identify opportunities for different types of collection and reprocessing services.

Sydney Harbour and Cooks River coastal zone management plan

The development of the Sydney Harbour and Cooks River coastal zone management plans continued. These plans will provide a coordinated management framework for the local councils (including the City of Sydney), NSW government agencies (approximately 11) and 2 Commonwealth government agencies who have a stake in improving the future health of Sydney Harbour, Cooks River and their catchments.

The Sydney Harbour study follows the successful completion in 2015 of the water quality improvement plan for Sydney Harbour and the coastal zone management plan scoping study for Sydney Harbour. The Cooks River plan builds on previous work by the Cooks River Alliance. In 2 separate memorandums of understanding, 1 for Sydney Harbour and 1 for Cooks River, the City is involved in the development of the management plans. These plans are a requirement under the State Environmental Planning Policy (Coastal Management) 2018.

Green Square town centre water treatment plant

The City has entered into a contractual agreement with Sydney Water to operate the Green Square Town Centre water treatment plant. This agreement may in the future form part of the City's broader strategic partnership with Sydney Water looking to increase recycled water production within the LGA.

Better Buildings Partnership

The Better Buildings Partnership is a collaboration of a number of Sydney's leading public, private and institutional landlords. The partnership aims to improve the sustainability performance of existing commercial and public sector buildings across Sydney's local government area.

The partnership delivers resources and tools to tackle the challenges facing the commercial property sector and help Sydney become one of the world's top sustainable cities. The current members are: AMP Capital Investors, Brookfield Office Properties Australia, Charter Hall, the City of Sydney, Colonial First State, DEXUS Property Group, Frasers Property, the GPT Group, Investa Property Group, Lend Lease, Mirvac, Stockland, the University of Sydney, and the University of Technology, Sydney. The partnership is supported by government and industry members including GBCA, Property Council of Australia and NABERS as well as associate members engaged in property management; JLL, CBRE and Colliers.

CitySwitch Green Office – National Steering Committee

The CitySwitch Green Office national program is a collaboration of leading cities and local councils and other partners in Australia to deliver the CitySwitch program. The program supports office-based businesses committed to improving their energy efficiency with help and assistance to create energy and cost savings and to improve their overall environmental performance.

The current term of the collaboration is 1 July 2021 to 30 June 2022 with a new memorandum of understanding to commence for an evolved net zero program in Sept 2022. The program is governed through a National Steering Committee managed by the City of Sydney. The committee includes: North Sydney Council, City of Melbourne, City of Perth, City of Adelaide and the NSW Government (NABERS).

Residential apartment sustainability reference group

The City has a residential apartments sustainability reference group which has been established since 2011. Its purpose is to achieve better environmental outcomes in new and existing apartment buildings in line with the residential apartments sustainability plan.

Organisations represented include NSW government (Department of Planning, Industry and Environment, NSW Fair Trading), industry (Ausgrid, Jemena, Sydney Water, Facilities Management Australia), community stakeholders (Strata Community Australia, Owners Corporation Network, Green Strata) and the University of NSW.

World Cities Culture Forum

The World Cities Culture Forum provides a way for policymakers in more than 40 member cities to share research and intelligence and explore the vital role of culture in their future prosperity. Forum members collaborate on a program of events including themed symposia, summits and workshops. These events feed into the annual World Cities Culture Summit, which has been held online in 2020 and 2021. Delegates are gathering in person this year (2022) in Helsinki Finland. The feedback from these forums demonstrates the critical role of the cultural sector in supporting recovery and renewal in our cities.

The City of Sydney has also been a beneficiary of the WCCF Leadership Exchange Program (funded by Bloomberg Philanthropies and Google Arts and Culture) to support world cities develop best practices for advancing cultural projects and shaping public policy.

The City's planned exchange with the City of Austin will now take place in September 2022, rescheduled from 2020 due to the pandemic.

Throughout the year the forum was very active providing fortnightly online presentations and regular global updates that are integrated into the City of Sydney's Global Insights data gathering to inform Covid-19 recovery planning.

The City of Sydney, the NSW Department of Communities and Justice and the NSW Land and Housing Corporation

The City of Sydney, the NSW Department of Communities and Justice and the NSW Land and Housing Corporation work together to improve services for at risk and vulnerable residents in our local government area. The 3 organisations work collaboratively across a range of issues including homelessness, early intervention, domestic and family violence, anti-social behaviour, and social housing.

Quarterly meetings are held to provide strategic leadership across shared priority areas. These meetings are held to resolve any current and pending issues that are identified and to plan strategic collaborative responses to improve safety and wellbeing outcomes for vulnerable residents living in the Sydney local government area.

Social housing operational meetings are held on a regular basis between senior staff from the City of Sydney, NSW Department of Communities and Justice and NSW Land and Housing Corporation to respond to issues including cleansing and waste, rodent management and other emerging issues.

TAFE NSW

City Spaces has developed partnership agreements with TAFE NSW to deliver free courses within our community centres to deliver lifelong learning outcomes for community members. This includes English classes for new and older migrants at Ultimo Community Centre.

Music Cities Network

The Music Cities Network is an international network of local government agencies and city-focused music advocacy organisations dedicated to improving communication and cooperation, sharing research and knowledge, exploring policy and influencing city leaders to support music and music industries as key to city making. It is a membership and collaboration based network, currently with 11 member cities and growing. Sydney is a founding member.

In 2023 the network will host its first Music Policymakers Meet-up as part of the Eurosonic conference in Groningen, The Netherlands. This project is aimed at increasing the capacity of policy makers working at a local government level and builds upon existing exchange programs for both music businesses and artists from member cities.

FoodLab Sydney

Foodlab Sydney is a collaboration between the Sydney Environment Institute and UNSW Canberra, the City of Sydney, TAFE NSW and FoodLab Detroit in response to addressing food security and to research and support local food entrepreneurs and residents of the City of Sydney. The City has funded the 3-year pilot program under the knowledge exchange sponsorship program that completed in 2022. 72 participants across 6 cohorts completed the FoodLab Sydney program offering training, mentorship and networking for people to have a career in the food industry.

FoodLab Sydney also became an active member of the City's food operations working group, which involved more than 60 local food relief organisations providing an emergency response during the Covid-19 pandemic.

Foodlab is now establishing itself as a standalone not-for-profit expanding its programs to support and incubate new food entrepreneurs.

Domestic Violence NSW and NSW Police

The City of Sydney in partnership with Domestic Violence NSW and NSW Police coordinates quarterly Domestic and Family Violence forums to support collaboration and coordinate efforts across the sectors working to respond to and reduce violence. This includes the delivery of domestic and family violence prevention and ally training for City residents to build their understanding of gender-based violence, domestic and family violence, where to get help, and how to have safe supportive conversations.

This year's work continued to focus on preparing for, responding to and recovering from disasters in the context of domestic and family violence as well as inclusivity in service responses and reporting.

Department of Communities and Justice – Targeted Earlier Intervention Program (previously Community Builders Program)

In 2021/22 the City delivered programs under a funding agreement with NSW Department of Communities and Justice as part of the Targeted Earlier Intervention program.

The Targeted Earlier Intervention program supports children, young people, families and communities experiencing or at risk of vulnerability. The City is funded under the program's community strengthening stream, for activities that facilitate an increased sense of belonging, community participation and the empowerment and self-determination of communities. City programs and initiatives delivered throughout 2021/22 included the Connect Sydney skills and capacity building program (including a dedicated workshop series for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Peoples and organisations), Youth Week and a youth training and employment program.

Eastern Regional Local Government Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Forum

The City is a member of the Eastern Regional Local Government Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Forum with surrounding councils – Bayside, Inner West, Randwick, Waverley and Woollahra.

These councils make an annual financial contribution to pay a coordinator and support administration of the group. The group meets to network and produce collaborative events to promote reconciliation and increase knowledge of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander cultures including the annual Pauline McLeod Awards.

Intersectoral Homelessness Health Strategy

The Intersectoral Homelessness Health Strategy improves health outcomes for people experiencing homelessness by facilitating a formalised strategic approach to the coordination of planning, delivery and evaluation of homelessness health services.

Partners in the strategy are: South Eastern Sydney Local Health District, Sydney Local Health District, St Vincent's Health Network, Department of Communities and Justice, Central Eastern Sydney Primary Health Network and the City of Sydney.

HART

The Homelessness Assertive Outreach Response Team is made up of NSW Department of Communities and Justice, City of Sydney and specialist health, homelessness, and other non-government services. A collaborative approach between services results in better outcomes for both people sleeping rough and the wider community.

Protocol for support for rough sleepers in an emergency

In June 2015, the City entered into a protocol with the Department of Family and Community Services. This coordinates provision of accommodation and other services for rough sleepers in the City of Sydney local government area in emergencies such as extreme weather (heat/storms) or an emergency evacuation of the Sydney central business district and is enacted in consultation with NSW Health.

Covid-19 Food Relief Response

The City coordinated a collective impact food relief response group of over 60 not-for-profit agencies and businesses – the Food Operations Working Group, to provide food support for at risk individuals and families across the local area experiencing food insecurity as a result of Covid-19.

In July 2021, Council resolved to support vulnerable communities impacted by the 2021 lockdown through \$250,000 in Community Emergency Quick Response Grants, the distribution of cloth masks totalling \$50,000 and food relief donations of \$300,000 each to OzHarvest and Foodbank, and \$100,000 to SecondBite.

In the last year 32,348 food hampers, 49,401 meals, 8,470 bags of fresh fruit and vegetables, and 29,477kgs of requested products have been distributed to vulnerable communities through food supply donations from the City of Sydney.

Support continued through a second council resolution in November 2021 when further food supply donations totalling \$250,000 were endorsed and \$100,000 funding added to the Community Emergency Quick Response Grants stream. This funding enabled services to increase their capacity at a time when many support services close, including the provision of hampers on Christmas Day.

NSW Health

The City worked closely with NSW Health to provide communications, venues and infrastructure for Covid-19 vaccination and testing clinics across the local government area as part of the emergency response to Covid-19. The City distributed reusable cloth masks and rapid antigen tests to vulnerable residents and community organisations.

South Eastern Sydney Local Area Health District

In partnership with South Eastern Sydney Local Area Health District, the City delivered Stepping On, a falls prevention program targeted at older community members to maintain health and independence. This program is delivered up to twice a year as an 8-week program.

Youth Week programs and events

Youth Week takes place each year around April. The City participates each year and partners with local youth service organisations and young people to co-design a suite of programs and initiatives to engage, entertain and educate young people.

Seniors Festival

Seniors Festival celebrates the role seniors play and the contributions they make to the community. The City participates in Seniors Festival each year and provides seniors with opportunities to engage and connect with their community through a suite of social, health and wellbeing programs and activities, including the annual Seniors Festival Comedy Show, delivered in partnership with the NSW Department of Communities and Justice.

Refugee Week programs and events

Refugee Week provides opportunities for communities to learn more about and celebrate the talents, skills, contributions and cultural diversity of refugees and people seeking asylum. The City supports Refugee Week through events and promotion.

The City's membership of the Refugee Council of Australia's Refugee Welcome Zone initiative was highlighted and showcased during Refugee Week, with billboards and display panels across the City promoting messages of welcome.

Equal employment opportunity

Local Government (General) Regulation 2021

Equal Employment Opportunity (EEO) activities

The City takes its EEO obligations seriously. We seek to be an organisation that is recognised for our efforts in diversity and inclusion. In 2021/22 the initiatives below were undertaken.

The City developed a new People Strategy 2022–26 which is supported by an EEO, Diversity and Inclusion Action Plan. The plan recognises, that promoting workplace equity, diversity and inclusion is essential to our success as a local government organisation serving the diverse communities who live, work in and visit the City of Sydney. The plan focusses on 3 strategic goals:

- build a more diverse workforce
- foster inclusion and belonging
- create awareness and build effective measures.

This plan builds upon and aligns with the City of Sydney’s Stretch Reconciliation Action Plan (2020–2023) and Inclusion (Disability) Action Plan (2021–2025).

Policies and procedures were reviewed to ensure they comply with and support a workplace that implements fair practices and behaviours.

During the year, the City ran the following to raise awareness of diversity, inclusion and equal employment opportunity and to build skills for employees and managers:

- Inclusion (Disability) Awareness e-Learn – 480 employees completed training.
- Anti-harassment and Bullying Policy eLearn – 529 employees completed training.
- Mental Health in the Workplace: Awareness and strategies to approach employees you are concerned about – 126 employees completed this program.

- Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Cultural Awareness Introduction – 354 employees attended, and another 148 staff attended the session on Indigenous procurement.
- City staff were also invited to attend various lunch and learn sessions on managing their mental health and wellness, work life balance, stress, isolation and uncertainty during COVID lockdowns.

The City continued its strong support for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples. The City’s Stretch Reconciliation Action Plan includes actions to recruit, develop and retain Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander employees.

The City participated in the Australian Human Rights Commission’s IncludeAbility program as a member of its Employer Network. The network aims to increase access to meaningful employment opportunities for people with a disability. This year the City was also accredited as a disability confident recruiter by the Australian Network on Disability.

The City promoted employment initiatives that provide opportunities for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander candidates, young people with disability and refugee/asylum seekers who may face barriers to employment. Two job-share targeted positions were provided to young people with disability and the City continued to employ a refugee/asylum seeker through the CareerSeekers program.

In 2021/22 the City undertook its seventh review of gender pay equity guided by the Workforce Gender Equality Agency workplace gender equality framework.

The City calculated its gender pay gap (the gap between the average total remuneration of women and men across the City) on two measures of pay - ‘total remuneration’ (base pay plus variable pay including overtime) and ‘base salary’.

The City's total remuneration gender pay gap was 5.3% per cent in favour of women compared to WGEA total remuneration national pay gap of 22.8 per cent in favour of men. The base salary gender pay gap was 10.5% in favour of women (an increase from 2019/20) compared to WGEA pay gap of 14.1% on ordinary full-time earnings. This is partially due to a greater number of women in the mid-career level departing from the organisation as compared to men.

The City continued to implement the actions of its Mentally Healthy Workplace Plan with a focus on:

- increasing awareness of mental health conditions and reducing stigma
- supporting employees with mental health conditions to return or stay at work
- reducing risks to mental health in the workplace
- supporting employees' wellbeing through the Covid-19 pandemic and recovery.

The City maintained its network of trained peer support employees to provide initial support, assistance and information to employees who may be experiencing an issue which is impacting their mental health.

The City was a member of Australian Network on Disability, and the Diversity Council Australia.

In 2021/22, the net income from the stormwater levy was \$2,036,563. A total capital expenditure of \$4,384,016 was spent on stormwater management projects in the local area in 4 categories:

1. Detailed investigation of floodplain risk management options specified in the catchments' floodplain risk management plans.
2. Stormwater drainage assets condition assessment and database review.
3. Stormwater drainage renewals and upgrades including investigation, design and construction.
4. Stormwater quality infrastructure repair, renewal and additions works including investigation, design and construction.

Companion animal activities

Below are the City's activities during the year in enforcing and ensuring compliance with the provisions of the *Companion Animals Act 1998* and Regulation.

Companion animal regulation

Pound data

From 1 July 2021 to 30 June 2022, 94 animals were collected by the City from Sydney's streets, including 32 cats and 62 dogs.

Of these, 10 dogs and 3 cats were returned to their owners. The others were transferred to the Sutherland Shire Animal Shelter, except for 2 dogs which were transferred to other facilities. The City has a shared services agreement with the shelter to care for impounded animals.

Of the animals transferred to the Sutherland Shire Animal shelter by the City, in 2021/22:

- 4 cats and 21 dogs were returned to their owners
- 2 cats and one dog were euthanised due to illness or poor suitability for rehoming due to temperament
- 18 cats and 26 dogs were rehomed by animal shelter staff.

Dog attacks

There were 127 reported dog attacks in the City of Sydney area in 2021/22:

- 17 were infringed
- 2 received cautions as they were minor incidents
- 93 had no action taken due to the offending dog not being able to be identified
- 12 are still under investigation
- 5 had menacing dog orders
- 2 had nuisance dog orders
- 1 had a notice of intention to declare menacing.

Some incidents saw an owner of a dog being reported in more than one of the above categories.

Off leash dog areas

The City has around 50 off leash dog areas in our parks and reserves. A list of these areas is available at cityofsydney.nsw.gov.au

Companion animal community education programs

Menacing and dangerous dog rehabilitation and training program

In 2021/22 the City offered a behaviour modification and rehabilitation program for dogs that are declared a menacing or dangerous dog, due to a dog attack. This rehabilitation training program provided dog owners with the necessary tools and expert advice on how to manage their dog's anxiety and aggression in the City's public spaces. Thus, keeping people and their animals safe from further dog attack incidents occurring in the future.

Three dogs and their owners successfully completed the 5-week rehabilitation training program and 1 owner successfully applied to have a menacing order revoked.

Pet Registration Incentive Program

In May, the City purchased a pet tag engraving machine and vinyl printer as part of a new pet registration incentive program. This program aims to encourage increased pet registrations by rewarding pet owners with a free pet tag or pet collar with the pet's name and contact number engraved or stencilled onto it when they pay for their pet's lifetime registration.

Promoting desexing and microchipping

The Covid-19 pandemic significantly changed the operations and focus of our companion animal education and services for 2021/22.

Some planned activities, including companion animal pop up education and microchip events, park visits and Northcott Pet Day were cancelled due to physical distancing requirements.

Within the City's programs, 26 cats were desexed and 47 cats were microchipped, while 22 dogs were desexed and 22 microchipped.

Northcott Pet Day and Redfern Waterloo Pet Day

These annual events are designed to educate the community about responsible pet ownership as well as allowing access to desexing, microchipping, veterinary health checks and parasite control – all free of charge. These events also aim to promote a sense of community for all pet owners while offering support and advice.

Northcott Pet Day was cancelled in September 2021 due to Covid-19 restrictions. In June 2022, a pet day was hosted in Waterloo and offered to all social housing residents residing in the local government area. Residents who contacted the City enquiring about Northcott Pet Day were offered alternative services. As a result, 2 dogs were desexed under alternative services.

As part of pet day, 14 cats were desexed, and 35 were microchipped. In addition, 11 dogs were desexed and 18 microchipped for free. The dogs who required desexing were transported to veterinary clinics for free through the Pet Taxi service.

Pet Taxi

A pet taxi service is provided by an established pet taxi company. The service arranged through Porters 4 Pets assists residents on pensions or low incomes in accessing discounted desexing services for their dogs.

Subsidised desexing program

For pet owning residents with pensioner concession or health care cards, the City provided subsidised desexing and microchipping and followed up with registrations. In total 11 dogs were desexed and 4 were microchipped through this program.

Operation Cat

To assist residents on low incomes or pensions, the City has been working with the Cat Protection Society of NSW to provide a subsidised desexing service. For \$52 residents are able to have their cats desexed, microchipped and transported to and from the veterinary surgery.

In 2021/22, 12 cats were de-sexed and 12 were microchipped as part of \$52 Operation Cat.

Glebe cat management program

In 2019, the City collaborated with rescue groups to implement a pilot cat management program for a colony of cats in Glebe that are cared for by local residents. The Trap Desex Adopt Release (TDAR) program involved trapping, desexing, vaccinating, and microchipping cats from the colony.

Before implementing the program the City consulted with RSPCA NSW on the best model and protocol to use to meet legislative requirements under both the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals Act 1979, and the Companion Animals Act 1998. It was decided that the implementation of TDAR would be the best to use in an urban ecosystem where the impact of native wildlife is low, and where residents are able to provide ongoing care, feeding, and management of any cats that were returned to the colony site.

The objectives of the program were to stabilise the colony in terms of cat numbers and physical health, minimise and manage the level of complaints from local residents about the cat colony and empower local residents through education and training to manage the cat colony.

Of the 9 adult cats that were released into the care of the residents, that had been feeding them, all are still being cared for and monitored by the residents. All of the cats are now desexed and no kittens were born in 2021/22. The City provides ongoing food and veterinary care for this colony.

This model of cat management has prevented unwanted kittens from being born and ending up at the shelter, reduced the likelihood of cats marking their territory, reduced cat fights in the area, and, as a result, has reduced the number of complaints about unowned cats in the area.

Street cat rehoming program

In 2021/22 the City continued to allocate funding towards the Street Cat Rehoming Program. The funding covered the costs to desex, microchip, and provide medical treatment for 17 kittens that were rescued from the City's streets. The kittens were then rehomed through rescue groups and veterinary hospitals acting as satellite shelters for the City. Positive feedback from residents, rescue groups and veterinary hospitals has been received. This program is important for cat and stakeholder management.

Pets in Need DFV program – Domestic and family violence pets and animals welfare support (DFV PAWS) grant

In November 2020, the City, in conjunction with the Sutherland Shire Council Animal Shelter's support, successfully applied for the Domestic and Family Violence Pets and Animals Welfare Support (DFV PAWS) grant through the NSW Department of Communities Justice Department.

The City was granted \$39,751 to provide emergency temporary accommodation for pets to support victims of domestic and family violence. The Pets in Need DFV program (PIN) commenced in April 2021 just before the second Covid-19 pandemic and lockdowns came into place.

Under this program the City provided temporary accommodation and medical care to 3 cats and 2 dogs. One dog was desexed under the program, and 1 cat was vaccinated, underwent X-rays, and was provided with medical treatment for a back injury, and surrendered to be rehomed by one of the program partners.

As a result of the lockdowns, it is believed that individuals were not able to access the program, as transitional housing was affected and home schooling kept individuals at home, and individuals were unable to find safe housing due to covid outbreaks.

Due to low numbers accessing the program total expenditure under the grant from April 2021 – March 2022 was \$11,146.48. The City successfully applied for an extension to use the remaining \$28,294.52 to continue the program until June 2023. We currently have 1 cat in boarding under the program.

City of Sydney education programs

City rangers and companion animal officers visit the City's parks and open spaces on a regular basis reminding park visitors about their rights and responsibilities under the Companion Animals Act. Visitors are given leashes and clip on dog waste dispensers to encourage owners to clean up

after their dogs and keep on-leash when required. The City also provides a Cats in the City fact sheet to educate residents about responsible cat care.

Strategies

The City has a shared services agreement with the Sutherland Shire Council to use Sutherland’s Animal Shelter – a low-kill facility with the lowest euthanasia rate in NSW. The focus for the agreement is to re-home all suitable animals and work together to provide a state-of-the-art animal adoption facility. The animals available for adoption are promoted in the City of Sydney staff newsletter.




Figure 16. Off leash dog parks in City of Sydney local government area

Companion animal services financial report

The City spends in excess of \$300,000 annually on companion animal services, for which the NSW Office of Local Government (OLG) provided a total rebate of \$176,430.40 in 2021/22. The City's ability to offer companion animal programmes was limited in 2021/22 due to public health orders and Covid-19 event restrictions.

Local strategic planning statement

Environmental Planning and Assessment Act 1979

Section 3.9

City Plan 2036: City of Sydney Local Strategic Planning Statement was published with approval from the Greater Sydney Commission in March 2020.

The planning statement sets out a 20-year land use vision, balancing the need for housing and economic activities while protecting and enhancing local character, heritage, public places and spaces. It links NSW and local strategic plans with our planning controls to guide development.

This report describes the City's progress against the statement's 13 planning priorities in 2021/22.

Infrastructure 1 – Movement for walkable neighbourhoods and a connected city

The City planning proposals for the Botany Road Corridor, Oxford Street and North Alexandria ensure land uses match mobility investment, such as new metro stations and cycleways, and facilitate improved movement with new streets, links and lanes to create great places.

Infrastructure 2 – Align development and growth with supporting infrastructure

The City finalised a new contributions plan to fund infrastructure in Central Sydney and support the growth under the Central Sydney Planning Strategy. The City worked with the NSW Government on an Infrastructure Delivery Plan as part the implementation of the Pyrmont Peninsula Place Strategy. The Plan foreshadows a new contributions plan with local infrastructure to support the growth planned under the Place Strategy. The City continues to work with the NSW Government on infrastructure delivery arrangements in association with the Waterloo Estate (South) planning proposal.

Infrastructure 3 – Supporting community wellbeing with social infrastructure

Planning for Waterloo Estate (South), 660 Elizabeth Street, Pyrmont Peninsula and North Alexandria identified or secured social infrastructure, open space or both to support the community's needs.

Liveability 1 – A creative and socially connected city

Council approved new planning controls for the Oxford Street Creative and Cultural Precinct to protect existing and incentivise new cultural space. A draft LGBTIQ+ place strategy for Oxford Street was prepared alongside the planning controls to support and celebrate the LGBTIQ+ community and its association with Oxford Street.

Liveability 2 – Creating great places

The new planning controls for Oxford Street and Botany Road support their function as local centres and high streets with services for the community and recognition of their distinctive character and heritage. The new planning controls for North Alexandria create new streets and access ways to facilitate a walkable business precinct with new open space. The Botany Road and Pitt and Hunter Planning Proposals progressed listings of new heritage items, including listing of two sites in Redfern that are socially significant for providing services to the Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander community.

Liveability 3 – New homes for a diverse community

The City approved or finalised planning proposals for 660 Elizabeth Street, Redfern and Cowper Street, Glebe to increase housing and secure additional social and affordable housing on NSW government sites. The City continues to advocate for improved social and affordable housing outcomes at Waterloo Estate (South) including through the submission to the NSW Government's exhibition of draft planning controls, based on the City's proposal. The planning proposals for Elizabeth Street and Waterloo Estate (South) have included guidance for the delivery of a portion of housing for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander households. Council approved the final Botany Road Corridor Planning Proposal which incentivises affordable housing with additional height and floor space.

Council has worked with the Department of Planning and Environment to ensure the appropriate application of the NSW Housing Codes in Rosebery to ensure development respects the character of the area. The City achieved its 0-5 year private housing target with 15,508 dwellings built between 2016 – 2021. The target for social and affordable housing was not achieved, with only 368 affordable dwellings built and net loss of 11 social housing dwellings between 2016 – 2021.

Productivity 1 – Growing a stronger, more competitive Central Sydney

The Central Sydney planning framework, including new planning controls, an infrastructure contributions plan and the Strategy, was finalised in December 2021 and is now being implemented. It's the first major review of the planning controls in 45 years. It ensures future growth occurs where it respects our special places, spaces and parkland, and is highly sustainable, resilient and responsive to climate change.

The City also progressed 7 site specific planning proposals under the Central Sydney Planning Strategy throughout the year. The proposals facilitate additional productive floor space, protect the quality of public spaces and deliver higher sustainability targets consistent with the Strategy. The proposals include the completion of 55 Pitt Street and 187 Thomas Street, approval of 757 George Street and Pitt and Hunter for public exhibition, and final approval of 2 Chifley Square.

Productivity 2 – Developing innovative and diverse business clusters in city fringe

Draft planning controls for the Botany Road and Oxford Street corridors unlock new space for economic activity. The City continues to collaborate with stakeholders on economic and land use planning for the Camperdown node of the Camperdown-Ultimo Collaboration area to support the education, health and innovation sectors. The City is contributing to the preparation of a structure plan for the Camperdown node which is led by the Inner West Council with the City, Sydney Health District and Greater Sydney Commission as partners.

The City continues to work with the NSW Government on implementation of the Pyrmont Peninsula Place Strategy, which sets the vision for an innovative, creative and cultural precinct. The City has started a review of the planning controls for the peninsula as required by the Strategy. The City has been engaging with the NSW Government on Central and Redfern North Eveleigh state significant precinct projects and advocating for innovation outcomes in the collaboration area.

Productivity 3 – Protecting industrial and urban services in the Southern Enterprise Area and evolving businesses in the Green Square-Mascot Strategic Centre

The City has carried out the 5-year review of the Employment Lands Strategy to set the direction for continuing to manage the area for strategic industrial and urban services uses. New planning controls have been adopted by Council for the North Alexandria precinct to facilitate its evolution for business uses.

Sustainability 1 – Protecting and enhancing the natural environment for a resilient city

The City is preparing new planning controls in the LEP and DCP update which will enhance biodiversity and tree canopy throughout the council area. Research has started on reviewing planning controls for water sensitive urban design and re-uses. The City continues to participate in the development of the Sydney Harbour and Cooks River coastal zone management plans. The plans will provide a coordinated management framework across government to improve the health of Sydney Harbour, the Cooks River and their catchments.

Sustainability 2 – Creating better buildings and places to reduce emissions and waste and use water efficiently

The City has adopted new planning controls to achieve net zero buildings. The project report looks at how the City and other Greater Sydney councils can embed optimum energy efficiency,

onsite renewable energy and offsite renewable energy into larger buildings. The work was supported by significant engagement with industry and government.

Sustainability 3 – Increasing resilience of people and infrastructure against natural and urban hazards

The City’s floodplain management controls are being updated as part of the LEP and DCP update.

Governance – 1 Open, accountable and collaborative planning

The City continues to collaborate with a range of organisations in its planning functions including the Camperdown-Ultimo Alliance on the Camperdown precinct, Resilient Sydney and South Sydney Regional Organisation of Councils on housing and the NSW Government on state significant precincts, such as Central, Redfern North Eveleigh and Pymont.

Public access to government information

Government Information (Public Access) Act 2009

Clause 8

Public access to government information

This report includes information on the City's proactive disclosure program and information on section 41 (formal) access applications in the form required by clause 8 and Schedule 2 of the Government Information (Public Access) Regulation.

1. Review of proactive release program – Clause 8(a)

Under section 7(3) of the Government Information (Public Access) Act 2009 (GIPA Act), the City must review its program for the release of government information to identify the kinds of information it holds that should, in the public interest, be made publicly available and that can be made publicly available without imposing unreasonable additional costs. This review must be done at least once every 12 months.

The City's program for the proactive release of information includes these strands:

1. providing information, which is not statutorily required to be provided, through extensive publication on the City's website
2. maintaining and promoting to workers a practice of openness and accountability for information and decision making
3. identifying information that is requested most often and that can be made available in future by self-service arrangements
4. planning and implementing open data initiatives.

This year's review identified the kinds of information held by the City that should be, and were, made publicly available.

Below are examples of categories of information as well as details of specific records that were proactively disclosed, and of activities aligned to disclosure.

Cataloguing, digitising and publishing archival records – strands 1,3 and 4 of the proactive program

As reported last year, in February 2020, the City Archives released its new online catalogue, Archives and History Resources, an innovation which greatly increases access to the City's archival resources.

There is descriptive information about 1,021,963 items to date, and this number is growing. Currently 467,352 items are available in digital form, and users can download them from the system anywhere and at any time.

In the year there were:

- 143,495 users
- 1,315,535 page views
- 231,035 user sessions.

As per 30 June 2022 there were 4,659 registered users.

There was an even spread of users across age groups:

The categories of information most requested by the public through the new online catalogue include building and development records, historical maps, village and suburb information, Special Collections and the Sands Postal Directory.

In the year there were 22,283 additions to the catalogue, including the publication of 3,181 scans of Development and Building files.

New collections added to the catalogue included:

- minutes of Council meetings and transcripts Volumes 3-6

- event images for Chinese New Year 2001-2007, Christmas 2001-2007 and NAIDOC week 2013-2014
- 500 photographs donated by Daphne Kingston of heritage properties in Sydney
- 28 photographs donated by Patricia Baillee of Blackwattle Bay watercraft.

Work has also included enhancing descriptive information of existing content and adding curated 'collection tiles' to improve access.

Work continues to transcribe the City Streets Directory component of the Sands Postal Directory to enable the release of the information as open data. The data includes names of residents, occupations and addresses among other data for the period 1858 to 1933.

The City continued to provide a reading room service on level 21 of Town Hall House when access to the hard copy of records was

required, for example when copyright prevented the City sending copies.

There were 137 visits to the Reading Room recorded for the year. A temporary virtual online reading room continued to operate successfully for the entire year.

Website access

The City's website had 3.5 million visits equating to 7.6 million page views and 376,000 document downloads in 2021/22.

The development application online search function was visited 339,000 times (sessions), up from 271,663 last year.

The City has a fraud and corruption internal reporting policy to bring an organisation-wide approach to managing reporting on fraud and corruption. The policy is modelled on the NSW Ombudsman's guidelines and model policy and applies to all officials of the City.

The policy ensures that as a public authority, the City meets its responsibilities when receiving, assessing and dealing with public interest disclosures under s6D of the Public Interest Disclosures Act 1994.

Carer recognition

The City is committed to supporting people with carer responsibilities. Our goal is to respond to the diverse and changing needs of employees who are carers by providing a flexible and inclusive workplace that supports individual life situations. In 2021/22 the City met its obligations under the Carers (Recognition) Act through a range of initiatives and programs.

We worked to build a supportive workplace for carers at the City through:

- conducting focus groups and listening sessions for carers to provide input into the development of the City's new People Strategy 2022-26
- providing resources for managers to understand issues and find solutions for employees with carer responsibilities
- maintaining our network of trained peer support employees to assist employees who may be experiencing an issue that is impacting on their mental health and wellbeing. This network includes employees with skills and lived experience in a wide range of issues including carers responsibilities
- updating internal policies and procedures during the review cycle to ensure the needs of employees with carer responsibilities are addressed
- reviewing resources for managers to support staff with disability and caring responsibilities
- supporting managers and employees through flexible and remote working, collaborative technology tools, online training and regular communication.

Inclusion (Disability) Action Plan

A City for All: Disability (Inclusion) Action Plan 2021–2025 enables the City to meet its obligations to provide accessible facilities and services under the Disability Discrimination Act 1992 and the NSW Disability Inclusion Act 2014. The plan includes actions to address barriers faced by people with disability and builds on the success of previous plans.

In line with the NSW Disability Inclusion Act 2014, a full report detailing progress of the actions for 2021/22 has been prepared. This report is at cityofsydney.nsw.gov.au

A copy of the progress report will also be provided to the NSW Minister for Families, Communities and Disability Services and the Disability Council of NSW. The progress report is overseen by the City's Inclusion (Disability) Advisory Panel, who play a vital role in monitoring the implementation of the plan.

Key achievements for the 2021/22 year include:

- 480 City employees completed the Inclusion (Disability) Awareness e-learning module. City staff continued to access additional training and resources on disability, mental health and inclusion topics.
- Eight new members were appointed to the Inclusion (Disability) Advisory Panel after a rigorous recruitment process. All 12 members of the panel have a lived experience of disability and professional expertise. As a group they also have a diverse range of gender identities, cultural and linguistic backgrounds. The panel also has young people and people of first nations background.
- The City was accredited as a disability confident recruiter by the Australian Network on Disability. The accreditation process helps organisations identify and remove barriers to inclusive recruitment. It included assessment of our recruitment systems, processes and the accessibility of our spaces, and reviewed our ability to provide alternative and inclusive job ads, position descriptions and contracts.
- The City ran a marketing campaign and hosted 2 community events to show support for the 2021 Australian Paralympic team and to help foster more positive community attitudes towards people with disability. The marketing campaign included outdoor advertising, a City of Sydney news article and social media posts. One of the events was a Paralympic Wikipedia edit-a-thon with Paralympian and advocate Sarah Stewart. This event highlighted the importance of diverse voices when documenting Australian Paralympic history.
- A range of inclusive programming was delivered across our network of libraries and community facilities to foster positive community attitudes toward people with disability. The City produced 28 Auslan and English Storytime online videos delivered by deaf presenters. The videos were viewed 15,995 times by audience members remotely. 147 events for adult audiences on educational, creative and cultural topics were Auslan interpreted.
- The City's Pedestrian and Access Program focuses on access upgrades and renewal projects to improve safety and accessibility across the City of Sydney area. In 2021/22, 111 access ramps were constructed to current standards, 20 continuous footpath treatments were delivered across side streets, removing the need for 38 access ramps, and 12 raised pedestrian cross were constructed, removing the need for 8 access ramps.
- The pedestrianisation of George Street between Bathurst Street and Rawson Place resulted in significantly improved accessibility. As part of this project:
 - space for pedestrians has increased by removing traffic
 - new wider pedestrian areas have been created, with footpath materials,

- gradient, and widths designed and built in line with the City's Inclusive and Accessible Public Domain Policy and Guidelines
- the majority of crossings along this route are raised pedestrian crossings that are with footpaths and feature appropriate tactile ground surface indicators along the boundary of the roadway. Raised pedestrian crossing prioritise pedestrian movement and avoids the need for kerb ramps and ensures everyone can cross safely and independently
 - more seating has been installed which provides rest opportunities for people with mobility difficulties. New street seating is designed in accordance with relevant access standards
 - more trees have been planted and greening created, creating a cooler and more inviting space for everyone.
 - 18 grants were awarded by the City to various organisations for projects that benefit people with disability
