Advice

Background

The City proposes to introduce a continuous footpath treatment in Bucknell Street, Newtown, just north of Wilson Street, to improve pedestrian safety and accessibility, slow vehicle speeds and enhance the streetscape.

Comments

The TfNSW Technical Direction for Continuous Footpath Treatments (TDT 2013/05) states that continuous footpath treatments are only applicable for intersections carrying no more than 45 vehicles per hour and the driveway layback is not wider than 7 metres.

Traffic counts commissioned for seven days from 8 Nov 2017 to 14 November 2017, in Bucknell Street, just north of Wilson Street, recorded a maximum peak-hour volume of 40 vehicles. As this maximum peak hour volume is well below the TfNSW warrant for a continuous footpath treatment, the proposal is compliant from a traffic volume perspective.

In addition, the crossing width proposed for the continuous footpath treatment is below the TfNSW warrant and as such compliant with the Technical Direction – Bucknell Street, just north of Wilson Street, is approximately six metres wide.

The new continuous footpath treatment (CFT) will not affect on-street parking or traffic flows in the local area. This location currently has drainage problems so that the provision of a CFT will enable the City to regrade the intersection and remove the cause of the drainage issues.

Under the road rules, a footpath is a road related area. When entering, or crossing, a road related area from a road, drivers must give way to any pedestrian or other road users on the road related area. The introduction of a continuous footpath treatment reinforces the road rules

Consultation

The City notified local residents and businesses in the area. There were 163 letters sent out.

Financial

Appropriate funding for the proposal will be secured once greater certainty on the construction timeline is reached.
