

Engagement report – Raised intersection with progress pride flag artwork



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CITY OF SYDNEY () Overview

Project background

The City of Sydney is proposing to install a raised intersection at the intersection of Bourke and Forbes streets in Darlinghurst. This includes a Progress Pride flag design to reflect the changed environment and represents local businesses and LGBTQA+ communities in the public domain.

Our proposal will make crossing the road between Qtopia Sydney and Taylor Square easier and more accessible for people.

Qtopia Sydney's opening and future development will transform the former Darlinghurst police station into a cultural and tourist destination. It will attract more visitors across Bourke and Forbes streets, and Taylor Square from Oxford Street and beyond.

Purpose of engagement

In October 2023 Council resolved to investigate more locations and opportunities for new pride crossings in the City of Sydney area using the Progress Pride flag design. See Council decision: <u>https://meetings.cityofsydney.nsw.gov.au/ieDecisionDetails.aspx?Id=4702</u>

The purpose of this consultation was to gather community feedback regarding the new raised intersection at the intersection of Bourke and Forbes streets in Darlinghurst, which includes a Progress Pride flag design.

Engagement summary

This report outlines the engagement activities that took place in April and May 2024 to gather feedback on the proposal. It also summarises the key findings from this consultation.

569 surveys were completed during the consultation period, between 24 April 2024 to 8 May 2024.

We received 7 written submissions from community members.

Engagement findings

Overall sentiment

The proposal received strong overall support, with 73% of the 576 total respondents supporting the new raised intersection.

Reasons for support

355 people chose to explain the reason for their support. The primary reasons mentioned were that:

• The project would support the LGBTQ Community and Qtopia (85%)

• It would make crossing the road safer (8%)

Reasons for opposition

143 people chose to explain the reason for not supporting the proposal. The primary reasons mentioned were as follows:

- There are more important things to spend public money on (30%)
- Original rainbow flag is more representative of gay community (17%)
- Cites transgender related concerns around the Progress Pride Flag (17%)
- The Rainbow Flag represents only a small part of the overall population (15%)
- Traffic hazard concerns (10%)

Outcomes of engagement

The following is a snapshot of the outcomes from the engagement.

Submissions received during April and May 2024 consultation

We received a total of 576 submissions and the Sydney Your Say page was visited 1930 times during the public exhibition period.

Demographic Data

Age

Of those respondents that answered this question age ranged from 16 to over 80. The majority of responses were by people between the age of 30-39 (26%), 40-49 (24%) and 50-59 (22%).

Gender


Of those respondents that answered this question 26% identified as female, 62% as male, and 5% as intersex, trans or gender non-binary.

Cultural Background

Respondents identified as being from a wide range of cultural backgrounds including Australian, Aboriginal, European, German, Greek, Dutch, Chinese, Sir Lankan, Iraqi, Indian, New Zealand and Māori.

| Multi-coloured crossings, instead of black and white, can negatively effect neurodivergent pedestrians, blind people, people with dementia, service animals and horses. | 8 | The raised intersection with Progress Pride Flag artwork is not classified as a pedestrian crossing (zebra crossing). The aim of a raised intersection is firstly to act as a traffic calming measure. The raised intersection coupled with approach/ departure ramps will act as traffic calming measure to encourage slower approach speeds. Secondly, at a raised intersection the footpaths are at the same level as the road surface. As such, it facilitates a seamless travel for pedestrians and cyclists and improves universal access for the visually impaired and people in wheelchairs and prams. Pedestrians do not have priority at the intersection and should cross the road only when there is a safe gap in traffic. The artwork alerts drivers that there is a change in the road environment, encouraging them to drive at a slower speed. |

| Multi-coloured raised crossings create congestion | 1 | The City's current rainbow artwork installed along the signalised pedestrian crossing at Bourke and Campbell Streets, Surry Hills has not created congestion. The proposed raised intersection with Progress Pride Flag artwork is planned in an area with low traffic volume. As such congestion is not expected. Given that this particular proposal will be the first if its kind in the city, the City will monitor traffic volumes in the area and if there is congestion, appropriate solutions to mitigate the issue will be considered. |
| The City of Sydney risks breaching the UN Convention on Road Signs and Signals by implementing this proposal. Article 29.2: This article mandates that "road markings shall be yellow or white." A rainbow crossing would violate this standardisation. Article 27.4: This article directs that pedestrian crossings should be marked with "broad stripes, parallel to the axis of the carriageway." The inclusion of the chevron in the Progress Pride Flag on a crossing further jeopardises compliance. I urge the City to familiarise itself with UN General Assembly Resolution 60/5, which: Prioritises Road Safety: The resolution highlights road accidents as a critical public health issue, urging UN members to act. Advocates for Standardisation: The resolution emphasises adherence to international conventions such as the UN Convention on Road Signs and Signals, designed to enhance safety | 1 | The raised intersection with the Progress Pride Flag artwork is not designated as a pedestrian crossing. The artwork does not indicate to pedestrians that it is a pedestrian crossing. Pedestrians do not have priority at the intersection and should cross the road only when there is a safe gap in traffic. The City will commission a Road Safety Audit as part of the design process. |




