Proposed development: The proposed development involves the alterations and additions to the existing twostorey building to facilitate the construction and operation of a new McDonald's operation. The proposed development involves the following elements. Use of the site for a food and drink premises with 24 hour 7 day trade and operations, removal of restrictions on title relating to residential accommodation, demolition works which include:

- Demolition of tenancy dividing wall and Level 1 dividing walls
- Removal of existing internal stairs, demolition of existing concrete slab to ground floor and first floors, demolition of roof and removal of courtyard elements, demolition of existing door and awning, removal of all existing signage elements, removal of a particular wall section to facilitate new works, removal of downpipes for reconfiguration, and removal of security roller shutter.
- Internal fit out works which include:
- Construction of new structural support zones, construction of new ground and first floor slabs replacing existing, construction of goods lift with external and internal door connections, construction of vertical food lift between ground and first floor, dining room area inclusive of 12 seats, customer bins, sales and pickup counter, and kiosk zone.
- Ground floor back-of-house area including McCafe preparation area, kitchen, washup area, and bin area.
- First floor back-of-house area including main kitchen, fridge and freezer storage areas, dry storage, main washup area, IT space, staff amenities, and managers office.
- External works including:
- External cladding and painting, construction of new awning which extends around full extent of building for both Regent Street, corner splay, and Redfern Street, reconfiguration of building glazing on Redfern Street with new main building entry.
- Installation of external goods lift door, reconstruction of roof to provide improved structure for mechanical plant and covering of former courtyard, installation of skylights and mechanical plant on building rooftop with access via connection from first floor, minor roof works including upgrade of existing stormwater management system.
- Business identification signage including 2 x new internally illuminated under awning sign on corner section addressing Redfern Street and Regent Streets respectively, 2 x new internally illuminated McDonald's awning fascia signs addressing Redfern Street and Regent Street respectively, new internally illuminated McDonald's Golden Arches wall sign on building corner splay situated above awning level, and new internally illuminated McCafe wall sign on building corner splay situated above awning level.

Construction of a new:

2 storey McDonalds Restaurant with hours of operation of 24 Hours, 7 days per week.

1. Introduction

In line with section 4.15 of the New South Wales Environmental Planning & Assessment Act 1979 and the New South Wales Planning Guidelines, the below report has been conducted on Application: **D/2024/2018**. Police **object** to the submitted Development Application – McDonalds Restaurant at 153A Redfern Street, Redfern NSW 2016 due to the following concerns. Police believe that the if application be granted patrons migrating to or from other late-night premises on foot will, more likely than not, move through the neighboring streets of Redfern, causing a range of disturbances beyond the ability of premises staff to monitor or respond to. Patrons leaving the premises during late hours are likely to engage in a range of behaviour, which need not rise to a level of criminality yet will adversely affect the neighbourhood including talking amongst themselves, yelling, screaming, and arguing.

Police are concerned with the proposed trading hours will only provide a further strain on an already identified hotspot for crime within South Sydney PAC, thereby potentially increasing the amount of violence seen in the area on any given night. Within the past twelve months, there have been twenty-eight (28) reported assaults (Non -Domestic Violence) in Redfern. These assaults occurred with no patten of the week, however, did occur after 3pm. Secondly, Malicious Damage was a large issue, contributing to twenty (20) incidents around the intersection of Redfern Street and Regent Street, Redfern.

It may be helpful to note that the proximity of Redfern Train Station makes McDonalds more accessible for criminal behaviour and draws people from neighboring PACS into the area as it is – the addition to a social place such as McDonalds (where Youth tend to meet up / use of free Wi-Fi and cheap dining services) is projected to increase crime in the area.

2.1 Current Environment

The site is in the suburb of Redfern, at 153A Redfern Street, with frontages to Redfern Street, Cope Street, and Regent Street. It is situated within City of Sydney local government area (LGA). The site is currently occupied. At the Western end of the site, sits Redfern Train Station, one of the largest and busiest train stations in Sydney, the Redfern Police Station, late night licensed premises, The Regent Hotel, and a Woolworths Metro. While the Eastern end of the site has numerous late night licensed premises including Redfern & Co, The Noble Hops, Tudor Hall Hotel, and the Woolpack Hotel. Additionally, the site is in proximity of Redfern and Waterloo Estate. Redfern and Waterloo Estate is the biggest social housing estate in Australia. It's massive towers, terraces, and single-storey cottages sprawl over 18 hectares, housing almost 3000 people. The site location has heavy foot traffic and heavy vehicle traffic, which currently has 'No Stopping' signs posted directly outside the site on Redfern Street. Crime hotspots are in the high category for some offences as detailed further below in the crime hotspot maps.




Figure 1: Satellite map of 600 – 660 Elizabeth Street, Redfern (Source: SIX Maps)

2.2 Proposed Development

SLR Consulting, on behalf of McDonald's Australia have submitted a Development Application (**DA**) to City of Sydney Council (**Council**) for the demolition and the alterations and additions to the existing two-storey building to facilitate the construction and operation of a new McDonald's Restaurant. The proposed development involves food and drink to be sold 24-hour 7-day trade with the seating capacity of 12.

3.3. Potential further issues identified:

- CCTV cameras
- Bike storage
- Noise complaints
- Parking

4. Recommendations

Due to the nature of the development, identified crime risks and issues, Police recommend the following should City of Sydney council approve this DA:

- High quality CCTV cameras to be installed and positioned strategically throughout the
 premises (Both internal and external). Pay particular attention to entry and exit points as well
 as any blind spots. Common areas should have sufficient CCTV as well as any stair wells and
 lifts.
- Each level of the premises should have CCTV covering it sufficiently.
- CCTV to cover any bicycle, or car parking spaces.
- CCTV is to cover the footpath on Redfern Street, Cope Street, and Regent Street, Redfern.
- CCTV to cover internally of the restaurant particularly the service counter, seating area, entry/exit point, points of self service, and inside the lift.
- Lighting should be installed/upgraded and positioned strategically throughout the premises particularly on Redfern Street, Cope Street, and Regent Street. Lighting should create visibility at night. Any lighting near CCTV cameras should be installed in such a way where it complements the recording ability as opposed to hindering image/video quality.
- CCTV management plan to be implemented with protocols to allow police prompt access in case of an incident.
- CCTV to be retained for no less than one month (30 days).
- CCTV hardware/equipment (Except cameras) should be kept out of sight and stored in a secure area (Locked office etc.) A code/password should be used to secure access to the CCTV system. Staff should be trained on how to use and operate the CCTV system.
- A fire emergency strategy that includes an evacuation plan, fire extinguishers and fire blankets are displayed in prominent locations.
- Commercial tenancies should not have items/office equipment positioned on any frontage to the point where it blocks a significant amount vision from inside/outside the premises. This is to ensure a high-level of passive surveillance is maintained.
- Security systems/alarms to be installed at the premises (Including duress/panic alarms).
- Consider impact resistant window and door glass. This is to make it difficult for offenders to break into/cause malicious damage.
- Make sure staff and contractors are aware of emergency evacuation procedures and evacuation assembly points. It should be emphasised that personal security is the

- responsibility of the individual.
- Any Comms, electrical, meters cupboard/s etc. for the premises are to be always secured. Only staff or qualified personnel are to have access to these locations.
- Limit any potential climbing points an offender may use to try and gain access.
- Any pipes/gutters/external protrusions are to be installed as far away from balconies/windows as possible. This is to make it harder for offenders to get access to balconies/windows should they try and use these as climbing points.
- Address number to be clearly displayed at the front of the complex. This is to be visible at night and should be easily seen from the street. Any hedges and greenery need to be maintained regularly and should not block or grow over the address number.
- Mailbox area to be internal of the building and to be covered by CCTV.
- Additional landscaping items and or furniture should be fixed to the ground or be of such weight it makes it difficult to be moved by an individual.
- Signage such as 24/7 CCTV, trespassers will be prosecuted, do not leave valuables inside your car etc. to be implemented and placed strategically around the premises.
- Bicycle storage should be in a secure area with bicycle racks/strong fixed points for owners to secure their bicycles effectively. CCTV to cover.
- Conditions of entry to be displayed at the entrance to the premises.
- Conduct regular white level inspections of the entire premises. This is where building managers look for anything that is out of place or anything that poses a risk. If relevant, address the issue yourself or contact police if something serious is identified. (Suspicious packages, broken doors, and windows etc.)
- In the event of a criminal incident on the premises, there is an expectation by police that staff co-operate in any investigation. This includes prompt supply of evidence such as CCTV as well as legal statements.
- Repair and or address maintenance issues promptly, i.e faulty locks/CCTV not working etc.
- The use of graffiti resistant materials for external surfaces. Remove any graffiti as soon as possible.
- After hours emergency contact number to be displayed at the front entrance and or provided to police.
- Emergency contact numbers/addresses to be displayed in key areas for staff in any retail/office spaces.
- Take all reasonable steps to continually identify any issues and implement effective crime preventative measures.
- Blue lights to be installed in public bathrooms to discourage injecting drug use.

1. Off-site

1.1 Construction Pedestrian and Traffic Management Plan

Comments

Construction vehicle movements need to be managed to mitigate transport network issues and to coordinate with other nearby developments which could create significant cumulative effects.

Guidance

The standard CPTMP requirements are, but not limited to, the following:

Site information and building construction plan

- A description of the development
- Construction program and construction methodology
- Proposed construction hours



- A detailed plan of any proposed hoarding and/or scaffolding
- Details of crane arrangements including location of any crane(s)
- Location(s) where it is proposed to park construction vehicle
- Location of any proposed work zone(s)

Access and movement:

Identify

- Pedestrian and traffic management measures
- Haulage routes
- Predicted number of construction vehicle movements and detail of vehicle types

Impacts

- Identify any potential impacts to general traffic, cyclists, pedestrians and bus services within the vicinity of the site from construction vehicles during the construction of the proposed works.
- Cumulative construction impacts of projects. Existing CPTMPs for developments within or around the development site should be referenced in the CPTMP to ensure that coordination of work activities is managed to minimise impacts on the surrounding road network.

Mitigation measures

- Measures to minimise movement delays. i.e., Vehicle movements are to be minimised during peak network demand periods;
- Details of specific measures to ensure the arrival of construction vehicles to the site do not cause additional queuing on public roads;
- Proposed mitigation measures. Should any impacts be identified, the duration of the impacts and measures proposed to mitigate any associated general traffic, public transport, pedestrian and cyclist impacts should be clearly identified and included in the CPTMP
- Measures to avoid construction worker vehicle movements.

Ongoing activities

Monitoring

 Details of the monitoring regime for maintaining the simultaneous operation of buses and construction vehicles on roads surrounding the site.

Consultation

- Consultation strategy for liaison with surrounding stakeholders, including other developments under construction.
- Provide the builder's direct contact number to small businesses adjoining or impacted by the construction work and the Transport Management Centre and Customer Journey Planning (formerly Sydney Coordination Office) within Transport for NSW to resolve issues relating to traffic, public transport, freight, servicing and pedestrian access during construction in real time. The applicant is responsible for ensuring the builder's direct contact number is current during any stage of construction.

2. On-site

2.1 Bicycle parking and end of trip facilities

Proposal

No bicycle parking facilities have been identified from review of the architectural plans.

Comments

- Bicycle parking and end of trip facilities for pedestrian and bicycle riders in accordance with Council/ Authority development control plans, standards and guideline documents;
- Bicycle facilities are to be located a in secure, convenient, accessible (step free) areas close to the main entries incorporating adequate lighting and passive surveillance and in accordance with Austroads guidelines;
- Consideration be given for the connectivity, safety and accessibility for bicycle riders to existing bicycle networks; and
- Wayfinding strategies and travel access guides be developed to assist with increasing the mode share of cycling.

2.2 Delivery and servicing

Proposal

No off-street loading zones are proposed for the development. The proposed development represents a notable increase in the requirement of deliveries and waste generation.

Comment

All new developments should be self-sufficient and cater for all loading and servicing off-street. Any developer that relies on on-street parking restrictions for land use operations exposes their operations to risks from evolving use of public space.

Transport for NSW makes no commitment that any loading zone on state roads will be maintained in perpetuity. The existing timed loading zone on Regent Street at the end of the bus zone would need to be removed in the event of an increase in bus services.

Transport for NSW requests the proponent prepare a Delivery and Servicing Plan.

Further guidance on site delivery and servicing should be sought from (<u>delivery-and-servicing-planguidance.pdf</u> (nsw.gov.au).

The proponent should also undertake loading zone utilisation surveys of loading zones that are intended to be used to service the site.

The TfNSW Urban Freight Forecast tool provides guidance to developers on how many loading zones are required for a development based on the proposed land use.

I am writing to formally lodge my objection to the proposed Development Application D/2024/1218 for a 24/7 McDonald's outlet to operate on Redfern Street. As a local resident and member of the community, I am extremely concerned about the potential impacts of this development on the character, amenity, and safety of the area.

1. Increased Noise and Disturbance

Redfern Street is a mixed-use area with a significant number of residential properties. A 24/7 McDonald's is likely to attract high volumes of patrons at all hours, leading to increased noise levels, particularly during late-night and early-morning hours. This would disrupt the area.

2. Impact on Local Businesses

Redfern Street is home to a variety of small, independent businesses that contribute to the area's unique character and appeal. A multinational chain like McDonald's operating 24/7 would undermine these businesses by drawing away customers, thereby threatening their viability when they are already dealing with economic pressures.

3. Impact on character of the area

Redfern street has a unique character and feel, placing a multinational chain in such a prominent position undermines and damages this feel and is not in keeping with the rest of the businesses on the street. There are already a number of other McDonald's outlets within a 15 minute radius of the proposed location (both walking and driving).

4. Public Safety and Anti-Social Behavior

Experience in other locations shows that 24/7 fast-food outlets can become hotspots for anti-social behavior, including loitering, littering, and disturbances. This would place additional strain on local law enforcement who anre anlready challenged and compromise the safety and wellbeing of the community.

5. Environmental Concerns

McDonald's outlets are known for generating significant amounts of waste, much of which ends up as litter in surrounding areas. Despite efforts to mitigate waste, this would likely detract from the cleanliness and visual appeal of Redfern Street and its vicinity.

In light of these concerns, I urge the City of Sydney to carefully consider the adverse effects this development would have on the local community and reject the application for a 24/7 McDonald's in this location.

I write to formally object to the proposed development of a 24-hour McDonald's at 153 Redfern St, as outlined in DA No. 2457302. My concerns are based on the following points, which I urge the Council to consider in rejecting this application:

1. Incompatibility with Local Context and Planning Principles

The proposed 24-hour McDonald's is not aligned with the established character, culture, or environment of Redfern, as defined by the principles in the Sydney Development Control Plan (DCP) 2012. Specifically:

- Principles (a), (b), and (c) emphasize the importance of retaining and complementing heritage and character while ensuring that new developments enliven the streetscape. A McDonald's operating 24/7 contradicts this by introducing a corporate, non-local business model that undermines the vibrant small-business culture of the area.
- Principle (h) encourages active ground-floor uses that align with the local context. While food and retail businesses are welcome, this proposal's hours of operation, branding, and model do not reflect the existing small-business-oriented, community-focused environment.
- 2. Unnecessary 24/7 Operation and Disturbance to Residents

No other food, retail, or hospitality businesses in the area operate 24/7, and this is not a needed or appropriate addition. Late-night operations will:

•

Disturb nearby residences through increased noise, odours, and pedestrian activity during late hours.

Generate ongoing, adverse impacts on the amenity and quality of life for local residents.

Encourage late-night traffic and gatherings that disrupt the peace and safety of the area.

The Council should ensure this venue adheres to the hours of operation expected of local businesses, such as nearby pubs, which often close no later than midnight, and as per current local centre hours late night extended hours trading is permitted until 2am. No exemptions for McDonalds should be provided.

3. Adverse Impact on Local Businesses

The introduction of a McDonald's undermines the viability of nearby small businesses that contribute to the unique identity of Redfern. For example:

Mr. Charlie's, located next door, offers fast food aligned with the local culture. The presence of a multinational chain will draw customers away, threatening local economic diversity.

The proposal contradicts Principle (i), which encourages diverse uses above ground floors and complementary ground-floor uses that support rather than compete unfairly with local enterprises.

4. Odour and Environmental Impacts

The odour and smells generated by McDonald's operations, especially 24/7, are not welcoming or appropriate for this area. This is likely to:

Have a detrimental impact on nearby residences and outdoor public spaces.

Erode the character and streetscape amenity outlined in DCP Principles (a) and (b).

5. Increased Traffic and Pedestrian Activity

A 24-hour McDonald's will increase vehicular and pedestrian activity, particularly late at night, leading to:

- Noise disturbances for local residents.
- Traffic congestion and potential safety concerns, particularly on Redfern Street.
- Adverse impacts on the quiet residential streets adjacent to the proposed site.

6. Signage and Variations to Planning Controls

The Council should reject any proposed variations to the DCP 2012 and planning controls for signage. Such variations are not minor, as claimed in the applicant's Statement of Environmental Effects, and would significantly detract from the heritage streetscape. Oversized or illuminated signage would further undermine the visual harmony of the area.

7. Request for Rejection of Variations

The proposed variations to planning controls, including hours of operation and signage, should be firmly rejected. These variations are not minor and are contrary to the outcomes expressed in the character statement and supporting principles of the DCP 2012. Extended trading hours will have a detrimental impact on residents and is not aligned to the current local centre later hours, per the current CoS website.

Summary

I urge the Council to consider the overwhelming adverse impacts of this proposal on the area and its residents. The application is inconsistent with the principles outlined in the DCP 2012 and fails to respect the character, culture, and amenity of Redfern. I strongly recommend that the Council refuse this application in its current form.

Thank you for considering this objection. I trust the Council will prioritise the needs and concerns of the local community in this matter.



We are writing as local residents to object to the application by SLR Consulting to alter the existing building at 153 Redfern Street REDFERN NSW 2016 (D/2024/1218) for use as a McDonalds fast food operation and we particularly object to the proposed hours of operation - 24 hours, 7 days per week.

We are concerned that the waste and litter generated by take away sold from this fast-food business will have a detrimental effect on the local environment. We are concerned that take away food containers sold to patrons will not be disposed of in street bins but that containers and rubbish will either be left lying around on the street or be thrown into front yards of residences. This currently occurs with take away food sold from the take away food outlets on Redfern Street. The front fence of our residential building is regularly used as a place to sit and eat take away food and the leftover food and packaging are thrown into our garden. We are constantly having to clean the gardens. It is not fair that as residents we have to pay for cleaning up the food and packaging waste generated by local businesses. We are very concerned that this will get much worse if this proposal is approved.

However, our main concern, should this application be approved, is the proposed trading hours. Our residence on Redfern Street consists of 40 residential apartments. Redfern Street and the surrounding streets are all high residential areas. We are concerned that 24 hour trading, if approved, will create excessive noise from customers walking along Redfern Street after midnight and in the early hours of the morning. This will detrimentally affect residents' ability to sleep. Chronic sleep deprivation will in turn negatively impact our health and well-being and that of the local community.

The current closing time for the majority of licensed premises and food outlets on Redfern Street is 12am. This already results in an enormous amount of noise on the street at closing time making it extremely difficult for us to get to sleep and we are then regularly woken up by loud voices and shouting on the street after midnight. Approving 24 hours/7 days trading hours for McDonalds would mean that there would not be any time during the day or night without excessive noise on the street. This is unacceptable for us as residents.

I was alerted to this proposal through the Facebook group Redfern Residential. It is a community of 7,000 members, and this proposal has had the most comments (mainly negative) of any post I have seen in this Facebook Group.

Overall I don't object to a McDonalds being built there. I am not a fan, and I don't think it adds to the developing interesting mix of stores, but there is a Dominos up the road and demand may be there.

My comments are as follows:

- My main concern is regarding the use of delivery bikes. The management of third party delivery services I could not see addressed in any of the documentation. This is a busy corner, and electrified delivery bikes would be a major safety issue. Does their business plan assume delivery services 24 hours from this site? How will this be managed on a busy corner with only one door to the store? I suggest that there are agreed places for bikes to park as part of the plan (top of Cope Street, for example). Or that delivery via powered bikes is not approved for this site.
- Unless the council puts in additional bins in the area, the area for their rubbish patrol covers a larger area than proposed (the entire small block). In particular, the Cope Street pocket park will no doubt be used a lot.

A few concerns that I have not seen addressed in the SEE:

- The waste management plan does not mention all the takeaway containers that will be brought to the area during the operations phase, and how this will be managed locally. Will the existing bins in the surroundings areas be sufficiency? Has an assessment been done? Was council consulted?
- Good public transport connection is listed in section 5.2 regarding traffic, access and parking. However, no quantitative study is available regarding estimated numbers of customers expected during the operation phase. Assuming to additional car traffic will be generated is not realistic. What will be the impact(s) on the surrounding area, where congestion is already problematic and parking is not easy. In addition, no details are provided on deliveries and use of the loading lane.

Further details are required before an informed decision can be made.

I am writing to oppose the development application D/2024/1218.

The introduction of a McDonald's into this community poses significant negative impacts at both the local and cultural levels. Below, I outline several key concerns:

- Redfern is a suburb with a rich cultural heritage, deeply tied to Indigenous history and a thriving community spirit. The arrival of a McDonald's risks undermining the unique character of the area. Small, independent businesses, which reflect and support the local culture, may struggle to compete with the franchise's aggressive pricing and marketing strategies. Over time, this could lead to a homogenisation of the local economy and a loss of Redfern's distinctive identity.
- Redfern is home to a diverse range of small, locally-owned eateries, cafés, and restaurants that rely on the support of the community. The introduction of a McDonald's could divert significant customer traffic away from these establishments, threatening their viability. This is particularly concerning given that these small businesses are major contributors to local employment and reinvestment in the community. These businesses currently work together in a spirit of collaboration (as opposed to competition) and this introduction would jeopardise this.
- Fast food restaurants are known for generating significant amounts of waste, including single-use plastics, packaging, and litter. A McDonald's in Redfern could lead to an increase in street rubbish and place additional pressure on waste management services. Furthermore, the environmental footprint of such franchises, from energy consumption to supply chain logistics, contradicts the City of Sydney's sustainability goals. We see this exemplified in Kings Cross with the constant MacDonald's branded rubbish on the streets. Redfern already has issues relating to waste management, littering and illegal rubbish dumping. The introduction of a MacDonald's will only serve to increase this already inadequately managed problem. In addition to the pollution generated by huge amount of packaging, the odour pollution of these outlets is significant. The odours spread for blocks, and this would most impact the residents within a significant radius of the restaurant.
- The operating hours associated with this application are highly concerning. None of the other businesses are approved to operate 24 hours, 7 days per week. Redfern is not a late night hub, it is not a precinct with late night venues. We have cafes, restaurants and pubs, but it is not an area for late night "partying" nor are we in a CBD location the makeup of Redfern is much more residential than it is a late night entertainment precinct. Operating such hours will fundamentally impact the local culture and negatively impact Redferns.
- We know that fast food outlets become hotspots for loitering and/or late night food stops leading to increased antisocial behaviour. Redfern has worked hard to build a sense of community safety and inclusiveness, and the addition of a McDonald's could jeopardise these efforts. That the application refers to operation 24 hours a day, seven days per week only increases concerns around this. Given the proximity of the restaurant to the residential homes, increases risks around safety and security for those residents in the vicinity.
- Noise pollution is a significant concern. As more people loiter in the area, particularly later into the night who may/may not be under the influence of drugs and/or alcohol will create significant noise pollution. This is in addition to the noise generated by the restaurant itself.

In light of the above concerns, I urge the City of Sydney Council to reject this development application. Redfern's identity, health, and community cohesion are too valuable. Instead, I encourage the council to prioritise developments that align with the values and needs of the local community, supporting sustainable, locally-owned businesses that enhance Redfern's unique character and paying tribute to the contribution of local residents. For example, the Council

could favour applications from Indigenous led businesses, social enterprises or local businesses.

• Redfern is a residential neighbourhood. It does not currently have, nor does it require, any 24/7 food and beverage operations.

In some part due to it socio economic status Redfern is already prone to anti social night time behaviour, adding a 24/7 McDonald's would only provide a focal point for congregations at all hours with the accompanying unwelcome behaviour.

As an unlicensed premises there won't be the same requirements on policing patron behaviour and security as there are for licensed premises, yet the proposal to operate 24/7 will lead to anti social behaviour and unprepared and often junior staff unable to police this.

Dear Lord Mayor

Congratulations on your re-election as Lord Mayor and thank you for all your past efforts on behalf of the residents of the City of Sydney.

I am writing as a resident of Redfern Street, Redfern, to make you aware of my concerns, which I believe are shared by many people in the local area, about the development application to open a McDonalds fast food outlet at 153 Redfern Street REDFERN NSW (D/2024/1218).

I am particularly concerned about the proposed hours of operation - 24 hours, 7 days per week. But I am also concerned about the potential generation of additional litter on our street.

As I'm sure you're aware, Redfern Street has many residential buildings, as do the surrounding streets, including the apartment block that I live in at 134-138 Redfern Street, which consists of 40 residential apartments. I am extremely concerned that 24 hour trading, if approved for D/2024/1218, will create excessive noise from customers walking along Redfern Street after midnight and in the early hours of the morning. This will detrimentally affect my and other residents' ability to sleep. Chronic sleep deprivation will in turn negatively impact our health and well-being and our ability to function during the day.

The current closing time for the majority of licensed premises and food outlets on Redfern Street is 12am. This already results in an enormous amount of noise on the street at closing time making it extremely difficult to get to sleep and I am then regularly woken up by loud voices and shouting on the street after midnight. Approving 24 hours/7 days trading hours for McDonalds would not only mean an increase in this noise but also that that there would not be any time during the night without excessive noise on Redfern Street. As a resident, this is unacceptable.

I am also very concerned about litter generated from the take away food to be sold from this business not being disposed of appropriately and ending up as rubbish either left lying around on the street or thrown into the front yards of residences. This currently occurs with take away food sold from the other take away food outlets on Redfern Street. The front fence of our residential building is regularly used as a place to sit and eat take away food and the leftover food and packaging are thrown into our garden. We are constantly having to clean the gardens. It is not fair that as residents we have to either clean the rubbish ourselves or pay for cleaning up the food and packaging waste generated by local businesses. We are very concerned that this will get much worse if this proposal is approved.

McDonald's DA Objection

I am a local, long-term Aboriginal resident and community member of Redfern. The cultural significance of the Redfern as a meeting place for the nation's Aboriginal community is well known. Redfern is known to be a place of sharing and food culture was and continues to be, a central tenant to our values. I am also a member of one of Redfern's local community gardens where we are working to embed the values and practices of sustainability, reciprocity, and health and wellbeing into our daily lives, leading by example for our children.

However, there is a clear link to significantly lower health experienced within Aboriginal communities due to the access to healthy and affordable food. This includes Redfern and neighouring Waterloo with a significant social housing density, comes the reality of a community with more complex needs, and typically living on less. Some of the well-known links of lowest quality fast food and 'energy-dense' foods result in higher rates of obesity, diabetes, and heart disease - all preventable through social, and cultural governance and education about the current urban retail planning associated with development plans for the future of Redfern.

The connections between McDonald's outlets and spiraling obesity worldwide are well evidenced. The locales chosen for McDonald's establishments specifically exploit some of the world's poorest communities. Tackling health inequalities is central to reducing spiraling rates of obesity. Levels of obesity in Australian Indigenous communities are 1.5 times higher than in non-Indigenous peoples and 76% higher in inner regional areas (The 2018–19 National Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Health Survey). Obesity and overweight is a global health problem and associated with a significant reduction in life expectancy (OECD 2014; Peeters et al. 2003; Sevoyan et al. 2019).

Some of the strategies used by McDonald's include using toys and subsidised happy meals in their food promos to prey on those most vulnerable. The junk food marketing ethics imposed on children in the name of profit maximization by McDonald's demonstrate their lack of corporate social responsibility (CSR). Without the appropriate health, safety, and wellbeing policy levers within local government, it is of critical concern that the assessors of the current McDonald's DA consider their worldwide reputation for deceitful marketing, disregard for CSR, and the welfare of local communities.

As a local member of the Aboriginal community, I'm highly aware of the desperate need and demand for food stamps and parcels is growing. Over the past two years, organisations such as Mudgin-gal, which support women and domestic and family violence have been swamped with people needing emergency assistance, and healthy food is the first critical need. A McDonald's venue will further impact the struggle in our community who are daily managing critical housing, health, and wellbeing concerns within a cost-of-living crisis.

Additionally, the environmental impacts of McDonald's establishments around the world are also well documented. Increases in waste produce an increase in rats, further impacting local native wildlife and their habitats. World Wildlife Fund (WWF) estimated that of the 43% of their plastic landed in landfills, 9% went up in smoke, and 15% was just mismanaged, leaving a recycling rate of only 34%. They are responsible for massive CO2 emissions through supply chains linked to environmentally degrading beef farming, and deforestation. The smell produced by McDonald's venues is also known to waft through the local residential areas, of which many of Refern's locals will be impacted.

Furthermore, the current McDonald's DA proposes to open 24 hours in a strip of recently developed food venues that offer diverse food choices, impose an unfair competitive disadvantage, and are out of sync with the regulated operating hours of the existing local food and bar venues. As of the date this formal Objection is written, there have been no community consultations regarding the 24-hour opening hours, namely with the required groups such as Police, Indigenous community groups, and or local businesses.

As per the City of Sydney, Development Control Plans (DCP 20012), the proposed McDonald's DA is non-compliant with and not limited to, signage, extended trade, and cultural heritage, as the site is located within the Redfern Estate Heritage Conservation Area (Statement of Environmental Effects). The McDonald's DA proposal is not compliant with the values and principles established within the heritage conservation area and contravenes conservation processes and principles for the conservation of Redfern as a place of significant cultural heritage, as also referred to in Article 1 of The Burra Charter, from within The NSW Heritage Manual.

There are currently approximately 5 community gardens in Redfern. Some of these are home to diverse cultural groups growing an incredible number of edibles from around the world. The future of Redfern should be a return to the old ways with our local government's investment in healthy community ventures that support the sharing of locally grown foods, including Indigenous traditional food knowledges and how these foods can be used in different ways.

I am a local Redfern resident writing to oppose the proposed development of a 24/7 McDonald's at 153 Redfern Street due to the significant safety risks and negative impacts it would have on our community.

1. Safety Concerns

Redfern has made significant progress in becoming a vibrant and welcoming local community. However, safety still remains a concern in the area, particularly at night. A 24/7 McDonalds is likely to become a hotspot for loitering, antisocial behaviour, criminal activity, and attracting intoxicated/disruptive individuals as has been proven in other McDonalds locations. I'm writing about this DA on behalf of my partner William and I, who both reside in Redfern.

I/we haven't written to City of Sydney before or objected to any developments despite being in the middle of many, however we feel very strongly about this proposal. We absolutely object this submission for a McDonald's development for a number of reasons written below:

- 1/2) A large amount of pollution and waste would be generated. McDonald's uses almost exclusively single use plastic (including their paper packaging which is plastic lined). Many residents and visitors of Redfern aren't particularly mindful of the environment and for a pocket of inner Sydney that's trying to reform itself (and with many cafes, restaurants and stores planning to open nearby) this build would take the suburbs attractiveness, character and trendiness backwards.
- 3) The above observation of rubbish and waste is realised at and around McDonald's Alexandria, which is a mere 10 minute/1 km walk away on the exact same street.
- 4) A 24/7 McDonald's may not be safe for employees and customers. Redfern after dark particularly on weekends and near the train station attracts troublesome crowds. We don't want to attract more with this as a local hang out

I am writing in opposition to the proposed development application D/2024/1218

There are many objections and they are listed below.

- 1. Community health and well-being: Redfern is home to a large community of First Australians who have had a history of health issues related to obesity, high sugar levels, diabetes, and bad nutrition. This proposal, whilst spruiking the health benefits of their products, is well known for its product fat and carb levels. For example, their smallest burger, the cheeseburger, contains fat 13.1% and carbohydrates 28.5% and is 301 Calories. Note there is no data on other minerals. (https://www.calorieking.com/au/en/foods/f/calories-in-burgers-sandwiches-cheeseburger-burger/rkyMQ8yzSEyRqHD8J5K4CQ). It would take the following to burn off, Swimming 25 mins, Jogging 35 mins, walking 84 mins, cycling 46 mins. Whilst affordable, the product lacks the necessary benefits and does not encourage a healthy lifestyle.
- 2. 4.3 Storage: The proposed development includes a waste storage corral located within the rear portion of the site with rear laneway access. There is no rear lane access to this property. Nor is one outlined in the plans submitted. There are also currently no allocated bin areas for collection. The garbage would be on the street and in front of other businesses or, worse next to a residential property. Have they done a smell registrar because their product stinks!
- 3. Goods Lift on the main street deliveries: The goods lift in the plans is positioned on Redfern Street right near the lights. This operation would impact street traffic, people going to work, parents taking their kids to school, and community meetings in Redfern. The deliveries should not be redirected to Cope Street as the area is already overrun with delivery trucks, and there is a council sign that says "no trucks to stop," but this does not deter delivery vans.

I, as a local resident, am writing to formally object to the planning application for a new McDonald's intending to operate 24/7 at 153 Redfern Street, Redfern NSW 2016.

Reasons for My Objection:

1. Proximity to a Vegan Business

The proposed McDonald's would be located next to Mr. Charlie's, a vegan burger establishment that offers a safe, meat-free environment for its customers. The presence of McDonald's, with its meat-based offerings and associated smells, could disrupt this unique and valued atmosphere. The Odour Amenity Assessment has not considered this an in fact on page 14 shows the windrose for summer a strong wind in south direction where the vegan business is placed relative to the proposed McDonald's.

2. Threat to Small Independent Businesses

The addition of a McCafé poses a significant threat to small, independent businesses in the area, which cannot compete with such a large multinational chain. Local businesses are integral to the character of Redfern, and we have already seen closures, such as the one at 139 Redfern Street. I found the Heritage Impact Statement unsatisfactory as the impact on the locality is only convered thinly in Section 6.

3. Oversaturation of McDonald's Outlets

There are already three McDonald's locations in close proximity—at Waterloo, Ultimo, and Green Square. Adding another outlet in such a small radius seems excessive and unnecessary.

4. Inappropriate Zoning for 24/7 Trading

Redfern is not classified as a "special entertainment precinct" or a zone suitable for 24-hour trading. Recent proposals to extend trading hours to 2:00 AM for low-impact businesses align with changes to NSW small bar laws but do not justify 24/7 operation for a fast-food outlet, which has a much higher impact.

5. Impact on Local Character and Nighttime Quiet

I moved to Redfern a year and a half ago to enjoy the neighborhood's peace and its support for local businesses. A 24/7 McDonald's would disrupt the area with increased noise, traffic, and late-night activity, undermining the community's nighttime tranquility. This is in addition to the construction noise, only which has been addressed in Acoustic & Vibration Assessment - Noise Assessment.

6. Litter and Environmental Concerns

McDonald's outlets are known to generate significant amounts of litter, which could negatively impact the cleanliness and environment of the area. I am deeply concerned about the strain this would place on local waste management and the environment. The Site Waste Minimisation & Management Plan and Statement of Environmental Effects do not consider the waste generated outside due to the production within the premise.

7. Promotion of Unhealthy Lifestyles

Redfern is a hub for healthy living, with parks and co**140** unity initiatives promoting wellness. The

presence of a McDonald's would counteract these efforts, encouraging unhealthy eating habits that are not in line with the area's values.

Conclusion:

Given these concerns, I strongly urge the council to reject the planning application for a 24/7 McDonald's at 153 Redfern Street. Such a development would be detrimental to the community, its businesses, and the environment.

Dear City of Sydney Planning Panel,

I am writing to express my strong objection to the development application D/2024/1218, which proposes alterations to the existing building at 153 Redfern Street, Redfern, for use as a 24-hour McDonald's restaurant.

I am a local resident living in 157 Redfern Street, Redfern. I am pro-development and strongly support investment in the community of Redfern, however, I emphatically believe that a 24-hour McDonald's restaurant located at the entrance to Redfern, right next to the train station, will have an extreme and long-lasting negative impact on the community.

The proposed location is also ironically located next door to the Redfern Medical Centre.

This proposal, if approved, will have severe adverse effects on the local community's health, amenity, and character, and it fails to comply with critical provisions in the Sydney Local Environmental Plan (LEP), the Sydney Development Control Plan (DCP), and the Late-Night Trading Development Control Plan 2007.

The proposal fails to meet key objectives outlined in the Sydney LEP and DCP which prioritise developments that enhance community well-being, support local businesses, and promote sustainable urban environments. The proposed McDonalds:

- Prioritises corporate interests over community needs.
- Fails to adequately address the cumulative impacts on noise, odour and waste management.
- Undermines public health initiatives and environmental sustainability.

The proposed development is located in a **B2 Local Centre Zone**, which has clearly defined objectives under the **Sydney LEP 2012**. These objectives include:

- Providing a mix of retail, business, and community uses to serve the local population.
- Supporting sustainable urban environments and protecting local amenity.

While the proposal satisfies the retail aspect of zoning, it conflicts with other objectives by introducing a business that undermines community well-being, sustainability, and local identity. Specifically:

- Amenity Impact: A 24-hour fast-food restaurant in a predominantly residential
 and mixed-use area would lead to increased noise, traffic congestion, and safety
 concerns, particularly during nighttime hours. These issues directly violate the
 zone's intent to maintain a high standard of living for residents.
- Sustainability Issues: The fast-food model generates excessive waste and
 pollution, contradicting Council's sustainability objectives. McDonald's reliance
 on single-use packaging is inconsistent with environmental commitments
 embedded in the LEP.

1. Health Risks for Students and Low-Income Residents

The **Sydney DCP** emphasizes the importance of public health and well-being, and this proposal directly contradicts those principles.

Redfern is home to many students and low-income individuals who are particularly vulnerable to the negative health impacts associated with fast food. New developments in the area specifically attract these community members to live in Sydney, including new student accommodation and new affordable housing opening in the past year around the corner and across the road from the proposed site.

Fast food's contribution to public health crises, including obesity, diabetes, and cardiovascular disease, is well-documented. A 24-hour McDonald's will encourage overconsumption of high-calorie, low-nutrition meals, contributing to long-term health issues such as obesity, diabetes, and cardiovascular disease.

Research shows that fast-food chains disproportionately affect low-income communities, where healthier options are often less accessible. The presence of a McDonald's in Redfern which is home to many young people, students, low-income residents and the local Aboriginal community could exacerbate existing health inequalities and create further public health challenges for the City of Sydney.

Moreover, local schools and educational institutions are in proximity to the proposed site. The presence of a McDonald's could undermine ongoing efforts to promote healthy eating among students, counteracting public health campaigns aimed at reducing childhood obesity.

2. Threat to Small, Independent Businesses

Redfern is renowned for its cultural diversity and independent businesses, which contribute to its unique character. As a Redfern local, I have come to meet and know many of the local business owners who are at the heart of the community.

Redfern's vibrant community is defined by its unique blend of small, independent cafes, restaurants, and retail outlets. The introduction of a multinational fast-food chain threatens the livelihoods of these local business owners, who cannot compete with McDonald's aggressive pricing strategies and brand recognition.

Local cafes and eateries will struggle to compete with McDonald's aggressive pricing and marketing strategies. This could lead to closures, reducing diversity and local employment opportunities.

Redfern's distinctive identity, rooted in community spirit and grassroots enterprise, will be diluted by a corporate presence that prioritises profit over local values.

The closure of independent eateries would not only lead to job losses but also erode the distinct cultural identity of Redfern, replacing diversity and creativity with a homogenous corporate presence.

Over the past 6 months, Redfern has seen a significant number of small businesses close due to inflation and increased rents. More investment needs to occur to support small businesses opening and being successful in Redfern. Allowing McDonald's will have the opposite effect and will decimate the local Redfern small business economy.

4. Noise Pollution and Public Disturbances

Section **3.2 of the Late Night Trading DCP** emphasizes minimising noise impacts on surrounding residential areas. Despite proposed acoustic treatments, the constant flow of delivery operations, operational sounds and large crowds will generate unavoidable noise. Particularly during quieter hours late at night and early in the morning when ambient noise levels are low.

Operating a fast-food restaurant 24 hours a day will result in significant noise pollution from both patrons and delivery operations. Nighttime activity is particularly concerning, as it could disturb residents in this mixed-use neighbourhood, compromising their quality of life.

Late-night gatherings outside the premises may also lead to public disturbances, antisocial behavior, and increased demand for police resources, adding strain to local law enforcement which is already under pressure.

Delivery drivers, often operating late at night, are likely to create additional disturbances through the use of motorbikes or other loud vehicles. Noise generated by trash collection and supply deliveries at off-peak hours further exacerbates this issue.

Moreover, the sound from McDonald's speaker systems, often carries beyond the premises. The repetitive noise of order confirmations, combined with other background noise, contributes to a persistent auditory disruption for nearby residents. These concerns are particularly acute for families with children, elderly residents, students and shift workers who rely on undisturbed rest during nighttime hours.

5. Environmental and Waste Management Concerns

McDonald's operations generate significant amounts of waste, much of which is non-recyclable. Despite proposed waste management plans, it is likely that litter from takeaway packaging will spill into the surrounding streets, parks, and public spaces.

This increased waste would detract from Redfern's cleanliness and environmental sustainability, potentially discouraging eco-conscious residents and visitors from frequenting the area.

Additionally, the development's contribution to greenhouse gas emissions, from increased vehicular traffic to energy-intensive operations, undermines the Council's climate goals.

6. Erosion of Community Character

Redfern has a rich cultural and historical significance, long associated with activism, art, and community spirit. A 24-hour McDonald's is inconsistent with this character and risks diluting the identity of the area.

Rather than supporting multinational corporations, development in Redfern should prioritise initiatives that align with the community's values, such as affordable housing, green spaces, and support for local enterprises.

The proposed McDonald's is located next to one of the town's most prominent art installations, The Redfern Bower, which reflects and celebrates the Redfern community's heritage of the area. Having a McDonald's sit behind this piece would significantly adversely impact the character of this important artwork.

7. Impact on Public Safety

Fast-food establishments open 24/7 are often associated with increased late-night activity, which can lead to heightened safety concerns. This includes loitering, intoxicated behavior, and minor criminal activity, all of which could deter families and other community members from feeling safe in the area.

Similar McDonald's located in Kings Cross and other areas are hubs of anti-social behaviour and activity. Redfern already has challenges with anti-social behaviour and this proposed development will exacerbate these issues.

Conclusion

In light of these concerns, I strongly urge the City of Sydney Council to reject the development application D/2024/1218. Approving this proposal would have farreaching negative consequences for the health, safety, and well-being of Redfern's residents and undermine the community's unique character.

I implore the Council to prioritize developments that support small businesses, promote public health, and enhance the quality of life for all residents.

Thank you for considering my submission. I trust that the Council will act in the best interests of the Redfern community by rejecting this proposal.

As a resident in the immediate area, I am concerned that if the proposal goes ahead, it will have significant negative impacts on our local community, the independent businesses that make up Redfern, and the historic village feeling of our neighbourhood.

Redfern is a suburb of great historical significance and character, and a large, multinational fast food chain will overpower the valued village feeling of our community. There is a real concern that such a large corporation will undercut the small, local, independent businesses that define our neighbourhood and bring so much life and character to our daily lives.

Furthermore, the 24/7 nature of the proposed McDonald's is of concern. This will undoubtedly attract more pedestrian activity to the area, encouraging more drunken, antisocial, noisy, and possibly dangerous behaviour, especially on weekend nights. The proposed site and surrounding streets are high-density residential areas, and the noise pollution and possible disorderly conduct, particularly at night, will have a disruptive and negative affect on nearby residents. It would be more beneficial for the proposed space to be used in a way that positively brings the people of Redfern together – from green grocers, cafes and bakeries, community centres, or libraries.

Thirdly, it is harmful for our community to encourage the consumption of ultra-processed fast food, as this undermines the overall health and wellbeing of our residents, especially that of children and teenagers. McDonald's advertising specifically targets young children, promoting food that is high in fats, salts, and sugars, and the convenience and affordability of such food will undoubtedly have a negative and ongoing impact on people's health. With ongoing concern for Australia's rising obesity rate, it is imperative that council helps promote the health literacy of our community, and part of this is working to make fresh, nutritious, and healthy meals more accessible, convenient, and affordable.

I believe strongly that the application should be rejected on the grounds listed above. Over the last twenty years, there have been numerous investigations into McDonald's ongoing exploitation of workers, low wages, animal cruelty, and detrimental health impacts. I hope that the matters I have raised will prompt productive discussions and that the application will be refused in order to better support our community and allow the unique village of Redfern to thrive.

The proposed McDonalds restaurant on the corner of Redfern and Regent streets, in my view will not enhance the suburb.

My main objections are:

As a local resident in Redfern, I strongly object to the proposed development on Redfern Street.

Vibes & Character

The site being proposed is quite large and very prominent as the gateway to the street, having a Maccas just seems to heavily interfere with the vibe of the street. Redfern Street has flourished into a vibrant village with independent businesses, small bars, and unique restaurants. A McDonald's would disrupt this character, replacing the street's evolving identity with a standard corporate design that doesn't fit our community.

Existing Fast Food Places

There are three existing McDonald's in close proximity, two of them are within 15min walking distance. There is one in Ultimo and Waterloo, and another one slightly further away in Green Square. It does not seem like the area is begging for yet another Maccas.

There are also at least 3 existing burger joints right in this area. Mr Charlie's (right next to the proposed site), Huxtaburger right across the road from proposed site and Big Daddy's Burger which is just across the Redfern Police station. I am probably missing other ones. That is only mentioning the specifically 'burger places' and not fast food generally, e.g. Dominos.

It also strikes me as quite petty for Maccas to decide to try and open shop right next to a vegan burger place that has been deemed the 'Vegan Maccas', most likely why they picked the location to probably put them out of business.

Community & Environmental Impacts

Aside from the fact that of it being a McDonald's, going for a 24/7 plan as well despite the area not being classified as a special entertainment precinct where nothing is open for 24/7, even the Dominos closes shop at 1am seems to me that it will make the noise problems even worse. I expect this will also add more vehicle and foot traffic, and increase the amount of delivery in an already busy area / busy foot paths.

If you have ever been to the McDonald's in Broadway, you would also know that McDonald's typically generates significant waste, worsening local litter issues and straining waste management. The resulting mess would impact the area's appearance and may attract pests.

Alternative Suggestions

As a local resident, I am not opposed to **anything** opening in that area but would rather someone opens that is actually needed / wanted by the local community

I think the area is sufficiently full of cafes, fast food and restaurants personally, not every site has to become a venue for food/drink. I would be open for the council to consider re-use of the site for independent businesses, or to support community focused enterprises instead. For example, something like 107 Projects, Redfern Street or similar creative

spaces (Nest Creative Space, 14 Vine Street).

Conclusion

We are writing to object to the DA submitted by McDonald's Australia for a new restaurant on Redfern Street, Redfern. We are local reisdents of 30 years and are very concerned about the negative impacts this development would have on our community's character, local businesses, and public amenity.

Character and Heritage Impact

Redfern Street has undergone a careful transformation over the past 15 years, developing into a vibrant village atmosphere characterised by independent businesses, small bars, and quality restaurants. The proposed McDonald's development would be incompatible with this established character and would undermine the progress made in creating a distinctive local identity. The standardized corporate design elements typical of McDonald's restaurants would detract from the street's evolving urban village aesthetic.

I should like to object to the submission on the following grounds.

Firstly, no DA notice has been posted on the proposed development site. Surely that is a legal requirement.

#The proposed development would impact on traffic and pedestrian safety on an already precariously busy corner.

MacDonalds is an ill-fitting business for Redfern's community which is becoming more and more a haven for independent, interesting and niche businesses. This is a trend which should be lauded and encouraged, strengthening the village feel of Redfern. The introduction of a fast-food mega chain business would be discordant with this ambience and impact financially on the local small businesses.

The argument that a MacDonalds would be a great amenity for the burgeoning population due to the new high rise developments is inappropriate. Already there are a formidable number of cafes, restaurants, take-aways, pub restaurants and supermarkets capable of catering to the community's population. A count has revealed that there are approximately 60 such businesses in the immediate vicinity. Furthermore, online services such as Uber Eats and Deliveroo have always been alternative platforms for the time-poor.

Consumption of junk food should not be encouraged in vulnerable communities. The residents of the housing commission complexes and school children would be at risk of having their diets seriously compromised.

The demographic of the average McDonalds customer is one who disregards environmental and ecological concerns .A cursory glance around Sydney streets reveals a high volume of MacDonalds litter: bags, boxes, straws, wrappers, drink containers and leftover food. This would impact on waste management services as well as the visual amenity of the neighbourhood of Redfern, in particular, the small park adjacent to the proposed development.

Lastly, a similar proposal by MacDonalds was submitted to Marrickville Council in 2023. The community's objections were acknowledged by the Council and the proposal was rejected. We are also hoping that City of Sydney Council will also listen to the village voice.

I wish to register my strong objection to this DA, for several reasons.

The documentation for this DA provided by the applicant is flawed and contains many factual errors. For example, the plan of management refers to CCTV in the car park, when no carpark exists; and the waste management plan refers to rear lane access for the waste disposal area, which is indicated in Figure 1 of that document, when in fact no rear lane access exists and Figure 1 clearly shows the waste disposal area adjacent to the main public entrance on Redfern Street.

Fundamental flaws such as this indicate the probability of more factual errors and demonstrate a contemptuous 'cut and paste' approach to the DA by the applicant. The photograph on the cover page of the plan of management document for McDonalds Redfern depicts a suburban location of the franchise surrounded by a carpark! It bears no resemblance whatsoever to the particularities of this location. Such sloppy documentation is simply not good enough.

I have made a thorough search of the documents provided and nowhere is there adequate information regarding waste disposal and bin emptying procedures by rubbish trucks, where the bins will be placed (presumably on the footpath as there is nowhere else to put them), and what measures are in place to address overflowing - the waste management report bases bin usage on waste generated by McDonalds only. It is profoundly naive to think that bins lining the footpath (there is simply nowhere else to put them) will not be filled by rubbish from elsewhere. Where exactly will the rubbish trucks be stopping to empty these bins? The site is on a very busy corner of a 2-lane road on the Redfern Street side of the site (the gutter lane devoted to parking until very near the intersection with Regent St), and the Cope Street frontage is pedestrian only. Therefore, rubbish trucks will be stopping on Redfern Street to empty the bins - this is a major vehicular route to Regent Street, and a major pedestrian route through to Redfern Station. Not one document addresses the traffic management issues this will create on a busy intersection, nor pedestrian safety issues of rubbish trucks emptying large wheelie bins on a busy pedestrian thoroughfare.

I am also deeply concerned about the impacts of a 24-hour operation which I do not consider appropriate for this location, given that in the absence of any other 24-hour operations nearby, people will congregate on what is a thoroughfare to Redfern Station and bus stops. For late night travellers I believe this poses a safety issue. None of the documents refer to any consultation with local police regarding late night street safety issues in the area. It is profoundly irresponsible to propose a 24-hour operation without consulting law enforcement agencies in an area that historically has struggled with street crime.

As a long-term resident of Redfern (over 23 years) I have seen profound changes in the neighbourhood, especially in terms of the vibrancy and dynamism of the small businesses, bars and restaurants which have revitalised Redfern Street. The essence of that street is the individual, unique, stand-alone businesses - apart from Dominoes there are no franchise chain businesses. This is what gives the street its priceless local neighbourhood feel, instead of being a soulless strip of fast-food chain stores - franchises who by economies of scale squeeze out individual businesses who cannot afford to compete. The vibrancy of Redfern Street will not benefit from a McDonalds in this regard and will no doubt adversely impact the diverse local venues who simply cannot compete with a global franchise's cheaper prices.

It is that last point that is of particular concern to me. Regardless of whatever claims McDonalds may attempt to make about providing healthy food options, their business is based on burgers, fries and soft drinks - none of which

offer nutritional value and encourage unhealthy eating, given the cheap prices, in an area with a large socioeconomically disadvantaged population and its incumbent associated health issues. McDonald's cheap prices make these people easy targets for "food" with almost no nutritional value whatsoever, perpetuating health and lifestyle impacts.

For all these reasons, I urge council to reject this DA.

I'm a Redfern resident with a unit i own across the road from the proposed location (Lawson Square is where my property is).

Redfern has enormous potential as a thriving suburb but after living there for a number of years, there are a few key things holding it back:

Adding a 24/7 McDonalds i believe will directly and negatively impact all 3 points further.

If the proposal goes ahead, there needs to be some local mitigants such as on the spot \$250 fines for littering etc as our streets in redfern can't cope with anymore waste or litter piling up. - 3) 24/7 premises attract unsavoury behaviour. I write to express my strong opposition to the development application for a McDonald's restaurant on Redfern Street. This proposal threatens the character and amenity of our neighbourhood on multiple levels.

Community Character and Heritage

Redfern Street has undergone a thoughtful transformation in recent years, developing into a vibrant community hub characterised by:

- Independent, locally-owned businesses.
- Cultural diversity and Indigenous heritage.
- Small-scale hospitality venues.
- A strong "village" atmosphere that supports community connection.

The introduction of a large corporate chain would fundamentally disrupt this carefully cultivated local character. The standardised corporate design, signage, and operation model of McDonald's stands in stark contrast to the unique identity our street has developed.

Social and Economic Impact

The proposed location is particularly sensitive given its proximity to:

- Jarjum Indigenous primary school.
- Inner Sydney High School.
- Substantial social housing populations.
- At least four existing small burger restaurants Huxtaburger, Big Daddy Burger, Mr Charlie's, Suburgia, plus there are burgers available at all the pubs and the fish and chip shop less than 200 metres away in George Street.
- Multiple small food businesses.

The viability of our local businesses, many of which are family-owned and enterprises that contribute to the street's character, would be threatened by this development. Moreover, the existing McDonald's in Waterloo (1.6km away) already adequately serves the area, including via delivery services.

Trading Hours and Residential Amenity

The proposed extended trading hours are inappropriate for what is fundamentally a residential neighbourhood. Unlike entertainment precincts such as Oxford Street or Kings Cross, Redfern is home to a diverse residential community including families, elderly residents, and social housing tenants.

Extended trading would:

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- Generate unnecessary noise and disruption.
- Attract late-night crowds from other areas.
- · Impact resident safety and comfort.
- Increase traffic during typically quiet periods.

Environmental and Infrastructure Impact

Our community already faces significant challenges with:

- Street litter from existing takeaway establishments.
- Pressure on waste management services.
- Traffic congestion.
- · Limited parking availability.
- Loading zone conflicts.

A McDonald's operation would substantially exacerbate these issues through:

- High-volume packaging waste.
- Increased delivery vehicle traffic.

At it's heart Redfern is a residential community supported by a large number of small businesses. A significant number of these business are hospitality enterprises. I object to the proposed McDonald's development on the following grounds:

- Economic harm to existing small businesses
- · Nature of business and hours of operation inconsistent with a residential community
- Detrimental to the community amenity
- Development inconsistent with the Council's Strategic Plan

Economic Harm

I have been a resident of Redfern for 36 years and I have seen various 'developments' that have been detrimental to the community and the overall amenity of the suburb.

Redfern Street has historically been the economic hub of Redfern. Initially it was literally a 'community village'. There was an array of small business that you would traditionally find in a small retail hub. In the 1980s these included a butcher, fruit and vegetable retailer, restaurants and an assortment of retail business offering a wide range of products and services.

In the 1990s these community focussed businesses were replaced with 'outlet stores' and 'seconds' retailers. Redfern Street then slowly deteriorated into a wasteland of vacant premises all shuttered. The area was very unattractive.

In recent years with the support of the City of Sydney Redfern has once again started to come alive with new small businesses investing in the community. The proprietors of these businesses are the ones that have created what is now an appealing precinct. Many of these businesses are in the hospitality sector and will suffer economic harm with the opening of a multi-national fast-food conglomerate such as McDonald's.

McDonald's business model is to build market share and profit and not invest in our local community. Their aim will be to take business away from existing small business who have invested in this community for a long time.

Approval of this development will result in existing businesses suffering economic harm and, in some cases, result in closure.

Nature of Business and Hours of Operation

Redfern is a residential community, not an 'entertainment hub'. A 24/7 McDonald's is inconsistent with a residential area.

A McDonald's enterprise will not bring any economic or social benefit to the area.

Non-residents are currently attracted to the area to support the local bars, cafes and restaurants in a heritage area. The McDonald's franchise will destroy the heritage amenity of the local surroundings.

The scale of the operation, prime corner position and advertising are all clear indicators the business is appealing to passing road traffic, not foot traffic.

Detrimental to the Community

Any 24/7 operation is going to draw to the area non-residents who late at night will have nothing else to do than loiter.

This business will impact traffic flow as there is no parking and this will result in attempts to 'double park', take up approaches to the traffic lights and impact nearby bus stands. These hazards will occur regardless of the hours of operation.

Vehicles approaching from the north along Regent Street and from the east along Redfern Street will have no safe means of accessing the site without causing significant disruption and become dangerous for pedestrians.

The proposed design of the building and associated advertising can at best be described as 'visual pollution' and have no other aim than to be marketing for a multi-national. This is contrary to the heritage nature of the surrounding area.



McDonald's as a business enterprise historically have not been able to manage their patrons disposing of takeaway packaging responsibly. There is nothing in their business model to mitigate this. It will be a given that McDonald's packaging will not be disposed of responsibly in the area. The packaging will end in up in local streets and close by parks placing the responsibility on to Council to clean this up.

Inconsistent with City of Sydney Strategic Plan

A McDonald's operation in Redfern is inconsistent with the Council's stated objectives on the following grounds:

- · Council states that they aim to support the community
 - How does supporting a conglomerate such as McDonald's benefit the many local business that will lose business because of this development
- · City of Sydney wants to look after the environment
 - McDonald's have not been able to adequately solve the problem of the packaging that their patrons do not dispose
 of appropriately or responsibly.
- Look after old and special places in Sydney
 - o Redfern is special and old, its character should be preserved
- Enable residents to access 'healthy' food options
 - We do not need another McDonald's when there is multiple alternate McDonald's in close proximity to the proposed development (Waterloo, Green Square, Haymarket, Broadway, Central Sydney)

As an owner of a property at Redfern, I wish to object to D/2024/1218 submitted by SLR Consulting for the proposed 24 hours McDonalds food and drink premises on the following grounds:

- Increased Traffic and Congestion: The proposal is likely to result in a significant increase in traffic volumes
 in the surrounding area, particularly during peak periods. This could exacerbate existing congestion issues
 and create safety concerns for pedestrians and local residents.
- Noise Pollution: A 24-hour operation will generate continuous noise, including from vehicles, customers, and deliveries, which could negatively impact the amenity of nearby residential areas, especially during latenight hours.
- Public Amenity and Litter:
 - The establishment has only 12 seats, meaning customers will likely consume food in the streets, decreasing public amenity and increasing rubbish in the area.
 - There is only room for a single garbage bin inside the restaurant for customer use. This lack of
 adequate waste disposal facilities will lead to rubbish being discarded in the streets, further degrading
 the area's cleanliness and attractiveness.
 - The Plan of Management notes that litter patrols will be conducted only three times within a 24-hour period. This frequency is insufficient for a restaurant of this scale and capacity and should be increased to hourly.

Parking and Safety Concerns:

- There is no provision for car parking or dedicated bike parking, which is insufficient to meet the demand of food delivery riders. Riders will be forced to park on footpaths, obstructing pedestrian access and increasing safety hazards for the public.
- The Plan of Management fails to address how bike parking will be managed or how public amenity will be maintained with regard to footpath access.
- Physical Security: The Plan of Management does not adequately address how physical security measures will be used to ensure the safety of staff and the public. For a restaurant of this scale and capacity, there should be a mandated in-person security presence during all trading hours to mitigate potential safety risks.
- Waste Management:
 - The Waste Management Plan has failed to make it clear how waste (including used oil, food scraps, and general waste) will be removed from the premises during the 'Operation' phase.
 - Given that there is no direct access to Regent Street and the Redfern Street frontage is designated as 'No Stopping,' it is unclear how waste removal will be conducted without compromising public safety and amenity.
- Impact on Local Businesses: The introduction of a large-scale fast food chain may undermine smaller, locally owned food and drink businesses, which are integral to the community's identity and economic diversity.
- Adverse Impact on the Character of the Area: The proposed development may not align with the existing character of the area, which prioritises community-oriented spaces and quiet enjoyment by residents.

I have been a resident of Redfern for 20 years, living on George Street, and I want to expand on my previous submission regarding this development application. I have serious concerns about the proposed McDonald's and its potential impact on our community.

Over the past two decades, I have witnessed significant positive changes in Redfern. There was a time when taxi drivers refused to pick up or drop off due to the area's dangerous reputation. Walking home from the train station after dark felt unsafe. However, thanks to the efforts of the City of Sydney Council and community initiatives—such as those led by the local Indigenous organisation, Tribal Warrior—Redfern has transformed into a safer, more vibrant neighbourhood. Crime rates have declined, and there is now a growing sense of community pride.

The improvement of parks, footpaths, and streetscapes has fostered a thriving local economy, with independent businesses—cafés, restaurants, pubs, and bars—bringing new life to the area. Many of these small businesses already struggle to survive, and the introduction of a large commercial chain like McDonald's could threaten their viability.

Furthermore, there is no precedent for a 24/7 business in this part of Redfern. Similar establishments elsewhere have been linked to increased anti-social behaviour, violence, and crime, particularly at night when other businesses are closed. As a woman and a parent, I am deeply concerned for my safety and my teenage child's safety when traveling to and from the station after dark.

Another major concern is the inevitable increase in litter. Fast-food outlets, particularly those operating late at night, often contribute to significant waste issues and street litter. Redfern has worked hard to improve its public spaces, and an influx of discarded packaging and food waste would undermine these efforts, making our streets and parks less inviting and increasing the burden on local waste management services.

I am writing to formally object to the proposed development application for a 24/7 McDonald's at the corner of Redfern Street and Regent Street, Redfern. As a local resident living within 500 metres of this location, I have significant concerns about the impact this development would have on the surrounding community.

Pedestrian Congestion and Safety Risks

The footpaths in this location are not wide enough to accommodate the increased foot traffic, particularly from delivery drivers and cyclists. Given the already congested nature of this area, adding a high-volume fast-food outlet would create unnecessary obstructions, impacting pedestrian safety and accessibility.

Increased Litter and Environmental Concerns

The surrounding pavements, grassed areas, and the nearby bus stop already suffer from significant litter issues. I am writing to express my deep concern and strong opposition to the opening of a McDonalds in Redfern.

It is my opinion as local resident and medical doctor that opening a McDonalds would pose a risk to the health and safety of residents for several reasons.

- 1. Extremely unhealthy food: McDonald's food is widely recognised amongst the worst fast food outlets with a terrible nutritional profile. Our local community has a high proportion of elderly, young families and first nations persons. These people are vulnerable to cheap and fast food options which are associated with worsening of heart disease, diabetes, peripheral vascular disease and childhood obesity to name a few. I feel it incredibly irresponsible of a council to allow such easy access to such an unhealthy option that will no doubt thrive in the proposed location.
- **2. Litter and waste:** I believe this precinct of Sydney council has a disproportionate amount of litter and waste to attend to and that a McDonalds will make it worse. I know this because of the tens and tens of notifications to council I have made about waste issues (see my email thread over the past 2 years in particular see emails from

Application the council is linked to). A McDonalds will undoubtedly contribute a huge amount of waste that the council will not be able to keep up with, evidenced by it not being able to keep up with the current amounts in many locations. Litter and waste are more than an eyesore. They have allowed the Ibis population to boom which has lead to huge amounts of bird poo and debris, particularly in Redfern park. Hi Matthew and City of Sydney Council,

I hope you are well.

I am writing to oppose the application for a 24/7 McDonalds at 153 Redfern Street, Redfern, NSW, 2016.

Redfern has a long and complicated history. An area where people were once reticent to go to, let alone live in, has gentrified greatly thanks to significant hard work by the local community. Great strides have been made by the community to continuously improve the area, in terms of promoting the area as a place where our aboriginal community can flourish and feel less discriminated against, reducing crime and generally to further gentrify the area with cafes, bars, creative spaces, contemporary art spaces, parks etc. There is still a long way to go in Redfern to make it the village that us locals wish it to be. For example, Red Suburbs Australia (Crime map of Australia) states that Redfern is 'a relatively unsafe area. Crime exists and may impact most people'.

With this context in mind, the reasons the McDonalds in Redfern must be rejected for our community are outlined below:

- 1. Redfern is a village of Sydney which must be respected and treated sensitively Villages of Sydney should not include large American, multi-national, 24/7, fast food corporations. It is insensitive to place such an establishment at this location. Such establishments belong in locations such as the McDonald's on George St, Sydney or on other main roads in Sydney not within local villages.
- 2. The demographic make up of Redfern must be treated sensitively Redfern comprises of ~21% housing commission and ~4% are Aboriginal (refer 2021 census). These are disadvantaged communities who will not benefit from a fast food chain dominating Redfern's village. Obesity, and it's related diseases, are only second to smoking in terms of contributing to disease burden in Australia source https://www.abs.gov.au/articles/neighbourhood-impacts-health . It is well documented that lower socio demographic communities are the most disadvantaged by access to fast food.
- 3. Small businesses in Redfern's village will be negatively impacted and have expressed their concern about the proposal Refer to quotes from the local community and local business owners in news.com.au article ''Backwards': suburb furious over new 24/7 Macca's'. Quotes from locals include:
 - 'significant urban planning concerns'
 - ' the franchise would impact community, amenity and heritage'
 - 'insensitive'
 - 'I know a lot of social problems that are in existence in the area.... I just can't see any positivity whatsoever'
 - 'very surprised' if granted 24 hour trading
 - the last few years Redfern has been changing for the positive. I think this is a step backwards'
 - 'before you put another fast food outlet into the centre of Redfern, get the noise, rubbish disposal and street cleaning under control'
 - 'no way. We don't need McDonald's in the Fern. Too many small family run cafes are under financial pressure just to keep trading'

Additionally, McDonalds proposed location next to Mr Charlies is incredibly insensitive. Could there be a more visual representation of a corporate 'David vs Goliath' battle in Redfern? This is not what the village of Redfern stands for.

4. Street litter is a significant problem in Redfern already, a McDonald's, particularly a 24/7 one, will create

much more at litter from customers that we as a community will have to clean up as the council already is unable to keep up with the clean up needed from the litter caused by people already. I have regularly organised community clean up groups to clean up litter left on our streets.

5. Safety - a 24/7 McDonald's will attract late night activity, including crime, that will negatively impact the residents and broader community. Crime is a significant problem in Redfern (refer to the statistics above). A 24/7 McDonald's will just create additional work on the already strained resources of the Redfern police and surrounding areas police.

There is no positive to come for our beloved community by having a McDonald's within our village. Council must act in the interests of the community and reject this proposal.

The proposed location is particularly sensitive given its proximity to:

- Inner Sydney High School.
- Jarjum primary school.
- Significant social housing populations.

The introduction of a large fast-food chain could disproportionately impact vulnerable community members, particularly school children. Research has shown that the presence of fast-food outlets near schools can influence students' dietary choices and health outcomes.

Market Saturation and Economic Impact

The proposal is unnecessary and potentially harmful to local business for several reasons:

There are already five specialist hamburger establishments operating successfully in the vicinity.

An existing McDonald's operates just 1.6km away in Waterloo.

The area is already well-served by McDonald's delivery services via platforms like Uber Eats.

The introduction of a large corporate chain would likely impact the viability of existing local food businesses, many of which are small, family-owned operations that contribute to the area's unique character.

Environmental Concerns

Our community already faces significant challenges with street litter, which notably increased following the opening of Domino's Pizza. McDonald's restaurants typically generate substantial waste through packaging and disposable items. This would likely:

Increase pressure on local waste management services.

Add to street litter problems.

Impact the visual amenity of the area.

Potentially attract vermin.

Increase the burden on local council cleaning services.

Traffic and Amenity

The proposed development would likely:

Increase vehicle traffic for both customers and delivery services.

Create additional noise, particularly during late-night hours.

Generate additional foot traffic during school hours.

Impact local parking availability.

Alternative Suggestions

Rather than approving this development, I urge the Council to consider:

- 1. Encouraging the adaptive reuse of the building for local, independent businesses.

Dear Matthew and Councillors,

I am writing to express my **strong opposition** to the proposed development of a 24-hour fast food outlet in our town centre as outlined in D/2024/1218 and located at 153 Redfern Street REDFERN. As a resident of Regent Street Chippendale and local to the Redfern town centre, I have several concerns regarding this development. These being:

- 1. Impact on Local Small Businesses: The introduction of a multi-national fast food chain will have a detrimental effect on our local small business owners, who are already facing significant challenges. Supporting local businesses is crucial for maintaining the unique character and economic health of our community. Documentation supplied by the applicant uses general statements to substantiate its claims that this development will "contribute socially and economically in <sic> the local area" (Statement of Environmental Effects p17). It is able to make broad statements about "local" economic impact (5.6.5 p20) or employment opportunities (5.6.4 p19) or sourcing "local" by aggregating their national network of outlets while not having any actual detail of impact within the postcode. They say: "McDonald's menu is made-up primarily of locally sourced ingredients and products, with more than 90% of the food and drink served manufactured in Australia." In this sentence they use "locally sourced" to mean anything manufactured in Australia. They have listed "9,000 suppliers in Australia" as evidence of hypothetical impact to Redfern suppliers what are the specifics of this claim? Which suppliers have they listed specifically that operate in the 2016 postcode? How will the impact of this outlet on other business be measured?
- 2. Health Outcomes: The availability of fast food around the clock poses a risk to the health of at-risk members of our community. Increased access to unhealthy food options can contribute to poor dietary habits and exacerbate existing health issues, particularly among vulnerable populations. Their documentation states that their "range" of products have changed but this doesn't mean they've eliminated sugary drinks or fatty deserts. They're still incentivising unhealthy options and targeting children and young people. We know the Redfern community has specific demographics. Why would the City of Sydney knowingly increase access to outlets such as these?
- 3. Sustainability and waste management: In the 'Statement of Environmental Effect' document the applicant devotes an entire section to "5.7 Ecologically Sustainable Development" pp20-21. It lists how amazing the company is because it developed "five identified sustainability pillars" in 2008. And despite this long standing commitment to sustainability the only action it could list against this specific store is "by having the building appropriately insulated to help improve building energy efficiency". What are they doing regarding generating and storing their own energy? What about their heating and cooling systems for the restaurant? What lighting and alternatives to gas are they proposing? The City of Sydney offers Green Building Grants which require more evidence of interest in sustainability that what this multinational has put forward. Insulation of a building? Not good enough.
- **4. Heritage and Community:** Having reviewed the 'Statement of Environmental Effects' and 'Heritage impact statement' it seems that the significance of the area around Redfern to Aboriginal heritage and community, past and present, has been ignored. According to the applicants documents the existence of Aboriginal people seems to stop at "early occupation" and are generally "outside the scope of this report and services provided by NBRS." Where is there any evidence in the applicant's documentation in recognising the impact of colonisation, the significance of Redfern, and engagement with existing communities within metres of the proposed outlet? Why couldn't they list targeted recruitment strategies and training opportunities for people that identify as Aboriginal, or a systematic approach to

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Equity, Diversity and Inclusion rather than "It is also through diverse employment and training opportunities, particularly for young people." p19 (This sentence doesn't even make sense). What about sponsorship with local charities - where is evidence of specific examples? What is the specific impact of this outlet on our communities? As far as I can tell this application completely ignores the real local context and people that make up the "local" community, but rather uses generalisations applicable to any of their applications Australia-wide.

I urge the City of Sydney and panel considering this application to review these points and the long-term implications of this development on our community. I strongly believe that prioritising the well-being of our residents and our local economy should take precedence over the interests of a multi-national corporation.

Impact on Local Small Businesses: The introduction of a multi-national fast food chain will have a detrimental effect on our local small business owners, who are already facing significant challenges. Supporting local businesses is crucial for maintaining the unique character and economic health of our community. Documentation supplied by the applicant uses general statements to substantiate its claims that this development will "contribute socially and economically in <sic> the local area" (Statement of Environmental Effects p17). It is able to make broad statements about "local" economic impact (5.6.5 p20) or employment opportunities (5.6.4 p19) or sourcing "local" by aggregating their national network of outlets while not having any actual detail of impact within the postcode. They say: "McDonald's menu is made-up primarily of locally sourced ingredients and products, with more than 90% of the food and drink served manufactured in Australia." In this sentence they use "locally sourced" to mean anything manufactured in Australia. They have listed "9,000 suppliers in Australia" as evidence of hypothetical impact to Redfern suppliers what are the specifics of this claim? Which suppliers have they listed specifically that operate in the 2016 postcode? How will the impact of this outlet on other business be measured?
- 2. Health Outcomes: The availability of fast food around the clock poses a risk to the health of at-risk members of our community. Increased access to unhealthy food options can contribute to poor dietary habits and exacerbate existing health issues, particularly among vulnerable populations. Their documentation states that their "range" of products have changed but this doesn't mean they've eliminated sugary drinks or fatty deserts. They're still incentivising unhealthy options and targeting children and young people. We know the Redfern community has specific demographics. Why would the City of Sydney knowingly increase access to outlets such as these?
- 3. Sustainability and waste management: In the 'Statement of Environmental Effect' document the applicant devotes an entire section to "5.7 Ecologically Sustainable Development" pp20-21. It lists how amazing the company is because it developed "five identified sustainability pillars" in 2008. And despite this long standing commitment to sustainability the only action it could list against this specific store is "by having the building appropriately insulated to help improve building energy efficiency". What are they doing regarding generating and storing their own energy? What about their heating and cooling systems for the restaurant? What lighting and alternatives to gas are they proposing? The City of Sydney offers Green Building Grants which require more evidence of interest in sustainability that what this multinational has put forward. Insulation of a building? Not good enough.
- 4. Heritage and Community: Having reviewed the 'Statement of Environmental Effects' and 'Heritage impact statement' it seems that the significance of the area around Redfern to Aboriginal heritage and community, past and present, has been ignored. According to the applicants documents the existence of Aboriginal people seems to stop at "early occupation" and are generally "outside the scope of this report and services provided by NBRS." Where is there any evidence in the applicant's documentation in recognising the impact of colonisation, the significance of Redfern, and engagement with existing communities within metres of the proposed outlet? Why couldn't they list targeted recruitment strategies and training opportunities for people that identify as Aboriginal, or a systematic approach to

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Equity, Diversity and Inclusion rather than "It is also through diverse employment and training opportunities, particularly for young people." p19 (This sentence doesn't even make sense). What about sponsorship with local charities - where is evidence of specific examples? What is the specific impact of this outlet on our communities? As far as I can tell this application completely ignores the real local context and people that make up the "local" community, but rather uses generalisations applicable to any of their applications Australia-wide.

I urge the City of Sydney and panel considering this application to review these points and the long-term implications of this development on our community. I strongly believe that prioritising the well-being of our residents and our local economy should take precedence over the interests of a multi-national corporation.

I am writing to you about the planning permission D/2024/1218 which if successful will place a McDonalds on the corner of Regent and Redfern Street.

As part of the Redfern community, I am deeply concerned about the prospect of a fast food restaurant in the suburb, particularly given it will provide a significant number of unhealthy nutritional food & drink options to an already disadvantaged population.

My main points of concern are as follows:

- Given Redfern's geographic population, I fear this will lead to cheap, non nutritional food options, placing more strain on the Indigenous population (at a time where we need to be improving the health & wellness of the broader population). As you know, Redfern has historical and political significance to the Aboriginal community and the advancement of Indigenous rights and there is also a significant volume of social housing in Redfern.
- Significant pressure on already struggling local businesses
- Risk of added traffic at that junction, creating more of a risk to pedestrians & residents.
- It will create a significant amount of litter & waste
- 24 hours will likely lead to late night gatherings and the prospect of additional noise for residents.

I've lived in Redfern since 2009 and have appreciated the progress in amenities in the area during this time.

The wide variety of cafes, bars and restaurants is a draw card for residents and visitors to Redfern who come here for the nightlife, food choices and vibe.

When I first saw that there was a McDonalds proposed for this area, right on the corner of Redfern and Regent Streets, I was shocked that this is even being considered for this location for several reasons:

- extreme competition to small business owners in the area with the 24/7 opening hours and cheap food;
- traffic concerns with the amount of rubbish trucks and deliveries at one of the busiest crossing areas in Redfern;
- security requirements seem non-existent and are focused on asking people to leave
 what happens outside the premises?
- 24/7 trading hours should be earned and not presumed to have just because they are McDonald's.

I do not think that McDonalds is the right fit for this location and the application should not be approved.

Security and Incidents

The Duty Manager role will have their hands full with the amount of monitoring and work they will need to do 24 hours per day... Following details from the "Plan of Management" document just a few of the duties are:

- The Duty Manager will ensure that customers keep noise to an appropriate level upon entering and leaving the premises.
- The Duty Manager will ask customers making any inappropriate noise to leave quietly and quickly and ask any customers loitering to move on
- The Duty Manager will ensure that the adjoining footpath, gutter, building entry, and surrounds are clean and clear of litter at all times.

How can one role of Duty Manager, do all of this to a high level, 24 hours per day, and manage a cafe? Delegation of some of these duties to a junior staff member is the most likely scenario.

Staff training can only cover so much. Confronting drunk or drug affected groups of people in the middle of the night, or any time, is a lot for a mature adult to handle let alone if delegated to a more junior staff member.

There are 7 bars very close by (Hustle & Flow Bar, The Dock, Beercade, Hotel Regent Sydney, Arcadia, The Noble Hops, The Redfern) to this proposed development and I seriously doubt one person can manage a high level of drug and alcohol affected people.

The security requirements seem non-existent and are focused on asking people to leave – what happens outside the premises once these people leave? Is everyone else left to fend for themselves?

Will there be a security guard hired to help manage noise and other security issues that arise on the weekends, or will all incidents be directed to police? How will this impact police resources in the local area?

Waste management

There are questions raised from the following details from the "Plan of Management" document:

From "4.7 Cleaning of the Surrounding Public Domain "

- A litter patrol area will be determined prior to occupation. McDonald's operations generally instruct litter patrols at the following times: • After Sunrise; • Midday; and • Before Sunset.
- Additional litter patrols may be carried out on Saturday and Sunday mornings, subject to litter generation. Vandalism and graffiti will be removed (where possible) within 24 hours.

How will the litter patrol area be determined and by whom? How do residents in the nearby community have their location included in the litter patrol if they are impacted with litter?

Will the litter patrol be going up and down Redfern and Regent Streets? Will the graffiti patrol monitor these streets as well?

The "Additional litter patrols may be carried out on Saturday and Sunday mornings, subject to litter generation" should be essential on the weekends, not just "subject to litter generation" – how will they know there is more litter generation if they don't check? These extra rubbish patrols should be the minimum requirement if the opening hours are 24/7, or even 7:00am to 12:00 midnight.

Traffic

In the "Statement of Environmental Effects" document, it mentions that the removal of on-site waste and deliveries will take place at the kerb. This corner on Redfern Street is incredibly busy, and there is a left turning lane into Regent Street.

The volume of rubbish and deliveries will be quite large – rubbish bins will be 4×320 litre bins and 2×240 litre bins, which will take time to empty/unload, and this will cause traffic delays. How will this be managed or reviewed in the future?

The crossing across Regent Street is high volume, with people trying to get to the train station and to other services in the area, and will also have to deal with extra foot traffic, drunk people and bigger crowds blocking the footpath at the entrance - all impacting access and security to the area.

Noise Management

In the "Plan of Management" document, "4.6 Noise Management", it says:

The Duty Manager will closely monitor the following noise management procedures:

- The Duty Manager will ensure that customers keep noise to an appropriate level upon entering and leaving the premises. The Duty Manager will ask customers making any inappropriate noise to leave quietly and quickly and ask any customers loitering to move on; and
- Reports of all noise complaints received by the Duty Manager will be documented in a register.

What is the outcome of recording noise complaints in a register? How are they addressed? Are they shared with the public at all?

Multinational corporation competition to local small businesses

There are many small business owned restaurants and cafes in Redfern. These businesses are the main reason that Redfern is now a vibrant and go-to place.

No doubt that the cheap and quick McDonald's food will impact on these local businesses, who are already in a competitive environment.

How will they survive against a large multinational corporation? Do we want to see a Redfern which has shuttered, empty shop fronts again as it was a few years ago before it became a food destination that locals can enjoy?

Trading hours

The proposal mentions the opening hours of 24 hour, 7 day trade – other businesses in the area have had to start with minimum opening hours and then once they have proven themselves, they submit a DA to open later. Why should McDonald's be any different?

They state in the "Statement of Environmental Effects" document, p14:

"A McDonald's operating 24 hours 7 days a week has become an expectation of the general public ensuring that they have access to food and drink in convenient locations throughout all periods of the day and night."

24/7 opening hours for McDonald's is unnecessary, and the opening hours of 7:00am to 12:00 midnight should be the first steps to gain an understanding of rubbish and security issues that will occur. It should be earned and not a right to have 24/7 opening hours.

McDonald's may have the experience of extended nighttime trading, however every suburb is different and have their own issues. Redfern has its own set of needs that would need to be discovered first before 24/7 opening is considered.

I am writing to formally object to the proposed development of a McDonalds on Redfern St, Redfern. As a local resident, I have multiple concerns of the negative impact that the development would have on local business, community character, safety, traffic and rubbish.

Local Business and Community Character

Redfern St and surrounds has developed a great local vibe with small independent businesses, that locals love, and encourage other Sydneysiders to visit as a destination. A lot of work has been done to date to maintain this local vibe and sense of community. Multiple small local businesses sell similar products, so the council would show it does not support local business by allowing a big multinational company to operate in a local area. This type of business goes against the local businesses and the feeling of the area.

Additionally, for anyone who would like McDonalds, McDonalds in Waterloo that is approx. 1km away from the proposed site with a drive through, parking and closes at 2am.

Safety

The risk of crime is increased with 24hr opening, resulting in a likely increase in assaults, robberies and illegal activity. This does make the area safe for coming back from the local restaurants or train station late at night. I as a single woman living in Redfern would not feel safe walking home from the train or Metro station with the type of crime that such 24hr venues attract. Would the Council would be liable for any issues that result from any incidents given multiple residents and the NSW Police have objected on this basis?

<u>Traffic</u>

I am concerned about the impact it will have on traffic in an already busy area. Currently, around the site it is a no stopping zone, so I am unsure how will deliveries be made without impacting local traffic. There is not sufficient parking in the surrounding streets to cope with the size of the proposed development. How will council manage this without impacting local residents?

The development will also increase the number of delivery rider bikes. This adds to the increased traffic, as well as creating an issue in pedestrian areas. The delivery bike riders will be coming into pedestrian areas, and therefore impacting pedestrian areas along with the safety concerns. The bikes left out the front of the proposed site will provide for trip hazards, and the riding of bikes in pedestrian areas is a big safety concern. As we all witness on a regular basis, despite road rules etc delivery drivers can be loose with road rules and ride on footpaths to get to their destinations. Would council be liable for any injuries, given the concerns multiple residents will express about this?

Rubbish

Even if recycling and waste bins are provided, such a 24/7 venue would naturally result in increased littering and rubbish in the area. Including food scraps which would attract vermin, cockroaches and the dreaded bin chickens. The Waste management report submitted in fact notes that the Operational Stage is only allowing for 2 x 240L bins are less than required under Council guidelines. Will Council be increased the street cleaning in these areas with no impact or increase to resident rates to allow for cleaning up for a business?

To date, I have been unable to see the DA notice posted on the proposed development so believe due process has not been followed with this proposal. Additionally, there has been a distinct lack of community consultation given the size and scale of the proposed development that will have significant impact on the community.

I strongly oppose the application to build a 24/7 McDonald's on the corner of Regent and Redfern streets for the reasons set out below:

- 1. There are already two McDonald's within a few minute's drive along the same road in both directions:
- One in Broadway, 1km BEFORE driving past the proposed Redfern location
- One in Waterloo, only 3 blocks or 1.2km further down Regent St/Botany Rd. Waterloo also conveniently offers both an efficient drive thru format and a spacious dedicated car park that alleviates traffic congestion & potential interference with parking availability in surrounding streets.
- 2. The enormous popularity & extensive reliance on home delivery services should also be considered for several reasons:
- A. the impact of the potential volume of delivery riders & their bicycles causing intense ongoing conjection at the proposed location.
- B. Passage for pedestrians is already significantly compromised by the huge footprint of the public 'sculpture' that dominates the immediately adjacent footpath & interferes with the flow of pedestrian traffic especially at peak periods.
- C. In addition delivery drivers with motor vehicles would undoubtedly cause obstruction to the flow of road traffic & put pressure on extremely limited street parking close by.
- D. Hope you're having a good week.

I'm writing to you today to object to the current development proposal for a McDonalds at 153 Redfern St.

The following reasons are the basis of my objection.

- 1. **Operating time** The proposal is for a 24hr venue. There is a lack of public transport options between 1am and 5am, including on weekends limits the ability of restaurant patrons and staff to get home. A close time of 12 or 1am would be more suitable.
- 2. **Anti competitive behaviour** the site of the restaurants is directly next door to the only permanent Australian location of a primary competitor (Mr Charlies). I support fair and free competition, but this appears to be intended to force another established business into administration.
- 3. Local character McDonalds does not fit the village feel and character of Redfern st.
- 4. **Existing restaurant closeby** There is an existing large and established McDonalds approximately 1.2km away in Waterloo that operates 24/7 that is accessible to local patrons via food delivery services, or existing transport methods including a drive through. The Waterloo site is also large enough the restaurant can be expanded if needed.
- 5. Waste disposal The renders show a goods lift exiting onto Redfern street. Presumably this is where the waste bins will be removed from the restauarnt for collection. The waste disposal plan does not specify the times or frequency of collection. This poses significant risk to pedestrain saftey, as the pavement outside the lift is on a downwards slant. If the bin is full, the worker operating the bin may not be able to prevent it from rolling down the hill, striking pedestrains and cars on Regent St. If waste collection occurs during times of low foot traffic (i.e late at night), the noise will be disruptive to nearby residential buildings, and the odor to patrons of venues across the road. Put simply, I'm not aware of a large McDonalds garbage bin that does not have a strong smell after 1 day's worth of rubbish.

As a representative of Aboriginal Medical Service Cooperative Limited, which is dedicated to improving the health and well-being of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander communities, I am writing to formally object to Development Application D/2024/1218, which proposes the establishment of a 24-hour McDonald's restaurant at Redfern Street, Redfern. This development raises serious concerns regarding public health, economic sustainability, and the integrity of our community.

1. Public Health Impact and Long-Term Costs

The introduction of a multinational fast-food chain in our community presents significant public health concerns. Research has shown that the proliferation of fast-food outlets correlates with increased rates of obesity, diabetes, and other diet-related illnesses, which disproportionately affect Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander populations. The availability of ultra-processed, high-calorie meals contributes to poor dietary habits, particularly among younger demographics and economically vulnerable populations. As a Redfern resident I am writing to you in opposition of DA Submission D/2024/1218 which requests approval for a new McDonalds to open and operate 24/7 at 153 Redfern Street REDFERN NSW 2016. I oppose this proposal for the following reasons:

- The presence of a McDonalds will take revenue away from the small hospitality businesses that Redfern is becoming known for. We are writing to give feedback on the proposed McDonalds development at 153 Redfern Street, Redfern which is situated in the C56 - Redfern Estate Conservation Area. Specific issues are: -

- There is insufficient consideration or facilities to process waste in a way that will not
 adversely affect the local community.
- This application is for 24/7 **trading hours** which is non-compliant and is an anomaly for the neighbourhood which is mostly residential and not an active late-night centre.
- The proposed signage is excessive and does not meet development standards. Little
 consideration has been given to the visual impact of the development on the
 conservation area. The applicant's primary objective is preserving the look and feel of
 their corporate branding at the expense of the visual amenity for the community.
- The visual presentation of the development prioritises standardised corporate branding over any attempt to restore original features on this significant shop front to the original 1939 Penfolds Bodega. This is non-compliant to heritage development standards and a missed opportunity to restore heritage features and speaks to the applicant's disregard for the heritage of the conservation area.
- The social impact of the development will detrimentally affect the neighbourhood in terms of noise, parking, community character and health.
- Overall, this application is flawed in that it is incomplete and consistently claims compliance to development standards in areas that are non-compliant when compared with DCP 2012 and LEP 2012.

The specifics of the above issues are detailed below:-

1. Waste

According to the waste management plan submitted by the applicant the required waste bins needed for the development area per the *Guidelines for waste management* are 2x240L and 4x320L bins. The development plan show room for only 2x240L bins. Thus, the waste management plan is deficient by 1280L (4x320L). The applicant states that in their experience the two bins will be sufficient. It is a concern that potentially 1280L of waste – specifically takeaway packaging, is thus walking out the door of the premises and onto the streets of Redfern.

The only bins in the immediate vicinity are on Redfern Street outside the development site, in Jack Lloyd Reserve and by the bus stop on Regent Street. These bins are consistently full and overflowing and thus at capacity for the area.

The applicant does not justify the reduction from 6 to 2 bins as required by development requirements. Nor do they specifically itemise the type and volume of waste to be generated during operations as required in the Waste Management Report.

The applicant is using the fact that they provide takeaway to divest their internal waste processing responsibility at the expense of the residents of Redfern.

Furthermore, per *Guidelines for waste management* applicants must provide the following information within the submitted Waste Management Plan: -

1 Plans and drawings of the proposed development that show the location and space allocated to the waste management systems and facilities and the nominated waste collection point for the site.

- Nominated waste collection point not shown or referred to in Waste management report
- 2 Details of the types and estimated quantities of waste streams.
 - As the applicant has relied on 'extensive operator experience' to deem that 2 rather than 6 bins are sufficient for operational waste surely this should be supported by real life data detailing the anticipated volume and type waste.
- *3 Identification of the path of access for users and collection vehicles.*
 - Not provided in Waste Management Report
- 4 Details of ongoing management, storage and collection of waste, including responsibility for cleaning, transfer of bins between storage areas and collection points, implementation and maintenance of signage, and security of storage areas.
 - Not provided in Waste Management Report

The proposed waste storage is insufficient by 4x320L bins when compared with development standards. Waste responsibilities have not been addressed, and the Waste Management report is incomplete for a valid DA application. Furthermore, the submitted Compliance Assessment report indicated all waste criteria are compliant – this is untrue as detailed above.

2. Late Night Trading

Per DCP 2012 3.15.4 Trading Hours the base trading hours for a Category B low impact premises (food and drink) in a Local Centre Area is 7am-10pm.

This application claims that additional hours from 7am-2am are available as 'the premises include a single entry/exit point'. However, Per DCP 2012 3.15.4 Trading Hours the extended hours of 7am-2am are only available to Category C premises defined as 'It does not include convenience stores, food and drink premises, takeaway food and drink premises. It is thus incorrect to state that extended hours are routinely available for this type of development.

The applicant is requesting 24/7 opening hours which is not in keeping with either the DCP 2012 allowable Trading Hours or the local neighbourhood in which most traders are closed by 10pm. This is contrary to the applicants claim that there are 24-hour operations in the area. As a nearby residents, we are unaware of any premises that are open 24/7 apart from the 24hr gym Anytime Fitness which is membership based and a completely different proposition to a food take away/restaurant operation.

The applicant's assertion that it is 'expected' by the public to have access to McDonalds 24/7 pays little heed to the context of location. Most 24/7 McDonalds are positioned on major thoroughfares and are accessed via vehicle and possess parking facilities and a drive through facility. The context of the site in Redfern is completely different in that there is neither a car park or a drive through and is thus not comparable.

Redfern is a residential area with most restaurants closing by 10pm and bars by 12am. The opening of a 24/7 takeaway restaurant is thus an anomaly to the area. It is not clear the type of customers that are intended to be served by these premises.

There is minimal internal seating (12 seat) and no bathroom facilities which goes against the applicant's claim that the facility would be used as a community meeting place. Furthermore, the lack of bathroom facilities is not conducive to 24/7 opening and increases the risk of customers having been drawn to the area by the opening hours then using the nearby streets as toileting facilities.

There is also the possibility of the premises becoming a ghost kitchen for food delivery services during the early hours. If this happens both the customers and delivery agents will be from out of the area, but the residents of Redfern will bear the cost of a facility in terms of disruption, waste and visual amenity.

3. Signage

It is proposed that the signage for the development consist of McDonalds Branding in the form of 2 awning facia signs, 2 hanging awning signs and a McDonalds 'M' and Mc Café signs on the corner surface above 1st floor level. These signs are non-compliant per the following Development Standards

Per SEPP Exempt and Complying Development 2008

- 2.83 General requirements for advertising and signage
 - (f) not result in more than 3 business identification signs being constructed or installed in relation to a building if the building houses only one commercial tenant
 - The proposed development identifies 6 branding related signs which is non-compliant. Also, as the development site is at major gateway into Redfern at the junction of Redfern St and Regent Street the risk is, if this is taken over by corporate branding it will distracting from the neighbourhood character.

Subdivision 3 Wall signs

- 2.87 Development standards
- c) if it is a sign that is located in a residential, rural or conservation zone—
 - (i) for a sign for a home business, home industry or home occupation—not be more than $1m^2$ in area, and
 - (ii) for a sign for any other use—not be more than 2.5m² in area,
- The 'M' sign alone is 3.32sqm which is non-compliant. In total the development application specifies over 10sqm of branded signage which is excessive for a building making any attempt to fit into a conservation area and take on the characteristics of the neighbourhood. It is intended that the signs be illuminated 24/7 which is not consistent with the Trading Hours of the vicinity and thus will act as a corporate beacon for McDonalds.

Subdivision 4 Fascia signs

2.89 Development standards

(e) not be illuminated

• Per Architectural Plans of the application the facia signage will be illumination which does not meet development standards and will further draw attention to the site.

Subdivision 5 Under awnings signs

2.91 Development standards

- Not result in more than one sign of this type for each ground floor tenancy
- The development proposal identifies 2 under awning signs which therefore does not meet development standards.

Subdivision 7 Window signs

2.94 development standards

The standards specified for that development are that the development must—

- (a) not cover more than 20% of the surface of the window in which it is displayed or 6m², whichever is the lesser, and
- (b) not be illuminated
- It is proposed that first floor window coverings on the Redfern Street elevation will be illuminated and cover all window surface. This does not meet development standards and adds further to the >10sqm of illumination on the building, again drawing attention to the building, rather than being in keeping with the streetscape. It is specified that the window coverings will not be branded but more information is needed as to the intended content does a generic image of a burger and fries count as 'not branded'?

Per DCP 2012 3.16 Signs and advertisements

DCP 3.16.1 Signage strategy

- (1) A signage strategy is to be prepared for all signage applications:
 - (a) in a heritage conservation area or involving a heritage item;
 - (b) on sites that are strata titled or contain more than four business

premises; or

- (c) seeking variations to the requirements of this section.
- The submitted DA application does not include a signage strategy as required for sites within a conservation area even though some aspects of the proposed signage are non-compliant.

DCP 3.16.3 General requirements for signage

- (1) Signage is to be compatible with the architecture, materials, finishes and
- colours of the building and the streetscape.
- (4) Signage that will detract from the amenity or visual quality of heritage items,

heritage conservation areas, open space areas, waterways or residential areas is not permitted.

(5) Signage should not create unacceptable visual clutter taking into account existing signs, neighbouring buildings, the streetscape and the cumulative effect of signs.

(6) Signs should allow the main facades of buildings from the first floor to the rooftop or parapet to be uncluttered and generally free of signage.

The proposed signage is non-compliant with the specified general requirements for signage (DCP 2012 3.16.3) in the following ways: -

- The excessive number and illumination of the proposed signs is not compatible with the streetscape and
- distracts from the visual quality of the conservation area and
- creates unacceptable visual clutter on the corner that is the gateway to Redfern.
- The 'M' and McCafé signs on the corner of the building are not consistent with the general requirement to keep the facades of the building from the first floor to the parapet free from clutter.

DCP 3.16.4 Illuminated signage

- (1) Any illuminated signage is to be designed to ensure that the illuminance
- and luminance from the sign or advertisement is, in the opinion of the consent authority, consistent with the existing light level of the streetscape or environment within which it is located and does not cause glare.
- (2) Unless otherwise provided for in this Section, the illuminance, luminance and threshold increment of illuminated signage is to comply with the recommended values of AS 4282-2019. The maximum nighttime luminance of any sign is not to exceed 300 cd/sqm.
- Excessive illuminated signs will cause glare. No specification has been submitted as to the specific nighttime luminance and so it is not clear if this is compliant.

DCP 3.16.6.5 Under awning signs

- (3) An under-awning sign is not to hang more than 1m below the underside of an awning and should not be more than 400mm high.
 - The specified under awning signs has a height of 500mm and so do not comply with development standards.

DCP 3.16.6.6 Awning fascia signs

- (5) Awning fascia signs are not to be illuminated
- The specified under awning signs are illuminated and so do not comply with development standards.

DCP 3.16.11 Signage related to heritage items and conservation areas
(1) Prior to development consent being granted for signage related to a
heritage item or conservation area, the consent authority may require a
heritage impact statement and signage strategy is to be prepared. The
signage strategy is to incorporate all existing and future signage and have
regard to all relevant policies and recommendations of any Conservation
Management Plan and/or heritage inventory report.

No signage strategy submitted

- (3) New signage is to be compatible with the heritage significance of the conservation area or the item, including the built form architectural style and existing signage. Signage is to be appropriately located to prevent significant components or distinguishing features of heritage buildings from being obscured.
- (4) The design, style, materials, colours, images and lettering of new signage shall be high quality and consistent with the relevant heritage style and period, such as bronze, brass and stainless steel. Plastics, such as coloured or clear acrylic, are only to be used as an ancillary material. Corporate branding and colour schemes are to be modified to fit in with

character and significance of the area or item.

- The proposed signage is standard McDonalds branding and signs are substantially plastic and in corporate colours. No attempt has been made to alter any signage to fit in with the character of the area. Again, this shows a prioritising of corporate presence and visibility resulting in disrespect for the conservation area and the residents.
- (6) New signage located between the first-floor level and parapet for any building is not permitted for heritage items or in heritage conservation areas. This may be varied where upper-level signage is an important aspect of the heritage significance of the conservation area or item on which the sign is located.
- The proposed 'M' and 'McCafé' signs are positioned between the first-floor level and the parapet which is not to development standards. As this is such a high visibility corner in a conservation area it warrants more consideration than the bright yellow plastic corporate branding proposed at the expense of the neighbourhood character.

- (9) New internally illuminated signage is only permitted where: (a) it is a reconstruction of an original significant sign;
- The proposed signage is new and consists of corporate branding in plastic not as required a reconstruction of an original significant sign.
 - (b) it can be demonstrated that internally illuminated signage is an important aspect of the heritage significance of the heritage conservation area or item; or
- There is no justification or claim by the applicant that the McDonalds proposed corporate branding adds to the heritage significance of the conservation area. It is hard to imagine how this could ever be demonstrated and so the illuminated signage should be deleted from this application.
 - (c) the illumination is low voltage and visible through cut out lettering in high quality metal consistent with the heritage significance.
- The illumination for the large 'M' on the corner façade is behind plastic rather that metal cutouts and in McDonalds branding colours, neither of which is in keeping with the heritage conservation area.

4. Heritage

The development site is currently deemed neutral (definition) in the Redfern Conservation Area and was originally the Penfolds Wine Bodega in 1939.

DCP 3.9.6 Heritage conservation areas

The development site is situated in the Redfern Estate Conservation area and is thus subject to the following development standards and objectives: -

- (1) Development within a heritage conservation area is to be compatible with the surrounding built form and urban pattern by addressing the heritage conservation area statement of significance and responding sympathetically to
 - (d) the type, siting, form, height, bulk, roofscape, scale, materials and details of adjoining or nearby contributory buildings.
 - (e) the interface between the public domain and building alignments and property boundaries; and
 - (f) colour schemes that have a hue and tonal relationship with traditional colour schemes

DCP 3.9.8 Neutral Buildings

- (3) Alterations and additions to a neutral building are to:
 - (a) remove unsympathetic alterations and additions, including inappropriate building elements.
 - (c) minimise the removal of significant features and building elements; and
 - d) use appropriate materials, finishes and colours that do not reduce the significance of the Heritage Conservation Area

DCP 3.9.10 building materials for heritage items and buildings within heritage conservation areas

- (2) Existing face brickwork and stone walls are not to be coated, rendered or painted.
- It is part of the development application to strip back all render and paintwork to expose the original brickwork to the site. This would be in keeping with the Heritage Conservation area and expose the brickwork that would have been part of the Penfolds Bodega constructed on the site in 1939. It would also be consistent with not only the exposed the brickwork façade of the building adjacent on Regents Street, but also on the new build apartment buildings across Regent Street. Retaining the brickwork would give a visual conformity to one of the main Redfern intersections that directly relate to the area's heritage.
- However, it is the applicant's intention to repaint over this brickwork in McDonald nationwide branding corporate colours. The application therefore is not 'sympathetic to the heritage conservation of the area' as stated in the submitted SEE report. It makes no attempt to contribute in a positive manner to the significance of the Conservation area and is a missed opportunity sacrificed for corporate branding and thus fails to meet the objectives of *DCP 3.9 Heritage*.

DCP 3.10.4 Significant shop fronts

Objective

- (a) Encourage the retention of original, early significant shopfronts and ensure the design of street frontages is not detrimental to the aesthetic quality of the street.
- This development is detrimental to the aesthetic quality of the street and is a manifestation of corporate branding rather than an attempt to restore the characteristics of the area as is required.

Provisions

- (4) Where original shopfronts or facades within heritage conservation areas have been altered, significant contributory detailing and other characteristic elements are to be reinstated where there is evidence of the original style or detailing on the building or within the row or group.
- This application has failed to restore architectural elements such as exposed brickwork and has instead prioritised corporate branding which adds nothing and distracts from the heritage of the conservation area.

Per SEE the applicant claims the development

'would improve the overall presentation of the building as an example of an inter-war period building within the Redfern Heritage Conservation Area'

However, as the images below show, the style of the original presentation of the site in 1939 bears little resemblance to the proposed development which is a cookie cutter manifestation of McDonalds corporate branding and is distracting to the heritage feel of the area.





5. Social Impact

Traffic and Parking

The proposed development is expected to increase both vehicular and pedestrian traffic, exacerbating existing congestion issues. The limited seating capacity suggests a reliance on takeaway services, which could lead to increased short-term parking demands and potential illegal parking in the vicinity.

Noise Pollution

The proposed 24/7 operation is likely to generate continuous noise from customer activity and late-night deliveries. This is particularly concerning given the restaurants limited seating capacity of 12, which may encourage loitering outside the premises. The resulting noise could disrupt the peace of nearby residential areas specifically, the numerous high-rise apartments across Regent Street, especially during nighttime hours.

Community

The new development is depicted as a social hub for the community. However, with minimal indoor seating, no outdoor seating and no bathroom facilities it falls short in this aspect. Redfern has cultivated a unique identity, characterised by independent businesses and a strong community spirit. The introduction of a large multinational chain could undermine this character.

Health

The applicant claims in the SEE that they 'have worked with the heart foundation in recent years to bring the 'Tick' of approval to all stores. This gives a false representation of McDonalds as healthy eating. The Heart Foundation 'Tick' was retired in 2015 (https://www.abc.net.au/news/health/2015-12-11/heart-tick-retires-what-worked-what-didnt/7020732) and McDonalds lost the right to use it in 2011 https://www.smh.com.au/lifestyle/health-and-wellness/mcdonalds-loses-heart-foundations-tick-of-approval-20110921-1kk21.html.

That McDonalds themselves are reliant on out of date and inaccurate data to try to mitigate perceived claims of being an unhealthy eating option is telling.

Everyone is free to choose what they eat, but it is questionable to entertain bringing to community of small independently owned cafes and restaurants, providing freshly prepared food, a multinational that feels it necessary to conceal the negative nutritional value of their offerings.

Conclusion

The applicant has demonstrated their intent to bring to Redfern a standardised McDonalds facility with no consideration of Redfern's unique and heritage status.

The constant reference to the brand's knowledge and experience in fast food facilities in the application seemingly allows the applicant to prioritise their cookie cutter approach to McDonalds outlets over development standards and controls at the expense of visual amenity, heritage status and social impacts such as waste and trading hours.

This development application is not a good fit for the Redfern community and should be rejected or made to conform to the relevant development standards, specifically the trading hours, heritage status of the area, and the unique characteristics of the neighbourhood.

This multinational corporation has no regard for community well-being, local businesses, or ethical concerns. Allowing yet another McDonald's in the area would be a**detriment to Redfern**, prioritising corporate greed over the health, culture, and values of its residents.

I strongly oppose this development for the following reasons:

- 1. **Corporate Tax Avoidance** As a multinational corporation, McDonald's has a well-documented history of aggressive tax minimisation, contributing little to the Australian economy while extracting significant profits. Allowing them to establish yet another location further enables this harmful practice.

I refer to the current Development Application before Council seeking consideration of an application to utilise the existing commercial premises for the purpose of a McDonalds Restaurant operating 24 hours, 7 days a week.

I wish to lodge an objection to the proposal specifically in terms of the proposed hours of trading for 24 hours a day 7 days a week.

I have no objection to the use of the premises for commercial activity that is consistent with the other nearby and adjoining uses, the 24 hour trading and resultant impacts is the issue I wish to object to for the reasons detailed below.

1. Noise

There is already a high degree of noise nuisance generated within the immediate locality due to the poor policing of existing licensed premises, especially due to the congregation of patrons outside of those premises, either waiting entry or exiting after the close of business.

The use of this premises for 24 hour trading will further exacerbate those existing nuisances as there is real potential for patrons to create noise nuisance when leaving the restaurant, and congregation of patrons upon the adjacent open space in Regent Street.

The background noise level in this locality is relatively low at night, especially after midnight, as existing business premises cease trading, and those low background levels will result in the noise of patrons on the street outside of the business being amplified to the adjoining residents directly opposite and within the immediate locality.

2. Public Nuisance

The operation of the restaurant for 24 hours trading has the real potential for anti social behaviour by creating a honey pot effect where people would be drawn to the premises due to the 24 hour availability of refreshments and thereby create noise and other disturbances, potentially anti social behaviour, in the immediate area, again exacerbated by the low back ground noise levels after midnight.

The nature of this business is high volume turn over of patrons, with a large number of patrons entering and existing the premises. Again the volume of expected patrons will add to the noise generated by the proposed use especially after midnight.

3. Plan of Management

The submitted plan of management appears to be a template document and does not include any evidence that this type of POM has been successful in managing other 24 hour trading restaurants operated by the proponent to ensure there has been no impact to the impact of

adjoining residents.

4. Precedent

There are concerns that the approval for 24 hour trading in this location will set an undesirable precedent for other similar, either existing or future business, to also seek 24 hour trading in this location.

5. Impact on residential amenity of residents

The existing area has undergone a significant change in character during the 29 years I have lived here, with an increasing number of residents now within the immediate locality, housed within new buildings and adapted existing commercial buildings.

The operation of this type of business with the hours as proposed is inconsistent and in conflict with the objectives of the E1 zone in terms of enabling residential development in that zone, given the high likely hood of adverse impact to the amenity of those residents because of the above detailed potential adverse impacts.

6. Restriction of hours

As noted above the proposed 24 hour trading 7 days a week is not considered appropriate in this locality for the reasons of noise and resultant impact upon the amenity of residents.

It is considered reasonable to issue consent with the hours of trading restricted to 8.00am to midnight Friday and Saturday, and 8.00am to 11pm Sunday to Thursday.

Introducing a McDonald's here would harm vulnerable community members, particularly school children, by promoting unhealthy dietary choices linked to fast food near schools.

Economic and Market Saturation

- -5 local hamburger spots already thrive nearby.
- -An existing McDonald's is only 1.6 km away in Waterloo.
- -McDonald's already delivers to the area via services like Uber Eats.

This proposal threatens the viability of small, local businesses that contribute to Redfern's unique vibe.

Environmental Concerns

McDonald's typically generates significant waste, worsening local litter issues and straining waste management. The resulting mess would impact the area's appearance and may attract pests.

Traffic and Amenity

The development would:

- -Increase vehicle traffic and delivery noise, especially late-night.
- -Create additional foot traffic around schools.
- -Cause parking issues in an already crowded area.

We are writing to give feedback on the proposed McDonalds development at 153 Redfern Street, Redfern which is situated in the C56 - Redfern Estate Conservation Area. Specific issues are: -

- There is insufficient consideration or facilities to process waste in a way that will not
 adversely affect the local community.
- This application is for 24/7 **trading hours** which is non-compliant and is an anomaly for the neighbourhood which is mostly residential and not an active late-night centre.
- The proposed signage is excessive and does not meet development standards. Little consideration has been given to the visual impact of the development on the conservation area. The applicant's primary objective is preserving the look and feel of their corporate branding at the expense of the visual amenity for the community.
- The visual presentation of the development prioritises standardised corporate branding over any attempt to restore original features on this significant shop front to the original 1939 Penfolds Bodega. This is non-compliant to heritage development standards and a missed opportunity to restore heritage features and speaks to the applicant's disregard for the heritage of the conservation area.
- The social impact of the development will detrimentally affect the neighbourhood in terms of noise, parking, community character and health.
- Overall, this application is flawed in that it is incomplete and consistently claims compliance to development standards in areas that are non-compliant when compared with DCP 2012 and LEP 2012.

The specifics of the above issues are detailed below:-

1. Waste

According to the waste management plan submitted by the applicant the required waste bins needed for the development area per the *Guidelines for waste management* are 2x240L and 4x320L bins. The development plan show room for only 2x240L bins. Thus, the waste management plan is deficient by 1280L (4x320L). The applicant states that in their experience the two bins will be sufficient. It is a concern that potentially 1280L of waste – specifically takeaway packaging, is thus walking out the door of the premises and onto the streets of Redfern.

The only bins in the immediate vicinity are on Redfern Street outside the development site, in Jack Lloyd Reserve and by the bus stop on Regent Street. These bins are consistently full and overflowing and thus at capacity for the area.

The applicant does not justify the reduction from 6 to 2 bins as required by development requirements. Nor do they specifically itemise the type and volume of waste to be generated during operations as required in the Waste Management Report.

The applicant is using the fact that they provide takeaway to divest their internal waste processing responsibility at the expense of the residents of Redfern.

Furthermore, per *Guidelines for waste management* applicants must provide the following information within the submitted Waste Management Plan: -

1 Plans and drawings of the proposed development that show the location and space allocated to the waste management systems and facilities and the nominated waste collection point for the site.

- Nominated waste collection point not shown or referred to in Waste management report
- 2 Details of the types and estimated quantities of waste streams.
 - As the applicant has relied on 'extensive operator experience' to deem that 2 rather than 6 bins are sufficient for operational waste surely this should be supported by real life data detailing the anticipated volume and type waste.
- *3 Identification of the path of access for users and collection vehicles.*
 - Not provided in Waste Management Report
- 4 Details of ongoing management, storage and collection of waste, including responsibility for cleaning, transfer of bins between storage areas and collection points, implementation and maintenance of signage, and security of storage areas.
 - Not provided in Waste Management Report

The proposed waste storage is insufficient by 4x320L bins when compared with development standards. Waste responsibilities have not been addressed, and the Waste Management report is incomplete for a valid DA application. Furthermore, the submitted Compliance Assessment report indicated all waste criteria are compliant – this is untrue as detailed above.

2. Late Night Trading

Per DCP 2012 3.15.4 Trading Hours the base trading hours for a Category B low impact premises (food and drink) in a Local Centre Area is 7am-10pm.

This application claims that additional hours from 7am-2am are available as 'the premises include a single entry/exit point'. However, Per DCP 2012 3.15.4 Trading Hours the extended hours of 7am-2am are only available to Category C premises defined as 'It does not include convenience stores, food and drink premises, takeaway food and drink premises. It is thus incorrect to state that extended hours are routinely available for this type of development.

The applicant is requesting 24/7 opening hours which is not in keeping with either the DCP 2012 allowable Trading Hours or the local neighbourhood in which most traders are closed by 10pm. This is contrary to the applicants claim that there are 24-hour operations in the area. As a nearby residents, we are unaware of any premises that are open 24/7 apart from the 24hr gym Anytime Fitness which is membership based and a completely different proposition to a food take away/restaurant operation.

The applicant's assertion that it is 'expected' by the public to have access to McDonalds 24/7 pays little heed to the context of location. Most 24/7 McDonalds are positioned on major thoroughfares and are accessed via vehicle and possess parking facilities and a drive through facility. The context of the site in Redfern is completely different in that there is neither a car park or a drive through and is thus not comparable.

Redfern is a residential area with most restaurants closing by 10pm and bars by 12am. The opening of a 24/7 takeaway restaurant is thus an anomaly to the area. It is not clear the type of customers that are intended to be served by these premises.

There is minimal internal seating (12 seat) and no bathroom facilities which goes against the applicant's claim that the facility would be used as a community meeting place. Furthermore, the lack of bathroom facilities is not conducive to 24/7 opening and increases the risk of customers having been drawn to the area by the opening hours then using the nearby streets as toileting facilities.

There is also the possibility of the premises becoming a ghost kitchen for food delivery services during the early hours. If this happens both the customers and delivery agents will be from out of the area, but the residents of Redfern will bear the cost of a facility in terms of disruption, waste and visual amenity.

3. Signage

It is proposed that the signage for the development consist of McDonalds Branding in the form of 2 awning facia signs, 2 hanging awning signs and a McDonalds 'M' and Mc Café signs on the corner surface above 1st floor level. These signs are non-compliant per the following Development Standards

Per SEPP Exempt and Complying Development 2008

- 2.83 General requirements for advertising and signage
 - (f) not result in more than 3 business identification signs being constructed or installed in relation to a building if the building houses only one commercial tenant
 - The proposed development identifies 6 branding related signs which is non-compliant. Also, as the development site is at major gateway into Redfern at the junction of Redfern St and Regent Street the risk is, if this is taken over by corporate branding it will distracting from the neighbourhood character.

Subdivision 3 Wall signs

- 2.87 Development standards
- c) if it is a sign that is located in a residential, rural or conservation zone—
 - (i) for a sign for a home business, home industry or home occupation—not be more than $1m^2$ in area, and
 - (ii) for a sign for any other use—not be more than 2.5m² in area,
- The 'M' sign alone is 3.32sqm which is non-compliant. In total the development application specifies over 10sqm of branded signage which is excessive for a building making any attempt to fit into a conservation area and take on the characteristics of the neighbourhood. It is intended that the signs be illuminated 24/7 which is not consistent with the Trading Hours of the vicinity and thus will act as a corporate beacon for McDonalds.

Subdivision 4 Fascia signs

2.89 Development standards

(e) not be illuminated

• Per Architectural Plans of the application the facia signage will be illumination which does not meet development standards and will further draw attention to the site.

Subdivision 5 Under awnings signs

2.91 Development standards

- Not result in more than one sign of this type for each ground floor tenancy
- The development proposal identifies 2 under awning signs which therefore does not meet development standards.

Subdivision 7 Window signs

2.94 development standards

The standards specified for that development are that the development must—

- (a) not cover more than 20% of the surface of the window in which it is displayed or 6m², whichever is the lesser, and
- (b) not be illuminated
- It is proposed that first floor window coverings on the Redfern Street elevation will be illuminated and cover all window surface. This does not meet development standards and adds further to the >10sqm of illumination on the building, again drawing attention to the building, rather than being in keeping with the streetscape. It is specified that the window coverings will not be branded but more information is needed as to the intended content does a generic image of a burger and fries count as 'not branded'?

Per DCP 2012 3.16 Signs and advertisements

DCP 3.16.1 Signage strategy

- (1) A signage strategy is to be prepared for all signage applications:
 - (a) in a heritage conservation area or involving a heritage item;
 - (b) on sites that are strata titled or contain more than four business

premises; or

- (c) seeking variations to the requirements of this section.
- The submitted DA application does not include a signage strategy as required for sites within a conservation area even though some aspects of the proposed signage are non-compliant.

DCP 3.16.3 General requirements for signage

- (1) Signage is to be compatible with the architecture, materials, finishes and
- colours of the building and the streetscape.
- (4) Signage that will detract from the amenity or visual quality of heritage items,

heritage conservation areas, open space areas, waterways or residential areas is not permitted.

(5) Signage should not create unacceptable visual clutter taking into account existing signs, neighbouring buildings, the streetscape and the cumulative effect of signs.

(6) Signs should allow the main facades of buildings from the first floor to the rooftop or parapet to be uncluttered and generally free of signage.

The proposed signage is non-compliant with the specified general requirements for signage (DCP 2012 3.16.3) in the following ways: -

- The excessive number and illumination of the proposed signs is not compatible with the streetscape and
- distracts from the visual quality of the conservation area and
- creates unacceptable visual clutter on the corner that is the gateway to Redfern.
- The 'M' and McCafé signs on the corner of the building are not consistent with the general requirement to keep the facades of the building from the first floor to the parapet free from clutter.

DCP 3.16.4 Illuminated signage

- (1) Any illuminated signage is to be designed to ensure that the illuminance
- and luminance from the sign or advertisement is, in the opinion of the consent authority, consistent with the existing light level of the streetscape or environment within which it is located and does not cause glare.
- (2) Unless otherwise provided for in this Section, the illuminance, luminance and threshold increment of illuminated signage is to comply with the recommended values of AS 4282-2019. The maximum nighttime luminance of any sign is not to exceed 300 cd/sqm.
- Excessive illuminated signs will cause glare. No specification has been submitted as to the specific nighttime luminance and so it is not clear if this is compliant.

DCP 3.16.6.5 Under awning signs

- (3) An under-awning sign is not to hang more than 1m below the underside of an awning and should not be more than 400mm high.
 - The specified under awning signs has a height of 500mm and so do not comply with development standards.

DCP 3.16.6.6 Awning fascia signs

- (5) Awning fascia signs are not to be illuminated
- The specified under awning signs are illuminated and so do not comply with development standards.

DCP 3.16.11 Signage related to heritage items and conservation areas
(1) Prior to development consent being granted for signage related to a
heritage item or conservation area, the consent authority may require a
heritage impact statement and signage strategy is to be prepared. The
signage strategy is to incorporate all existing and future signage and have
regard to all relevant policies and recommendations of any Conservation
Management Plan and/or heritage inventory report.

No signage strategy submitted

- (3) New signage is to be compatible with the heritage significance of the conservation area or the item, including the built form architectural style and existing signage. Signage is to be appropriately located to prevent significant components or distinguishing features of heritage buildings from being obscured.
- (4) The design, style, materials, colours, images and lettering of new signage shall be high quality and consistent with the relevant heritage style and period, such as bronze, brass and stainless steel. Plastics, such as coloured or clear acrylic, are only to be used as an ancillary material. Corporate branding and colour schemes are to be modified to fit in with

character and significance of the area or item.

- The proposed signage is standard McDonalds branding and signs are substantially plastic and in corporate colours. No attempt has been made to alter any signage to fit in with the character of the area. Again, this shows a prioritising of corporate presence and visibility resulting in disrespect for the conservation area and the residents.
- (6) New signage located between the first-floor level and parapet for any building is not permitted for heritage items or in heritage conservation areas. This may be varied where upper-level signage is an important aspect of the heritage significance of the conservation area or item on which the sign is located.
- The proposed 'M' and 'McCafé' signs are positioned between the first-floor level and the parapet which is not to development standards. As this is such a high visibility corner in a conservation area it warrants more consideration than the bright yellow plastic corporate branding proposed at the expense of the neighbourhood character.

- (9) New internally illuminated signage is only permitted where: (a) it is a reconstruction of an original significant sign;
- The proposed signage is new and consists of corporate branding in plastic not as required a reconstruction of an original significant sign.
 - (b) it can be demonstrated that internally illuminated signage is an important aspect of the heritage significance of the heritage conservation area or item; or
- There is no justification or claim by the applicant that the McDonalds proposed corporate branding adds to the heritage significance of the conservation area. It is hard to imagine how this could ever be demonstrated and so the illuminated signage should be deleted from this application.
 - (c) the illumination is low voltage and visible through cut out lettering in high quality metal consistent with the heritage significance.
- The illumination for the large 'M' on the corner façade is behind plastic rather that metal cutouts and in McDonalds branding colours, neither of which is in keeping with the heritage conservation area.

4. Heritage

The development site is currently deemed neutral (definition) in the Redfern Conservation Area and was originally the Penfolds Wine Bodega in 1939.

DCP 3.9.6 Heritage conservation areas

The development site is situated in the Redfern Estate Conservation area and is thus subject to the following development standards and objectives: -

- (1) Development within a heritage conservation area is to be compatible with the surrounding built form and urban pattern by addressing the heritage conservation area statement of significance and responding sympathetically to
 - (d) the type, siting, form, height, bulk, roofscape, scale, materials and details of adjoining or nearby contributory buildings.
 - (e) the interface between the public domain and building alignments and property boundaries; and
 - (f) colour schemes that have a hue and tonal relationship with traditional colour schemes

DCP 3.9.8 Neutral Buildings

- (3) Alterations and additions to a neutral building are to:
 - (a) remove unsympathetic alterations and additions, including inappropriate building elements.
 - (c) minimise the removal of significant features and building elements; and
 - d) use appropriate materials, finishes and colours that do not reduce the significance of the Heritage Conservation Area

DCP 3.9.10 building materials for heritage items and buildings within heritage conservation areas

- (2) Existing face brickwork and stone walls are not to be coated, rendered or painted.
- It is part of the development application to strip back all render and paintwork to expose the original brickwork to the site. This would be in keeping with the Heritage Conservation area and expose the brickwork that would have been part of the Penfolds Bodega constructed on the site in 1939. It would also be consistent with not only the exposed the brickwork façade of the building adjacent on Regents Street, but also on the new build apartment buildings across Regent Street. Retaining the brickwork would give a visual conformity to one of the main Redfern intersections that directly relate to the area's heritage.
- However, it is the applicant's intention to repaint over this brickwork in McDonald nationwide branding corporate colours. The application therefore is not 'sympathetic to the heritage conservation of the area' as stated in the submitted SEE report. It makes no attempt to contribute in a positive manner to the significance of the Conservation area and is a missed opportunity sacrificed for corporate branding and thus fails to meet the objectives of *DCP 3.9 Heritage*.

DCP 3.10.4 Significant shop fronts

Objective

- (a) Encourage the retention of original, early significant shopfronts and ensure the design of street frontages is not detrimental to the aesthetic quality of the street.
- This development is detrimental to the aesthetic quality of the street and is a manifestation of corporate branding rather than an attempt to restore the characteristics of the area as is required.

Provisions

- (4) Where original shopfronts or facades within heritage conservation areas have been altered, significant contributory detailing and other characteristic elements are to be reinstated where there is evidence of the original style or detailing on the building or within the row or group.
- This application has failed to restore architectural elements such as exposed brickwork and has instead prioritised corporate branding which adds nothing and distracts from the heritage of the conservation area.

Per SEE the applicant claims the development

'would improve the overall presentation of the building as an example of an inter-war period building within the Redfern Heritage Conservation Area'

However, as the images below show, the style of the original presentation of the site in 1939 bears little resemblance to the proposed development which is a cookie cutter manifestation of McDonalds corporate branding and is distracting to the heritage feel of the area.





5. Social Impact

Traffic and Parking

The proposed development is expected to increase both vehicular and pedestrian traffic, exacerbating existing congestion issues. The limited seating capacity suggests a reliance on takeaway services, which could lead to increased short-term parking demands and potential illegal parking in the vicinity.

Noise Pollution

The proposed 24/7 operation is likely to generate continuous noise from customer activity and late-night deliveries. This is particularly concerning given the restaurants limited seating capacity of 12, which may encourage loitering outside the premises. The resulting noise could disrupt the peace of nearby residential areas specifically, the numerous high-rise apartments across Regent Street, especially during nighttime hours.

Community

The new development is depicted as a social hub for the community. However, with minimal indoor seating, no outdoor seating and no bathroom facilities it falls short in this aspect. Redfern has cultivated a unique identity, characterised by independent businesses and a strong community spirit. The introduction of a large multinational chain could undermine this character.

Health

The applicant claims in the SEE that they 'have worked with the heart foundation in recent years to bring the 'Tick' of approval to all stores. This gives a false representation of McDonalds as healthy eating. The Heart Foundation 'Tick' was retired in 2015 (https://www.abc.net.au/news/health/2015-12-11/heart-tick-retires-what-worked-what-didnt/7020732) and McDonalds lost the right to use it in 2011 https://www.smh.com.au/lifestyle/health-and-wellness/mcdonalds-loses-heart-foundations-tick-of-approval-20110921-1kk21.html.

That McDonalds themselves are reliant on out of date and inaccurate data to try to mitigate perceived claims of being an unhealthy eating option is telling.

Everyone is free to choose what they eat, but it is questionable to entertain bringing to community of small independently owned cafes and restaurants, providing freshly prepared food, a multinational that feels it necessary to conceal the negative nutritional value of their offerings.


Conclusion

The applicant has demonstrated their intent to bring to Redfern a standardised McDonalds facility with no consideration of Redfern's unique and heritage status.

The constant reference to the brand's knowledge and experience in fast food facilities in the application seemingly allows the applicant to prioritise their cookie cutter approach to McDonalds outlets over development standards and controls at the expense of visual amenity, heritage status and social impacts such as waste and trading hours.

This development application is not a good fit for the Redfern community and should be rejected or made to conform to the relevant development standards, specifically the trading hours, heritage status of the area, and the unique characteristics of the neighbourhood.

This will flow on into the surrounding residential area and Redfern community.

McDonalds is an ill-fitting and ill-considered business for Redfern's community. Redfern is now becoming a haven for independent, interesting and niche hospitality businesses. This development would cheapen and diminish the amenity of the local area that has strived to build a thriving café, restaurant and bar scene. The introduction of a McDonalds fast-food mega chain business would be incongruent with the ambience of the community and it' surroundings and out of place and out of context with the unique inner city suburban hub.

- As a global chain McDonald's is an ill-fitting business to introduce into an area attempting to protect it's unique heritage, character and community and will impact negatively on the ambience and amenity of the surrounding area.
- The corner of Redfern and Cope Streets (which is also in effect the corner of Regent Street) is a popular area with a small green space near a bus stop. The area is traditionally a community meeting point with the BowerBird sculpture right next to the proposed development. The introduction of a fast-food restaurant with unhealthy food and notoriously predatory advertising practices targeting children will impact on the ambience of this area for everyone and on the ability of families to enjoy this space and simultaneously maintain their children's health. I believe that it will drive local residents away from using this corner as the meeting point that it has been for many years.
- The introduction of a 24 hour fast food establishment on the corner of one of the busiest streets in Redfern will likely impact negatively on pedestrian access and safety, both from increased traffic with little existing parking, and in terms of attracting anti-social behaviour.
- There are already numerous restaurants and takeaway food shops in the area which are healthier, maintaining social business hours and practices, well established in the community, and independent. These are already well-serving the Redfern community and are likely to be negatively impacted by this development.
- When last I checked there was no DA notice visible at the proposed site. To me this
 speaks to the attitude with which this proposal is being put forward, with no regard
 given to meeting their responsibilities to the surrounding community.
